A Year In Review

Maya Angelou once said, "You can't really know where you are going until you know where you have been." 2019 was a special year with JHHS celebrating 50 years of educational excellence. Many Cobra memories and accomplishments were made throughout 2019. Cobra family, let's take a stroll down memory lane and reflect on some of our highlights during 2019.

January-The Lady Cobras earned the 42nd Hiawatha Invitational Tournament Championship trophy with a 53-37 victory over Marysville.

February-The 1979 boys state championship team was honored on February 14. The Jackson Heights Forensics Team won the NEKL tournament for the third year in a row. Tanner Reed and Jessica Buck were crowned the 2019 King & Queen of Courts. The state paid for all juniors to take the ACT for the first time.

March-On March 2, the Lady Cobras became the 2019 sub-state basketball champions and earned the right to play in the Class 2A State Basketball tournament at FHSU.

April- Drew Holliday, Jodi White, Tanner Reed, Andrew Wege, and Alex Stirton placed 1st in the Forestry Division at the State Envirothon. FFA took Gold (1st Place) in the District Sweepstakes.

May-JHES was honored to receive the Shifting School Culture Character Recognition at the Kansas Schools of Character Recognition Program. Six Cobras qualified for state forensics with Faith Little earning 10th place overall in Humorous Solo Acting. The 50th class graduated from JHHS on May 19. Seventeen Cobra athletes qualified for 2019 State Track & Field, and brought home 15 medals from the state track meet.

June-The Jackson Heights FFA Alumni group held its 9th annual tractor drive starting in Soldier with 33 participants and serving 76 meals. Rose Thayer, Stars & Stripes Reporter, paid a visit to our infamous tunnel and missile building.

July- Bethany Kenworthy and Sarah Marshall, JCYC members, attended the National Community Anti-Drug

Collations of America Conference in Dallas, Texas. Jaclyn Higley, Brett Plattner, Audra Strube, Samantha Carson, Staci Fannin, and Jessica Rogers were introduced to Cobra Country as new staff members for the first time in the district newsletter.

August- Due to a new KSHSAA regulation, the high school Cobra football team had its annual scrimmage at JCN instead of at our annual fall pep rally. JHES unveiled "The Greatest School" theme and 3rd-6th grade classes began coding as a collaboration class. Dual credit Government class returned to JHHS, PBL World History was added to the course schedule, and a semester of computer science was added for 7th graders to enhance their technology skills.

September-JHHS celebrated its 50th anniversary with Cobra Alumni speaking to 7-12 students, elementary tunnel tours, an assembly, a dinner sponsored by Johnsonville, and a breakfast of champions.

October-Two after school programs started at JHES: Cobra Club for K-3 students and Robotics Club for 4th grade students. The Jackson Heights Honor Flight Hub embarked on Honor Flight 8 with 20 student guardians and 25 Veterans. Freshmen had the opportunity to take the Pre-ACT for the first time.

November-USD 335 unveiled the first district web App. Daniel Little finished 4th and Annie Allen finished 18th at state cross country competition with Class 2A All State Honors. Alyssa Harris and Paige Deneault were accepted into the northeast region district band and Zach Armstrong was accepted into the Northeast District Honor Choir. The Cobra football team earned the Sectional Championship title and the chance to play in a sub-state game at Centralia.

December-USD 335 earned the Kansas Can Star Recognition Copper Award for Academically Prepared for Postsecondary Success. Kylie Dohl became the third girl in JHHS history to reach 1000 career points as a Lady Cobra. Cobra Singers sang at the Circleville & Soldier Senior Citizen meeting at Soldier Hall.

From the Desk of the High School and Middle School Principal

We had a very productive 1st semester at Jackson Heights. As the students return to school for their 2nd semester, my message for our students it to make sure they stay on top of their classroom assignments. Missing assignments is the quickest way a student can fall behind in a class. Here are three tips that can help parents promote healthy study habits with their teens:

- 1. **Set a schedule:** Studying should be part of your student's daily routine, not something he or she tries to cram in the night before a test. Researchers say that students should divide out their study time over the course of the week, rather than letting due dates dictate their study time. Preparing for tests ahead of time can reduce anxiety, and finishing assignments ahead of schedule can be rewarding for students. Researchers recommend that parents and students write due dates and major deadlines on a calendar or planner to serve as a visual reminder.
- 2. Eliminate distractions: Cell phones, Facebook, and TV can quickly interrupt a productive study session. Eliminate the temptation to tune in, text, or update their status by shutting down any unnecessary electronics during scheduled study times. Since students often need a computer to complete assignments or type papers, parents should check in with their teens while they are studying.
- 3. **Break it up:** Maintaining focus during a two-hour study session may be challenging, so know your teen's limits and divide up study time.
- 1st Semester Grades-Grades are now final for semester one. Parents and students can check these final grades by

logging on to their PowerSchool account and clicking on "Grade History". The various tabs at the top will then allow them to go back to other years as well. If a paper copy of grades is required, it can be printed from this screen or by a school official upon request. High school students can request a personal copy of their transcript or an official copy at any time by clicking on "JHHS Transcript Request" under "Students" on the school's webpage.

Student Led Conferences-We are very excited about having Student Led Conferences again this semester. The students have been working on their IPS (Individual Plan of Study) document throughout the school year. At the conference, your student will share with you their career interests, learning styles, future plans, schedule of courses and goals. Students will be contacting you personally and inviting you to sign up for a time slot. The meeting will occur in your student's advisory teacher's classroom.

All students will be required to prepare a presentation for conferences and present it to an adult. We hope that you are able to attend but realize that there may be circumstances that prevent you from being here. In that case, please feel free to send an adult family member or friend. If that is not possible, we will find a staff member to listen to your student's presentation. The preparation and presentation skills that students gain from these conferences and the ownership it encourages them to have in their education are important to their future successes.

We are looking forward for a great 2^{nd} semester in Cobra country.






Bailey Hamilton


Andrew Wege

February is National Children's Dental Health Month!



The Jackson Heights School District will be participating in the Kansas Department of Health and Education (KDHE) oral screening program this year. Over a hundred thousand children from pre-K to Grade 12, are being screened annually across Kansas.

Dental hygienists will be volunteering their time to come to Jackson Heights on February 13, 2020 to perform an oral screening and optional fluoride varnish on all students. Parents/guardians will receive a letter in advance of the screenings, which will allow them to opt-out their student if they so desire.

The dental screening is a quick simple peek in the mouth and only involves a light, gloves, facemask and tongue depressor or disposable mirror. The screening is to look for obvious signs of dental disease. Any student noted to have concerns or to be in need of a dental exam will have their parents notified in writing of the recommendation for further dental care.

Thousands of students are screened annually across Kansas. School nurses send the aggregated data to the Bureau of Oral Health where it is included in their annual reports. Even if your student gets regular dental exams, this allows us to collect data on district school oral hygiene.

- Oral health care is a critical component of good health.
- Tooth decay is the most common chronic childhood disease, five times more common than asthma. Untreated tooth decay can lead to pain and suffering; affecting a child's ability to eat, speak, and focus in school, resulting in absenteeism and affecting the ability to learn.
- School screenings provides parents with information about their children's oral health and the importance of regular dental treatment.
- School screening data allows the state to identify areas with high levels of dental disease. Preventive interventions can be implemented in these targeted areas to improve the oral health of Kansas school children.

5 Tips for Turning a Snow Day into a Family Fun Day

Drag out the sleeping bags and spend the better part of the snowy morning just snuggling, telling stories and snacking on foods that are normally a nono in the morning.
- 2. **Frolic in the Snow** Midday is the best time to get out into fresh snow, as this is likely going to be the warmest part of the day.
