The Oregon Department of Education provides information each year in this report card related to our districts performance. The 2015-16 school year data was collected using the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium tool and other information submitted by our district to the Oregon Department of Education. This past year our district continued to show strong improvement in the area of student academic growth in both reading and math and exceeded the statewide averages in many areas. The St. Paul Middle/ High School was recognized as one of the highest performing schools in the state in English Language Arts, Mathematics and Science.

Report card ratings are based on student achievement, academic growth and graduation rates.

The continued trend of increased performance scores as students move through the St Paul education system continues to be a positive indicator of overall student success within our district.

Individually and collectively our teachers and the district set student learning goals to help us stay focused on improving student achievement for every child in every grade.

This is the second year of implementation of a new mathematics curriculum in Kindergarten through 5th grade and student performance in mathematics at the elementary has improved. 
