TITLE I

- Title I funds are budgeted to pay Funds will be used to provide a tutoring program for students needing extra assistance by funding Title Paraprofessional staff, supplies to support learning interventions, and staff professional development related to these interventions.
- Additional Title I funding purchases materials and supplies to support improvement of instruction and Parental Involvement Activities.
- Title I funding is also available to provide equitable educationally related expenses for identified homeless students.

TITLE II-A AND TITLE IV

- All Title II-A and Title IV funds were transferred to Title I, an allowable action under federal guidelines, again this year to develop a more comprehensive program Title I program.
- The purpose of Title II, Part A is to increase the academic achievement of all students by helping schools and districts improve teacher and principal quality and effectiveness. Title II, Part A provides flexibility to use these funds creatively to address challenges to teacher quality and effectiveness, whether they concern teacher preparation and the qualifications of new teachers, recruitment and hiring, induction, targeted and embedded professional development, teacher retention, or the need for more capable principals and assistant principals to serve as effective school leaders.
- Title IV-A funds were first granted for the 2017-2018 school year, as part of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), from the federal government and were intend to supplement programs in one or more of these three areas; A well-rounded education, safe schools, or effective use of technology
