# FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

The 2015-16 school year is into the fall semester and all campuses have had a very smooth start. Enrollment in the district is holding steady around 2,700 students. The high school had reported a larger number of students than in recent years. Currently, there are 771 high school students.

The district contracted with a new food service provider. Sodexo is new to the district but not the area. Sodexo has been the food service provider for Panola College for a number of years now. We are very pleased with the quality of service and meals to begin their tenure.

Carthage ISD had a successful bond election this past spring. The three propositions totaled \$29,225,000. This bond, as well as other recent bonds, helps the district maximize the local tax dollars available to the district. There are a number of projects and renovations that will be funded by this bond. The main facilities addressed will be the addition of a new auditorium at the high school and a new fine arts center. The auditorium will seat 2040 people and should facilitate any school district activity as well as be available to host UIL competitions. It can also be utilized for a number of community activities.

As always, the beginning of school brings all sorts of extracurricular activities. The athletic teams, football, volleyball, and cross-country are all in full swing and are having excellent success. The band is marching the largest number of students on the field than it has in a long time.

We look forward to seeing you back at your school attending some of the many activities and supporting your Bulldogs!

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


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# Judy Sanford Emberton

## "ON TO STATE IN '68"

"Basketball is special. I play with friends who are like family," said Judy Sanford Emberton, class of 1968, as she discussed her team's recent gold-medal finish in the National Senior Games Association (formerly Senior Olympics) Tournament in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Former Carthage High School Bulldog, Emberton currently plays with the Hoopaholics, a group of 60 plus-year-old ladies from Louisiana who share her enthusiasm for the game. This was her team's sixth attempt to bring home the gold, and they were successful over San Diego in the finals.

Emberton's passion for basketball began as a freshman at Carthage High School when she and her teammates set an ambitious goal: On to State in '68! Those who shared her dream were Suzy Shell Trimble, LeeAnn Duckworth Worsham, and Charlotte Salter. Together, with Coach Sandra Walker, they led the first girls' basketball team from Carthage to Gregory Gym on the campus of the University of Texas in Austin to compete in the UIL state finals. Emberton and Judy Butler Kelley won all-state honors and that was the beginning of a long tradition of winning for the CHS girls' basketball teams.

That commitment to win continues today as Emberton, still wearing a #10 jersey, leads her team with her famous right and left hand hook shots. The game is slower, but still intense while played on half court with three-woman teams.

Since 2004, the Hoopaholics have earned a 199-26 win/loss record and have participated in qualifying tournaments in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas, and Tennessee and in national tournaments in California, Ohio, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, and Texas.

Emberton's teammates include Donna Shield from Bossier City; Mary Parson, a former All-American Redheads (the women's equivalent of the Harlem Globetrotters) from Mooringsport; Lynn Gamble (4 time college All-American and former Pine Tree ISD coach) and Marjorie Heath from Grand Cane. The coach, also from Grand Cane is Eva Gamble, a former teacher at Carthage High School.

The team practices once a week at LSUS with the 50-year-olds. "We prefer to play younger teams because it pushes us to work harder," said Emberton.

To catch these national champions in action, one should attend the Shreveport Tournament on November 7, 2015, at LSUS. The Hoopaholics will be sporting their spiffy purple and white uniforms and shiny gold medals.

# Dr. Berri O'Neal Gormley

Executive Director of the Universities Center at Dallas and Carthage High School Class of 1993 alumna, Dr. Berri O'Neal, earned her Associate's degree from Panola College in Communication Arts. Berri grew up on the Panola College campus, visiting as a young child in her father's classroom. Berri's father, Bill O'Neal, was a faculty member at Panola for over 30 years.

While a student at CHS, Berri performed as the Bulldog mascot Butch, and she participated in drama, student council, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and National Honor Society. She was a member of the UIL Academic and Literary Team where she won first place in Poetry. She was named a CHS Pacesetter and chosen to Who's Who.

Later, Berri attended Texas A&M University-Commerce, where she earned a Bachelor's degree in Radio/Television, a Master's degree in Theatre/Management and a Doctorate of Education in Secondary and Higher Education with a specialization in Supervision, Curriculum and Instruction.

For two decades, Berri has pursued her passion by working in higher education at Texas A&M University-Commerce and the University of North Texas in the areas of Student Services, Enrollment Management, Admissions, Registration and Orientation. Berri has served as the Executive Director for the State's oldest Multi-Institution Teaching Center, the Universities Center at Dallas, since 2005. Berri also has served as a consultant to numerous businesses in the region and speaks at state and national conferences on the topics of hiring, motivating and empowering effective employees in the workplace. She served as President of the Chi Omega Commerce Alumnae Chapter for five years and received the Chi Omega Distinguished Alumnae Award. Berri is married to Drew Gormley, and they reside in Valley Ranch with their three children, Addison, Nolan and Reagan.



# Mildred Faye Jefferson

After spending most of her childhood in the Walnut Grove Community, Mildred Faye Jefferson graduated from Carthage Colored High School, later known as Turner High School, in 1943 and continued her education at Texas College in Tyler and Tufts University in Medford, Massachusetts. In 1951 she became the first African-American woman to graduate from Harvard Medical School.

After graduating from Harvard, she became the first African-American to be a surgical intern at the prestigious Boston City Hospital and the first female admitted into the Boston Surgical Society.

Dr. Jefferson is best known for her fervent right-to-life position. In 1981, she testified before Congress as a result of the historic 1973 Supreme Court case, *Roe v. Wade*. She championed the efforts of the pro-life movement and distinguished herself as not only an accomplished physician by also as a crusader for the rights of the unborn child.

Dr. Jefferson passed away at her home in Cambridge, Massachusetts on October 15, 2010. A plaque has been placed in the Carthage Civic Center to insure that her accomplishments and inspiring story are not forgotten by present and future generations. A fund has been established to erect a bust of her in Anderson Park in downtown Carthage and to create a scholarship at Panola College.



# DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI 2015



## Mildred Maxine Neal Holeman CHS CLASS OF 1943

Mildred Maxine Neal Holeman, daughter of the late Allen

and the late Gracie Neal, graduated from Carthage High School in 1943. She was born in the Smart's Bottom Community and worked odd jobs through her Carthage school career with the help of many wonderful people and beloved teachers, leading to a six-month course at Draughon's Business College in Shreveport. From there, she began her Houston life of 70+ years where her brother Lee worked in the shipyards.

After taking some legal classes at South Texas College of Law, Holeman came to love the legal field and eventually earned a job as legal secretary to L.A. Kucera, a good man and an outstanding attorney, whose practice focused on real estate and probate matters. Through Kucera's law firm, Holeman learned about law as well as banking, finance and politics. She traveled to legal secretary conventions all over the world including Kenya, Johannesburg, and St. Petersburg, Russia, where she taught a seminar to other legal secretaries.

After Mr. Kucera passed away in 1987, Holeman used everything she had learned from him to develop a real estate business and an insurance business while also serving on many governing boards and continuing to help his clients and their families. Holeman's Real Estate business was so successful that multinational conglomerate holding company Berkshire Hathaway Home Services purchased it, leading her to comment, "I never thought I would have anything that the richest man in the world would want."

Holeman, having proclaimed herself as someone who never learned to say "no," served on the Shepherd Park Civic Club, as President of the Houston and Texas Associ-

ations of Legal Secretaries, and on the Board of the International Association of Legal Secretaries. She currently serves as Board Chairman of SPJST Lodge 88 in Houston and represents Houston and other lodges comprising that district as Bylaws Chairman and as their representative on the Board of the Czech Heritage Museum in Temple, Texas.

Holeman was married to her husband Jack for more than 50 years, until he passed away in 1997. Together, they "survived the U.S. navy absences and all the trauma, tears, tantrums, and triumphs of four strapping children": Billie Maxine Holeman Brinkley, Greg Holeman, Henry Holeman, and the late James Holeman. She says, "It was wonderful and it was very special. My Carthage roots [always] tugged and kept calling back, so we bought a house on Lake Murvaul and spent many happy times there with family and friends over the decades."

In her class memory book, she ends her thoughts saying, "Reflecting back on all this means I cannot stop this story without professing and witnessing the goodness of God in my life...He has been gracious to me at all times, whether I was accepting second-hand clothes in Carthage or washing the school cafeteria's towels at home and waiting for them to dry on the wood heater overnight to take back to school in return for a free lunch....No matter how many bad things befall us, we know that God is in charge, and through his son Jesus Christ we are healed...May God continue to bless you all."



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## Tommie Ritter Smith

### CHS CLASS OF 1965

Tommie Ritter Smith, daughter of the late Thomas and the late Gwendolyn Ritter, graduated from Carthage High School in 1965. She attended the Bish Mathis Institute of Business and Panola College, and she earned her degree in Institutes for Organizational Management from Southern Methodist University. Smith also has done post graduate work in Organizational Management and Basic Industrial Development through A&M University and Economic Development through the University of Oklahoma.

In 1976, Smith went to work at Panola College until 1980 when an opportunity opened for her to work for the Panola County Chamber of Commerce. She was eager to learn all she could to make Carthage and Panola County a special star on the Texas map.

In the early 90's, Smith's passion for tourism found an exciting new outlet. John Ritter, son of the late Tex Ritter, and his brother Tommy made the decision with their mother, Dorothy Ritter, to close the Tex Ritter Museum in Nashville. John Ritter called Smith to ask if she wanted the museum contents. After many hours of cleaning and cataloging the items and with



much help from community volunteers, the Tex Ritter Museum was opened on the upper floor of the Hawthorn-Clabaugh-Patterson House, the home of the Chamber of Commerce, on October 18, 1992.

In 1997, Smith made arrangements with Gaylord Enterprises



to open a Tex Ritter exhibit at the Grand Ole Opry Museum in Nashville. This successful venture opened the door for work to begin on Panola County's own Texas Country Music Hall of Fame, and in 1998 the first members were selected: Tex Ritter, Jim Reeves, Willie Nelson, Gene Autry, Cindy Walker, and Joe Allison. The event itself emceed by Ralph Emery was a huge success.

It did not take long to discover more space was needed for the Hall of Fame. So once again, Smith got busy seeking help for her vision of a 13,000 square foot facility. With the City of Carthage behind her, the vision became a reality, and the grand opening ceremony was held in August 2002, with the induction of Tanya Tucker, Gene Watson, and Nat Stuckey. To date, 38 country music artists have been inducted into the Texas Country Music Hall of Fame, and the facility has already needed and received an expansion. Smith has had much help along the way, but it has been her drive, passion, love, and loyalty to the City of Carthage and the citizens of Panola County that have made her dreams a reality.

Smith has been with the Panola County Chamber of Commerce for 35 years and is now the Chamber President. She also arranges and helps with many other community events and other local organizations in her hometown where she lives with her husband Bill. She is the proud mother of her children Daryl Delony, Cindy Delony, and the late Wesley Gates.



# Kurt L. Wall

## CHS CLASS OF 1983

Kurt L. Wall is a 1983 graduate of Carthage High

School. He grew up in the Delray Community, raised by his parents Travis and LaVerne Wall. After excelling academically and athletically at CHS, Wall was named to the Dean's List and Chancellor's List for academic achievement at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, Texas, where he was also a two-year letterman on the Southwest Conference Championship teams. Wall graduated TCU in 1987 with a B.S. in Education and was awarded the TCU Scholar-Athlete Award.

After one year of coaching and helping the basketball program at Coker College in Hartsville, South Carolina, to their first 20-win season, Wall accepted a permanent position in Washington D.C. on Congressman Joe Barton's staff, for whom he had volunteered his college senior year, as the first Congressional Anti-Drug Coordinator. He worked with federal, state, and local law enforcement officials to allocate funding for anti-drug programs, as well as developing strategies to prevent community drug abuse, which included speaking to legislative groups and civic organizations and participating in undercover drug purchases. Wall received special recognition from the DEA for his efforts.

One year later he was offered a Presidential appointment by President George H. W. Bush to work as a Special Assistant to Lauro Cavazos, U.S. Secretary of Education, for which he attended cabinet meetings and worked on policy development. Wall also traveled with the Secretary for speaking engagements with educational leaders throughout the nation.

After three years in D.C., Wall entered into law school at Louisiana State University and earned his law degree with a desire to pursue a career as a prosecutor. He accepted a position in the Assistant District Attorney's office in East Baton Rouge and Livingston parishes in 1994, where he prosecuted criminals for over 20 years. Although Wall had experience in many areas, he believes this is where his true career began.

In 2009, Wall was appointed to the position of Director of the Criminal Division of the Louisiana Attorney General's Office requiring him to manage a near 100-person team of investigators and prosecuting attorneys tasked with investigation of crimes throughout the State of Louisiana.

Wall is a member in good standing with the Texas and Louisiana State Bars, as well as the United States Fifth Circuit of Appeals. He and his wife Germaine, are the proud parents of Elissa, Kate, Erica, and Anna. They teach them the importance of community involvement with their many service positions. In 2014, Wall established a Carthage ISD scholarship in honor of his parents for their dedication in promoting education in the community and to show his appreciation for the community that he still refers to as his home.
