Works are chosen to represent diverse ethnic, racial, and social groups in historical, political, and economic contexts for what they reflect and reveal about the evolving American experience and character.

(RI.11-12.5) Analyze and evaluate the effectiveness of the structure an author uses in his/her exposition or argument, including whether the structure makes points clear, convincing, and engaging.5. (W.11-12.4) Produce clear and coherent writing in which the development, organization, and style are appropriate to task, purpose, and audience.
