
You can classify triangles by the lengths of their sides and the measures of their angles.

All angles are less than 90°.




Equilateral

Right One right angle




Isosceles

One obtuse angle



Levi Strauss

What is Levi Strauss famous for inventing? If you said "blue jeans," you are correct! Levi Strauss' life story exemplifies the true American spirit! Hard work and determination have made him a well-known American icon and entrepreneur.

Levi Strauss was born in Buttenheim, Bavaria, on February 26, 1829. Eighteen years later, Strauss and his siblings immigrated to New York. Shortly thereafter, gold rush fever spread throughout the East. Levi saw this as an exciting and profitable opportunity to make his fortune. His plan entailed making tents and wagon covers, and selling supplies to the hundreds of miners who needed clothing and equipment. In January of 1853, Strauss became an American citizen and moved to San Francisco where he started a dry-goods business. The business flourished and Strauss became a familiar and highly respectable figure in the city by his midthirties. Strauss' down-to-earth management style made him extreme



thirties. Strauss' down-to-earth management style made him extremely popular with his employees. He insisted that his employees call him "Levi," and not Mr. Strauss.

Strauss had an uncanny sense for the clothing industry, and became a trendsetter. His nephew, Jacob Stern, was a talented tailor, and together, they used blue denim material and created a "new" style of pants. Demand skyrocketed for their bluedenim creations, called "waist overalls" (the old name for jeans). These pants transformed cotton cloth and metal rivets into rugged and durable work clothes for the miners. The sturdy denim softened with wear, making them comfortable for the miners in their close-to-the ground work. The metal rivets, placed at pocket seams and other stress-prone parts of the pants, made the clothing even more durable. Factories were soon built and mass production of the "waist overalls" soon became the most popular clothing in the world—blue jeans. Currently, Strauss' pants are sold in more than eighty countries throughout the world!

Throughout his life, Strauss maintained a deep sense of moral values and compassion for all people. These virtues were not altered by his incredible rise to


