

Dear Students, Faculty and Families,



Now for the annual Music Awards:

John Philip Sousa Band Award: Introduced in 1955 to honor the top student in the high school band, the John Philip Sousa Band Award® recognizes superior musicianship and outstanding dedication. It was created with the approval of Helen Sousa Albert and Priscilla Sousa, daughters of the famous composer and bandmaster. In addition, the recipient's name will be submitted to the directory of John Philip Sousa Band Award winners, as a lasting commemoration of their achievement, and is accessible by family, friends, colleges, etc.

The recipient of this award, throughout my short time with her, displayed the qualities of musicianship and musicality that are deserving of this reward. With her impressive ear and analytical skills, not to mention her playing ability, this student brought her love of music into the room every day. It was apparent that she truly connected with the music, and was always quick to aid me when asked. This year's recipient of the John Philip Sousa Band Award is *Margaret Stokes*.

Louis Armstrong Jazz Award: The Louis Armstrong Jazz Award® was inaugurated in 1974 with the consent of his widow shortly after this great jazz artist died in 1971. It honors the outstanding jazz musician at each high school.

There are a great number of Seniors graduating this year who make up the heart of the MCHS Jazz Ensemble, all deserving of their own honors. One student, however, truly embodied the spirit of Jazz in my year with them. There are many attributes that a true student of Jazz seeks to acquire; a good ear, a freedom of expression (through their instrument and in conversation), and a willingness to make mistakes (or as it is known at Maranacook "send it") are just a few of them. Intended for a student fully involved in their schools Music program, the award also represents leadership and motivation to create and share their craft with the community.

The recipient of this award is a student that, through her unabashed honesty, willingness to help, and motivation to perform and create, embodied the true nature of musicianship.

Knowing this student was going into Music Education, I gave this student a challenge: conduct a piece of their choosing for the Maranacook Chamber Ensemble.
