2020-21 Budget News

0.73% Spending Increase

1.80% Tax Levy Increase

Dear South Lewis Central School District Resident:

The Board of Education recently adopted the 2020-21 budget. **This budget will have a 1.80% tax increase.** This minimal tax increase will represent the ninth consecutive year we have stayed below the Tax Cap. This is also our ninth consecutive year with a tax levy increase below 2%. Over this time period the average tax increase has been 1.63%. As always, the Board has worked hard to adopt a budget that is responsible to the taxpayer while providing strong programs, services, and opportunities for our students.

This year we will have two school district propositions on the ballot in May. The first is for the 2020-21 South Lewis overall school budget of \$26,453,524. The second is to finance the purchase of three 66-passenger school buses for a total maximum aggregate of \$356,485. In addition to these two propositions, we have two Board of Education seats that are to be elected at the Annual vote.

The 2020-21 budget was originally adopted by the Board of Education in March. However, when the COVID-19 pandemic was thrust upon us we received significant budget cuts from the State. Our initial State Aid increase for next year was set to be 1.85% or \$234,115. This was taken back by the State. The State also made a "Pandemic Adjustment" which further reduced our school aid by \$336,813. The latter reduction was then restored from one-time stimulus funding from the Federal Cares Act.

Furthermore, school districts are bracing for further reductions in State Aid. As part of the adopted State budget, the Governor has the authority to make mid-year cuts to education should State revenues fall short of expectations.

Due to these State Aid adjustments, we rescinded the originally approved budget and put forth a new budget that was \$338,000 less. Savings from building and department budgets, contractual obligations with BOCES and outside organizations, and the elimination of three vacant positions (two aides and one high school teacher) accounted for the revised budget. Even with these changes we have been able to maintain programs and opportunities for our students.

Lastly, due to the COVID-19 crisis the date for the Public Hearing and Annual Vote has been adjourned.

VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

Voters at a school election must have all of the following qualifications:

- A citizen of the United States
- At least eighteen (18) years of age
- A resident within the district for a period of at least thirty (30) days prior to the day of the vote

Mini-Renovation Project

Each year South Lewis CSD seeks to maximize State Aid in order to make the most of the District’s tax dollars. As such, South Lewis will include mini-renovation capital projects within the annual budget. Each mini-renovation project takes advantage of capital project aid from the State; and is part of a long-range strategy in which the building aid returned to the District in the following year will continue to fund additional mini-renovation projects as a regular part of the South Lewis budget. If this work was not completed as part of a capital project, there would be no funding and the District would have to incur the full cost.

In this year’s budget, the District is planning to renovate the physical and occupational therapy areas. The planned upgrade involves renovating the area that previously housed the guidance department for the high school. The proposed \$100,000 mini-renovation project will generate approximately \$85,000 in building aid for South Lewis which will go a long way in funding next year’s mini-renovation project.

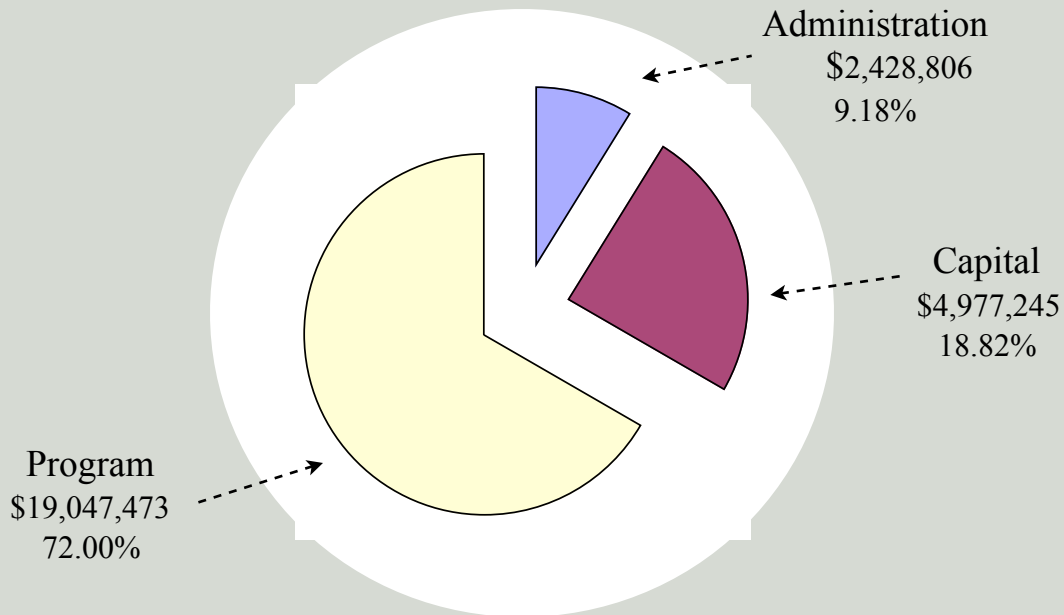

Proposed Component Budget



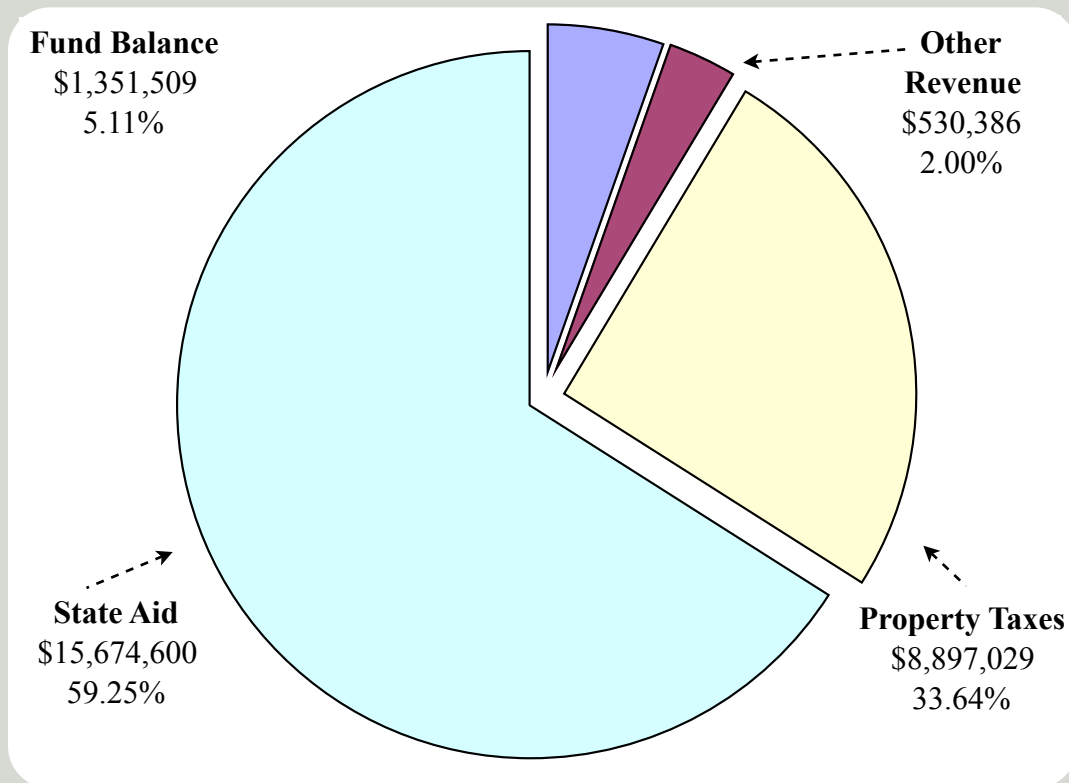

Levy or Rate?

People often confuse the words **tax levy** and **tax rate**. The levy is the amount of money the district needs to generate from the local taxpayer to meet its budget demands. We are projecting that the local levy will be \$8,897,029 (1.80% increase over last August's levy). We cannot state accurately what tax rate that levy will require until August.

Why? The tax rate required to yield the tax levy is dependent upon state-provided assessments, which are not completed until late summer. Please remember that the school district does not generate those rates. Therefore, though we can calculate a levy with some certainty, we can only estimate a rate.

If the budget is defeated, the School Board's options are to:

- ♦ Put the same budget up for vote a second time,
- ♦ Submit a revised budget to the voters, or
- ♦ Adopt a contingency budget and seek voter approval directly on non-contingent expenditures.



Qualifications

BOARD OF EDUCATION

- ◆ Must be able to read and write
- ◆ Must be a qualified voter of the district
- ◆ Must be and have been a resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before the election
- ◆ May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year
- ◆ May not be a current employee of the school board
- ◆ May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office

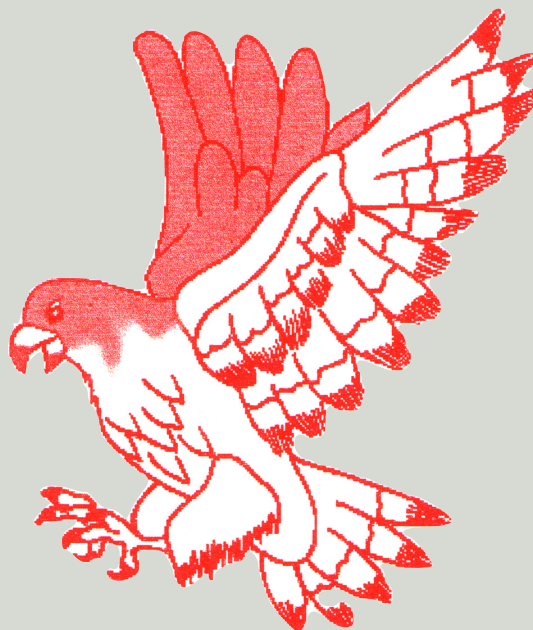


PROPOSITION #1

Resolved that the Board of Education of the South Lewis Central School District, Lewis County, New York, be authorized to levy the necessary tax for and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$26,453,524 for the purpose of the General Fund Budget, for the 2020-21 school year.

PROPOSITION #2

Resolved that the Board of Education of the South Lewis Central School District, Lewis County, New York, is hereby authorized to purchase three 66-passenger buses, for a total maximum aggregate cost not to exceed \$356,485.00 and that the sum of \$356,485.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary shall be raised by the levy of the tax upon the taxable property of said school district and collected in annual installments as provided by Section 416 of the Education Law and in anticipation of such tax, obligations of said school district shall be issued.

Universal Pre-Kindergarten Registration

South Lewis Central Schools

Deadline-June 1, 2020

All South Lewis Central School District students who turn four (4) years old on or before December 1, 2020 are eligible for Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) in September 2020. The school will provide transportation to and from school for all students. One classroom will be at Port Leyden Elementary and one classroom will be at Glenfield Elementary. Both programs will run from 8:20 a.m. – 11:55 a.m. If you are interested in registering your child for Universal Pre-Kindergarten, please contact Beth Schindler at Port Leyden at 315-348-2660 or Marcia McDonald at Glenfield at 315-348-2620. The registration deadline is June 1, 2020. If we have more students register than the spaces available, a lottery system will then be used to select students. Selection is not based on the order in which students register. 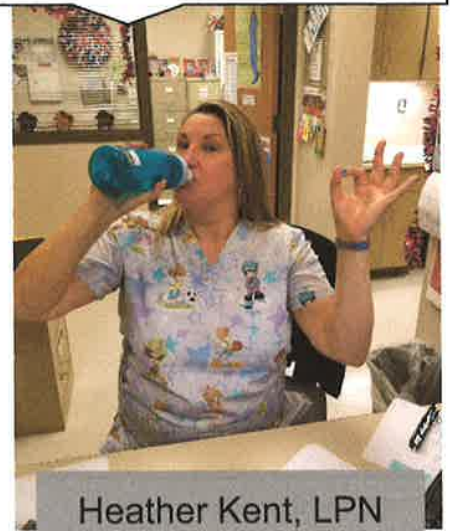

HIGH SCHOOL COUNSELING INFORMATION

As we write this, we are headed into our fourth week of emergency remote learning. We miss our students. By the time this article is published, we could, and hopefully will be in a different place. We do not know what tomorrow will bring educationally, emotionally, or physically. Uncertainty can create anxiety; however, it can also allow us to grow, learn, and challenge ourselves. We have provided information and positive support through our South Lewis School Counseling Facebook page and will continue to do so. We invite everyone to “Like” our page. Though uncertainty may fill our minds, the exceptional things that have come from this unprecedented situation abound.

Parents, students, educators, and school leaders have demonstrated their resilience, growth mindset, kindness, and creativity in so many ways, in spite of the potential for fear and anger. We have all experienced a range of emotions during this experience but our resilience stands out.

This is still a time to continue to look for and utilize our ***Sources of Strength***.

We have spent more time with our ***families*** (the families we are born into or the families we create), which for many, is a source of strength. Many families have taken advantage of the time to get to know each other, spend quality time together, and to really connect. Some families have experienced significant stress for a variety of reasons during this time. This stress can be one of the reasons we need to find other sources of strength. There are resources to help. Please reach out.

Many of us have utilized our ***mental health access*** to support us during this time. It is so important to seek support to maintain our mental health. One of South Lewis’ strengths is its commitment to the mental health of our students. We have the following resources: four school counselors who work with all students to provide personal support and make referrals, academic advisement, and college and career planning; a partnership with BOCES to provide two social workers who provide therapeutic support; a partnership with RKA to provide a behavioral health specialist, who provides therapeutic support; a student assistance counselor, who provides support for students impacted by drug and alcohol abuse; a space for a therapist from the Behavioral Health and Wellness Center to meet with our students; and a home and school community coordinator to work with families to connect them to available community resources. Continue to reach out and ask for help. We are here to support you.

So many of us have found ***healthy activities*** that may not have been part of our lives prior to this situation. We are spending more time outside and enjoying the beautiful area we live in. We acknowledge the loss that many feel without spring sports, normal schedules, clubs, social interactions, and a sense of routine. Keep moving, get outside, cook, eat healthy, facetime the people you love, use social media for positive interaction, and continue to find healthy activities that enhance your physical and mental health.

We all have to have faith that this will be alright and that we will come out of this situation stronger and better. Use your **spirituality** to find peace, have faith, and believe in the good, even in difficult situations. Practice gratitude for what we have instead of focusing on what we do not.

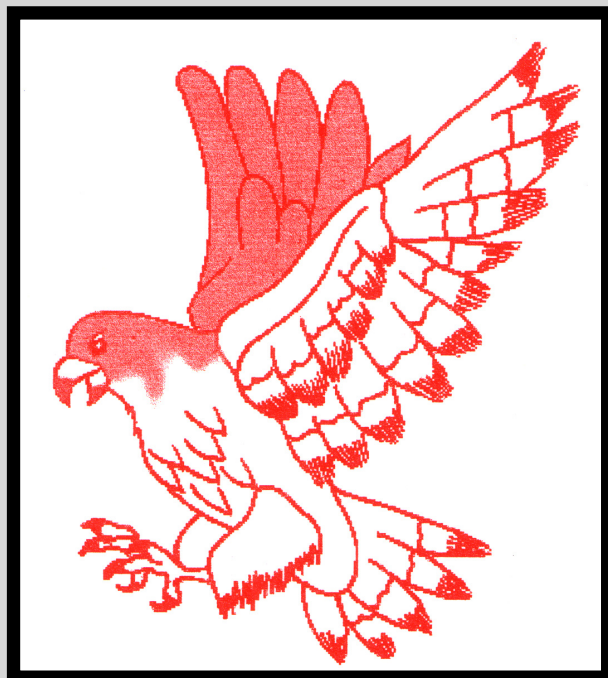

She has attended SL summer team camp since she was in 5th grade. During this past summer, she qualified for the USA HP Junior International Team. No drugs, alcohol, vaping or tobacco products allowed



No food or drink allowed (Unless you pick up after yourself. If you bring it on the bus, take it off the bus. If this privilege is abused, it will be eliminated)



No foul language or disrespectful behavior

The bus driver is in charge and will keep a log of incidents that occur. Riders will receive two warnings about disruptive behavior and/or violations of riding regulations. If there is a third infraction, the bus driver may ban the rider from the Old Forge route for the season.

Riders understand that participating in the LCPT summer transportation program to Old Forge is a privilege. Riders also understand that there may be consequences associated with negative behavior and rule violations.
