PURPOSE: Utilizing leadership, advocacy, and collaboration, school counselors promote student success, provide preventive services, and respond to identified student needs by implementing a comprehensive school counseling program that addresses academic, career, and personal/social development for all students.

The major functions of the school counselor job description incorporate the Pennsylvania State Board of Education priorities of High Student Performance, Healthy Students in Safe, Orderly and Caring Schools, Quality Teachers, Administrators and Staff, Strong Family, Community, and Business Support and Effective and Efficient Operation.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

1. MAJOR FUNCTION: DEVELOPMENT AND MANAGEMENT OF A COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL COUNSELING PROGRAM

- 1.1 Discusses the comprehensive school counseling program with the school administrator
- 1.2 Develops and maintains a written plan for effective delivery of the school counseling program base on the PA Comprehensive School Counseling Standard Course of Study and current individual school data.
- 1.3 Communicates the goals of the comprehensive school counseling program to education stakeholders.
- 1.4 Maintains current and appropriate resources for education stakeholders.
- 1.5 Uses the majority of time providing direct services through the Guidance Curriculum, Individual Student Planning and Preventive and Responsive Services and most remaining time in program management, system support and accountability. (National standards recommend 80% of time in Guidance Curriculum, Individual Student Planning and Preventive and Responsive Services and 20% of time in program management, system support and accountability.

2. MAJOR FUNCTION: DELIVERY OF A COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL COUNSELING PROGRAM

- 2.11 Assists teachers, parents/guardians and other stakeholders in interpreting and understanding student data.
- 2.12 Participates in professional development activities to improve knowledge and skills.
- 2.13 Uses available technology resources to enhance the school counseling program.

2.14 Adheres to laws, policies, procedures, and ethical standards of the school coounseling profession.

3. MAJOR FUNCTION: ACCOUNTABILITY

- 3.1 Conducts a yearly program audit to review extent of program implementation.
- 3.2 Collects and analyzes data to guide program direction and emphasis.
- 3.3 Measures results of the school counseling program activities and shares results as appropriate.
- 3.4 Monitors student academic performance, behavior and attendance and assists with appropriate interventions.

8. Annual Program Goals:

Elementary

Program Goal #1 Domain Academic Career Personal/Social By the end of the 18/19 school year, 75% of fourth graders will be able to identify two organizational strategies to be successful in the classroom.

Program Goal #2 Domain Academic Career Personal/Social By the end of the 18/19 school year, 75% of fifth grade students will be able to identify three skills/interests that they possess and at least one career connected to one of those skills/interests.

Program Goal #3 Domain Academic Career Personal/Social By the end of the 18/19 school year, 75% of 3rd grade students will be able to identify 3 ways to solve a conflict.

Middle School

Program Goal #1 Domain Academic Career Personal/Social By June 2019, the number of students who have missed more than 10 days of school will decrease by 10%.

Program Goal #2 Domain Academic Career Personal/Social By June 2019, the number of behavioral incidents will decrease by 10%.

Program Goal #3 Domain Academic Career Personal/Social By June 2019, 100% of 8th grade students will complete a draft of a 4-year plan and set post-secondary goals that reflect an identified career plan.

High School

Program Goal #1 Domain Academic Career Personal/Social Reduce the first-year retention rate among high school students by 10% by the end of the 18/19 school year.

Program Goal #2 Domain Academic Career Personal/Social All students will have developed a student career plan by the end of the 18/19 school year.

Program Goal #3 Domain Academic Career Personal/Social Discipline referral frequency will be reduced by 5% by the end of the 18/19 school year.

9. Individualized Academic/Career Plan Process and Portfolio:

In Kindergarten, each student will be set up with an individual Career Cruising login and password, to enable them to begin their academic and career plan that will follow them throughout their elementary, middle and high school career. Career Cruising is an online career exploration program that makes learning about careers fun. Career Cruising will survey career interests, career pathways, academic/personal/career goals, and create programs and majors that align to goals and career interests. Using the goals and career pathways identified throughout the years at the middle level, they will choose courses that align with their goals and career interest(s). That document will be saved in a shared repository with the high school counselor and administration who can view the document in live time with the student. Both the student and school counselor will have permissions to edit it at that time.

Each student's portfolio will continue to build throughout their educational career at Western Beaver School District. At the end of the student's senior year, a senior exit interview will be held and the student will share their Community Service requirements along with their post-secondary academic and career plan.

10. Stakeholder Engagement:

Students

Western Beaver students will identify with a K-12 career identity that continue to be reviewed and revisited. In 8th grade, students will begin to develop their Academic Plan and continue to update yearly through senior year as a component of their digital portfolio. Feedback will be gathered from students regarding program effectiveness through the use of surveys, attendance analysis of programming, and advocacy of student representatives on the Advisory Council. This feedback will inform future planning by the K-12 Guidance Program. Students will learn the relationships between school and work and be provided opportunities to learn about careers within the community and beyond.

Parents

Parents and guardians will be regularly informed of options and opportunities to aid them in supporting their students. Parents are recognized as integral components of student success. A conduit of information will be available through electronic and paper mailings, newsletters, Social Media and the Western Beaver website. This group of stakeholders will be encouraged to support the initiatives of the School Counseling Program in developing the ideals associated with planning for their student's future. Parents will be an essential component of the Advisory Council and provide feedback on Guidance Programming.

Educators

Educators which include administrators, school board members, and teachers will embrace and promote the effectiveness of the school counseling program.

Administrators will support the goals of the Guidance Curriculum. They will promote the Guidance program, be aware of the Comprehensive Guidance Plan, and help encourage teachers to utilize the Guidance Program in curriculum development. They will be an essential part of the Advisory Council.

School Board Members will support the goals of the Guidance Curriculum. This group of stakeholders recognizes and values the significance of the school counselor role. Additionally, they value the impact of an effective, essential Guidance program as it relates to promoting a positive school environment and culture. These stakeholders recognize the importance of the individual career development as it relates to the PA Future Ready Index. School Board members will also be invited to participate in the Advisory Council.

Teachers will partner with certified school counselors in content area to combine instruction and further growth of the students. They will be encouraged to become involved with program initiatives like Classroom Guidance lessons, mental health initiatives, and Career Development through Career Cruising. Teachers will work to connect their curriculum to college and career oriented lessons with the goal of supporting the endeavor to make their lessons more meaningful to students. Teachers will additionally serve on the Advisory Council.

• Business/Community

Businesses and Community representatives will be essential in providing students with Job Shadowing Opportunities, Internships, Co-Op for CTC students, Summer Work Initiatives, Career Fairs, Career Days, and on-the job training. The community at large recognizes the value of soft-skill development and will support a positive culture of school attendance. Key members of commerce within the community will be invited to participate in the Advisory Council.

• Post-Secondary

The higher education community recognizes the necessary partnership between high school and post-secondary education as both parties benefit from a comprehensive K-12 Curriculum Plan. Post-Secondary partners are connected to students by hosting office hours and placement testing for dual enrollment. They will participate in college workshops and programs geared towards promoting student success. Post-secondary institutions in the community will offer students Dual Enrollment options to

complete graduation requirements in the high school, and begin college enrollment. Representatives from a variety of post-secondary options including military, 2-year, or 4-year colleges/universities will meet with students in the fall to discuss their individual offerings and populations of students who attend. They will promote Open Houses and host trips to their campus to discuss programs with a diverse student population.
