Tonawanda City School District is forging ahead with the assistance and guidance of members of our school community serving on Task Force groups to investigate and ultimately recommend to the Tonawanda Board of Education three major items: final sale of school property i.e. Highland School and the former Board of Education Office Building (202 Broad Street), relocation of Clint Small Stadium to the Tonawanda High School complex and finally, development of consideration(s) for possible redesigned elementary school facilities and site(s).

Each of these items brings with it consummate questions and decisions that the board of education will be required to determine. It is however, once again, wonderful to witness the involvement of many community members who will help shape the final decisions made by the board. I thank everyone for their involvement.

There are exciting new initiatives that can be witnessed throughout the district. District Technology Updates

Staying in the game with the quickly advancing world of technology, the Tonawanda City School District has continued to provide its students and educators with new and up-and-coming technology.

Purchased new for this school year are promethium boards, smart boards and flip video cameras. Promethium boards and smart boards are "touch screens" that work with the district's computers. When a computer's image is projected on them, the user only needs to use their hand and touch the screen to use the computer instead of having to utilize the mouse and keyboard of the computer. The flip video cameras are small video camcorders that can be used to record video as well as take pictures. Teachers are utilizing this technology to videotape students reading for an "electronic portfolio." "If you videotape student reading in September and compare it with a videotape of the student reading by June, you can really see the progress that the student has made in his or her reading ability", reports Library Media Specialist Jennifer Patterson. The cameras are small and easy to use as the video and pictures are recorded digitally and then the camera has a USB plug to directly plug right into the computer for downloading and saving.

In addition to the above purchased technology, the district is also in the midst of replacing all of the televisions in the classrooms at the high school and middle school with permanently installed, ceiling mounted video projectors. The video projectors are less expensive than the purchase of televisions, have a longer lasting performance over the years and project an image of a computer, video or television show that is much larger and proficient to a wide classroom audience than a 32" television screen.

The Tonawanda City School District is dedicated toward preparing Tonawanda's children for a rapidly changing, technologically challenging future. It is our privilege to provide our students and teachers with tools that support education and develop technological skills and know-how.

District Task Force Initiatives

September 24 was the initial meeting for all three District Task Force groups. Dr. James Mills from Niagara University served as facilitator for the first meeting of the Clint Small and Facilities Task Force joint meeting which was held at the former board offices. Joseph Giarrizzo, administrator for business and financial services chaired the Financial Task Force meeting. Parents, community, staff, administration and board members comprise the cross section of individuals who expressed interest in being part of this process.

The Facilities Task Force consists of 24 members. They will be reviewing the reconfiguration of the elementary schools as well as district student enrollment trends. Based on the review, a recommendation to the board for future plans could include creation of a single elementary site, creation of two elementary sites to house Prekindergarten to fifth grade, or maintaining the current three sites. They are scheduled to report back to the board by December.

The Clint Small Task Force consists of 14 members. They will be reviewing the current legal status of the Clint Small site and work with the city to determine the long-range plan for this property that could include relocation of the stadium to the existing high school site. They are expected to provide the board with their recommendation by January of 2010.

The Financial Task Force consists of nine members – two of whom are community members who have served on the budget advisory team for the last several years. This group will review procedures for sale or future utilization of properties such as Highland, the former board offices, Central School and vacant land. They are expected to provide the board with their recommendation by November of 2009 that will include a timeframe to community input and board action that could include a vote to accept a selling price on selected properties.

Conversations relating to the sale of school properties, the Clint Small Stadium transition and long-range campus planning have also been taking place with representatives from the City of Tonawanda and the Tonawanda City School District as part of the Shared Municipal Services Incentive (SMSI) Grant.

Web 2.0 Skills Science Comes Alive with Technology

Twenty-first century skills such as global literacy, computer literacy, problem solving, critical thinking, creativity and critical thinking are extremely important in today's interconnected workforce and society. Technology is the vehicle to bring these changes into the classroom and one of our sixth-grade middle school science educators,



Rachel Wagner, is in the driver seat. She is in the process of transforming her classroom to assist students in meeting these technological standards, which requires a new approach to teaching and learning.

When you walk into Ms. Wagner's classroom students are not learning using the traditional methods. Instead of a textbook on their desk there is a laptop and there is no paper notebook with which to record information; only a wiki. "Kids are so adept at technology it is second nature and it makes the flow of ideas easier. When I used paper and pencil in the classroom it was such a laborious process because it is like working with outdated tools," Ms. Wagner said.

Technology provides a learning environment where students learn through real-world experiences and work to solve real-world problems. Ms. Wagner believes "a successful 21st century classroom is one that differentiates instruction (learning styles and ability level), structures the delivery of information via a variety of resources, and is student-centered, requiring students to be active learning participants."

The best part about this classroom environment is the fact that the students are so immersed in the learning. A student from Ms. Wagner's class offered some interesting insight, "Her class is a hands-on place, and I am more active...not just staring at the teacher watching them do all the stuff."

Achieve 3000

Achieve 3000 is a reading comprehension program for Tonawanda Middle School students. Students use this program to help improve their reading skills. A contest was initiated as an incentive for students to use Achieve 3000 after school. The student who completed the most reading comprehension passages and passed all of the tests would receive an Ipod Touch. Jenivette Garcia surpassed all of the eligible students by completing 20 tests at home. Congratulations Jenivette!

Jeff had his portfolio adjudicated last February at the New York State Summer School of the Arts (NYSSSA) day at University at Buffalo. Only a select number of students are chosen for this prestigious program, so Jeff was part of an elite group of the best and brightest student/artists from across the state.

NYSSSA is a program that provides intensive, preprofessional training programs for New York State's most gifted and motivated young artists. NYSSSA is for students who are considering careers in the arts or entertainment industries. Tonawanda generally sends students to the Media Arts program, but there is also a drawing and painting program. The students live on a college campus, participating in a variety of intensive arts experiences in a rich arts environment. NYSSSA is recognized as one of the finest programs of its kind in the nation, and attracts over 15,000 high school age students.

The eight Summer Schools of the Arts are directed and staffed by internationally acclaimed artists and companies such as the New York City Ballet and The Philadelphia Orchestra. Students work in small groups and in one-on-one sessions with professionals and other students of similar ability.

Entry to NYSSSA is through auditions, which are open to all high school students. Tuition assistance is available based upon financial need. Model Transition Programs Offer Workshops for Parents

The Model Transition programs (MTP) of Grand Island and Tonawanda are offering free workshops for parents and professionals in an effort to provide support for students with disabilities and their families.

Topics of the workshops have included: "Effective Communication", "Guardianship, Wills and Trusts", and workshops that are focused on available community based services.

On Wednesday, November 18, the topic will be "The Office of Mental Health." Parents can learn how to work within the mental health system to help their child be successful in school, at home and within the community. Another workshop, to be held January 27, 2010, will be "What to Do with All That Paper: Binder Building." This workshop will help parents learn what papers to keep, explaining how this may help parents receive necessary services for their student. Both workshops are scheduled from 6 to 8 p.m. at Tonawanda High School at 150 Hinds Street in room 108. To reserve a spot, call (716) 332-4170, or go online to www.parentnetworkwny.org.

The MTP is a grant-funded program that address vocational, educational and community gaps in services provided to students with disabilities at the high school level. Students participate in vocational training, post-secondary training and will receive assistance obtaining and maintaining competitive employment, job readiness and work skills, social skills and other transition services.

Through the MTP, students are provided with work experience, academic training and post-secondary vocational training. The MTP also provides students with the knowledge and information they will need to make informed decisions about their lives.

Tonawanda Ties for 2nd at the Lewiston Chalk Walk

Parents' Right to Know

Parents of students attending the Tonawanda City School District have the right to receive, upon request to the district, certain information as authorized by federal law regarding the professional qualifications of the children's classroom teachers. Parents have the right to request the following information:

- Whether the teacher has met New York State Education Department qualifications and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas he/she teaches;
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which New York State Education Department qualifications or licensing criteria have been waived due to special circumstances;
- The teacher's college major (undergraduate level); whether the teacher has any graduate certifications or degrees; and, if so, the field of discipline of the certification or degree;
- Whether your child is provided services by any teaching assistants and, if so, their qualifications.

Emergency Notification System

A systemic way to notify all parents and guardians of immediate announcements, warnings and notices, by our district, is now in place. Should an actual emergency occur district officials have a near instantaneous way to communicate with families in the district. Using the Global Connect System, the superintendent is able to record and send a voicemail message to parents/guardians letting them know if school is closed due to weather, if there is any type of emergency, or if students will be released early. A test broadcast message was issued to parents/guardians of elementary children this past September with an update on H1N1. This system spread the message within a matter of seconds and ushered in a new era of communication to keep you up-to-date.

A technologically friendly feature of the system involves this newsletter. Parents/guardians will also be able to have information/updates emailed to them. In an effort to go green, while saving taxpayers as much money as possible, our winter edition will be an e-edition.
