COLLEGE MYTHS (AND REALITIES)

MYTH: My student needs to decide on her career before she goes to college.

REALITY: College is a time to explore. Except in a few specific cases, your student can choose a major in her sophomore year and still complete the degree in four years. A surprising number of students discover the field for them while taking a course they didn't expect to like. Your student shouldn't let well-meaning friends pressure her into deciding on a major field or a career at this time. She can take her time.

PARENT CHECKLIST

- Explore careers and interests.** There are many websites that try to help match personality and interests to potential careers. Visit them with your student – try *LearnHowToBecome.org*, *MyNextMove.org* or *WhoDoYouWant2B.com*.
- Explore interests with your student and encourage involvement.** Talk to your student about the kinds of activities she is interested in – it doesn't have to be sports or an academically-related club. Consider potential careers and try to find activities related to fields he is interested in. Consider activities outside of school as well, like in the community or at church.
- Review your student's schedule and class selections.** Make sure she is on track to progress from middle school and has a plan for the appropriate classes to take each year in high school for the type of career she might want.
