Don't Let Head Lice Interfere with Your Child's Opportunity to Learn and Achieve in School

Missing school puts a child behind in learning.

It is very important you check your child's head weekly for signs of head lice, and that when you are notified that your child's head needs to be treated you begin to work immediately. Once you have started the treatment process, and combed out all nits (small eggs), your child is able to return to school. You will need to continue to comb out the nits and check your child's hair until it is all clear for 4-6 weeks.

Head lice are a small insect living on the human scalp and feed on blood. Lice do not jump, hop or fly; they are spread only by direct contact. Lice hatch from small eggs (nits) about every ten (10) days. A live louse matures and lays eggs every two (2) weeks. When nits are present, the lice have been on your child's hair for some time.

Remember, just about everyone can get lice at some point. Please be watchful and help your child as well as others with the above-referenced suggestion.

It's Cold and Flu Season in Snohomish County!

Colds and Flu are respiratory illnesses caused by viruses.

Our Immune Systems produce antibodies to fight the viruses that make us sick.

What is the difference between a cold and the flu?	COLD	FLU
How it starts	A cold comes on slowly. At first you may have a sore throat, then a stuffy nose, followed by a cough on the 4 th or 5 th day.	The flu hits hard. Symptoms like a high fever, body aches and headache will strike within a few hours.
Symptoms		
Tiredness/Fatigue	Mild	Moderate to severe, especially at onset of symptoms
Head and Body Aches and Pains	Not common; will be mild if present	Moderate to severe; headache in up to 80% of cases
Chills and Fever	Rarely above 101°F/38.5°C; more likely in children	60% will have chills; fever of 100°F/38°C or more for 3-4 days in up to 80% of cases; fever can be higher in children
Sore Throat	Yes, for a day or 2	sometimes
Stuffy Nose and Sneezing	Yes	Not usually
Cough	Yes-will often be a hacking, mucus- producing cough	Usually a dry, non-productive cough
Chest Discomfort	Mild to moderate	Can be severe

Monthly Bus Safety Tips Walking to the Bus Stop



- Walk young children to the bus stop or encourage children to walk in groups. There is safety in numbers and groups are easier for drivers to see.
- Practice good pedestrian behavior: walk on the sidewalk and if there is no sidewalk, stay out of the street. If walking in the street is necessary, walk single file, face traffic and stay as close to the edge of the road as possible.
- Stop and look left, right and then left again if you must cross the street. Do the same thing as driveways and alleys. Exaggerate your head turns and narrate your actions so your child knows you are looking left, right and left.
