Community growth reflected in CPS K-12 solution

District moves forward with a May 9 special election

Starting in December 2021,

Columbus Public Schools began to have a conversation with the community regarding student growth and programming needs within our school district and how this impacts our facilities.

Our community has blessed us with beautiful elementary schools, a new high school, and a partially renovated middle school building that used to house high school students since 1960. In addition we have received a lot of support in our community for repurposing the old middle school (Kramer High School Site) into an early childhood

> > to about 36 students per grade level. Yes, we passed a bond issue in 2013 to help accommodate growth K-12, but our growth has outpaced our enrollment projections by 5 years.

This growth is due to an increase in housing development that includes single family homes, apartments, duplexes, townhomes, and renovations. Since 2016 over 700 new permits have been issued for just these projects.

So, what does that mean for the future? The study conducted for the City of Columbus anticipates our community will grow by over 2,500 residents in the next ten years leading up to 2030. Based on the 20% student enrollment growth we would expect our growth to be up to 500 students in the next ten years, reaching out past 2030. With this data we have been planning for the past 18 months to address this growth and have numerous conversations with our community and staff in regards to the facilities needed to meet this need.

Since December 2021

we have done sixteen presentations to our community either at live town hall meetings or via Facebook Live. We have also presented to our staff four times, written four articles in the Columbus Telegram, and have been live with Rilev at KLIR.

We have continued to reach out to our community for direction and permission to move forward in our research and to provide as much data and information as possible.

We started this process with four options for consideration and through our community conversations and feedback the CPS Board of Education has narrowed our scope of work to one option that involves a K-12 solution of 5 projects.

On March 9, the CPS Board of Education approved a facilities bond referendum for special election on May 9 in the amount of \$53.5 million, based on feedback through

WHAT IS A BOND?

A bond is a State-approved funding process for a set scope of projects.

When voters approve a bond proposal, the school district sells bonds in the authorized amount and uses the proceeds of the sale to pay for those projects in the bond proposal.

BONDS CAN BE USED FOR:

- Construction of new school buildings or additions to existing school buildings.
- Remodeling existing school buildings.
- Land purchases as well as site development and improvements.
- Purchase loose furnishing, equipment and some technology purchases.
- Athletic and physical education facility development and improvements.
- Playground development and improvements.

BOND CANNOT BE USED FOR:

- Salaries and service contracts.
- Portable classrooms for temporary use.
- Textbooks.

WHY NOW?

COMMUNITY AND DISTRICT GROWTH

- Columbus is the 4th fastest growing community in Nebraska at 8.67%[^] over ten years behind only Omaha, Lincoln and Kearney.
- Columbus is expected to grow by an additional 2,514 community members by 2030^.
- CPS has exceeded previous enrollment study expectations at 4 of the 7 schools.
- CPS has exceeded capacity at Lost Creek and CMS.
 We are within 10 students of capacity at Emerson,
 North Park, and West Park.
- Currently at CHS we have room for more students, however, career pathway programming and other special programming is limited by the number of classrooms available.
- Emerson, North Park and West Park students currently eat lunch in the gymnasium, limiting class time availability.
- Centennial's current dining space is too small to serve students meals efficiently.

The needs **ARE REAL** and are **NOT GOING AWAY.**

With consistent and rapid growth both in the community and school district we know that we need a plan to solve current and anticipated future space shortages.

WHAT IS THE PLAN?

THIS REFERENDUM WILL DO THIS BY:

- Constructing a new K-4 elementary school.
- Constructing additions and improvements to existing elementary school buildings to include dining areas at North Park and Centennial and new health and physical education facilities at Emerson and West Park.
- Constructing a classroom addition and remodeling of dining facilities at CMS.
- Renovating and improving existing district facilities for educational and operational use.
- Constructing a classroom addition and improvements to the existing high school.

survey results gathered at community meetings, online and by phone.

These projects include a new K-4 elementary school, classroom addition to the middle school, new and larger dining area at North Park and Centennial, new physical education facilities at Emerson and West Park, classroom additions at CHS, and renovating the current administration building into an alternative education center where students who need a smaller classroom setting to better meet their educational needs.

We believe that these projects will provide a K-12 solution that will help us to deal with current enrollment growth and the growth we expect to see in the next 10 years. The unknowns of what Columbus may look like in ten years doesn't really allow us to project out what enrollment will look like past 2033.

Columbus is a vibrant community that

continues to grow and meet the needs for future generations. When I look back to 2013 (ten years ago) when our community provided us a new high school, I would never have imagined we would grow by over 400 students. I also would not have imagined all of the great things going on in this community.

Since that time we have witnessed construction of a new health district, hospital expansion, a new YMCA, a new field house, a new library and cultural arts center, and many more projects that will keep this community thriving and help to recruit employees to our community. Columbus is a great place to live and raise a family. We at Columbus Public Schools want to ensure that our facilities are ready for the students and families in the future.

Our kids deserve the best, and so far our community has delivered. We look forward to the months ahead to see if our community will continue to help us plan for the future.









LOST CREEK **ELEMENTARY**
