- Harbourton School District

## Snapshot 1955

- Enrollment: 1,200
- Schools: 6 - Central High, Agriculture Unit, Pennington Grammar, Pennington Primary (Academy Court), Titusville School, Harbourton School
- Superintendent: Dr. William J. Nunan
- Notables:
- District develops long-range planning committee
- "Harbourton School should have inside toilets"
- Brown v. BOE (1956)


## Snapshot 1965

- Enrollment: 3,101
- Schools: 5 -HE, BT, TG, CHS (TMS opens)
- Superintendent: Dr. William J. Nunan
- District Milestones: Regionalization
- Hopewell Township
- Pennington
- Hopewell Borough

The new district compasses more than 60 sq. miles.

- Other notables:
- BOE learns of proposed routing of I-95 through areas served by district.



## Snapshot 1975

- Enrollment: 3,542
- Schools: 5 -HE, BT, TG, TMS, CHS
- Superintendent: Dr. William J. Nunan
- Notable: BOE Resolution - Equal Educational Opportunity becomes district policy.
- Robinson vs. Cahill (Charges NJ's system for funding schools discriminates against poorer districts and creates disparities in education.)


## Snapshot 1985

- Enrollment: 2,353
- Schools: 5-HE, TG, BT, TMS, CHS
- Superintendent: Dr. William J. Nunan
- Notables: Long-Range Planning Committee: Most controversial issue - Class Size. Committee recommends: Grades K-2, 22 students, max of 25; Grades 3-12, 22 students, max of 27.
District Computer Hardware Includes: Apple IIe Series, Commodore 64' s, Pets \& Super Pets, IBM PC's on order.

- Enrollment: 2,933
- Schools: 5-BT, HE, TG, TMS, CHS
- Superintendent: Dr. David N. Thomas
- Notables: IDEA in effect, NJ CCCS, CHS Science Wing

## Our Charge...

- Review current enrollment data, census data and school / grade configurations.
- Provide the Board of Education with recommendations to address the shift in enrollment among our schools and in our district.


## Effective Teams Have Norms

- Govern individual behavior
- Facilitate the work
- Enable the group to accomplish its task
- Revisit norms regularly (if necessary) to incorporate new members and allow everyone to have a voice in the team procedures


## Norms

- Norms of a group help determine whether it functions as a high-performing team or becomes simply a loose collection of people working together
- Norms will only work if the group puts them into practice over and over again


## Establishing Norms

- Time
- When will we meet?
- Will we set a beginning and ending time?
- Will we start on time?
- Listening
- How will we encourage listening?
- How will we discourage interrupting?
- Confidentiality
- Will the meetings be open?
- Will what we say in the meetings be held in confidence?
-What can be said after the meeting?


## Establishing Norms

- Decision Making
- How will we make decisions?
- Will we reach decisions by consensus?
- How will we deal with conflicts?
- Participation
- How will we ensure everyone's participation?
- How will we deal with a person who misses meetings and/or regularly arrives late?


## Examples of Norms

We will maintain a positive tone at our meetings

We will not complain about a problem unless we can offer a solution

We will begin and end our meetings on time and stay fully engaged throughout each meeting

We will contribute equally to the workload on this team

We will listen respectfully and consider ideas from another's perspective
