

y the time this issue of Eagle Pride gets to your mailbox we should be very near the end of the first semester of the 2008-2009 school year. I will try to describe some of the initiatives we have been developing and give you a summary as to what will be happening at Bald Eagle Area over the next few years.

I am often asked what the folks who work at the school offices do in the summer. One of our most important tasks is finding quality teachers and



support staff members to fill the vacancies for the following year. As I often say, "one does not find eagles in a flock, but rather, eagles are found one at a time." So it is also with the new staff members in our Bald Eagle family - we took particular care to find the right match for each open spot, and these newest "eagles" truly are an outstanding group. They are featured in this issue and I ask that you please welcome them into our school community.

We had planned this year to move to Everyday Mathematics in grades 3 and 4. The positive results we saw from the program last year caused us to move ahead and change to the program in most elementary grades this year. Mrs. Robin Shaw, one of our experienced and dedicated elementary teachers, is on leave from her classroom duties this year to assist with the transition and to try to reduce some of the expected anxiety of students, teachers, and parents, too. Also in the Math area of our curriculum, we have been fortunate to obtain the services of Mrs. Tracy Boone, who is presently serving as a District Math Coach, and provides both support and instructional assistance to all of our teachers in the Math areas. We are thankful for the parent support we have received in this endeavor and the hard work and dedication our staff members have demonstrated while we are making this curricular change. It is always difficult, particularly when their children are completing homework, for parents to experience a new way of looking at educational programs. Everyday Mathematics has been no exception in causing temporary parental confusion!

Bald Eagle Area will continue to emphasize its bedrock belief that all students must learn to read to be successful in both school and life. We are fortunate to have three more elementary teachers attending Reading Recovery training this year, and are fortunate to have had Mrs. Betsy Dickey accept the Director of Reading assignment that was vacated by our long-time-readingeverything-professional, Mrs. Linda Donmoyer. Our elementary students have really gotten into reading for both fun and competition, as we are nearing the end of BEA Reading Superbowl III. It is truly amazing to see how much reading our students are doing, particularly during their free time on weekends and even voluntarily during recesses. If you have young readers in your house, I can assure you they would enjoy reading a few passages to you and would even enjoy it more if you would read to them. I recently saw a student walking down the hall with a book to her face, reading, and not particularly looking where she was going. We have truly developed some reading

We continue to move ahead with our renovation projects for the Bald Eagle Middle-High School and the Wingate Elementary School. We just recently received approval from the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) to begin the project as soon as we can come to agreement as to what the organization of the school will be when the project is completed. We are considering moving all District sixth graders to the Middle School, but that decision has not been finalized as of yet. There are still options to be decided concerning the roof, the heating and air conditioning systems, and the sizes of the rooms and gymnasium that will be added. The traffic pattern in front of the building is still an area that we want to improve upon, but have not decided on the best option.

Another one of the guestions I often hear is why we would be building on to our facility when our enrollment is decreasing. The answer is that while our overall enrollment will continue to decline for at least 5 more years, it should then begin to increase. As we evaluate the present project, we have to not only provide for the students and activities we presently have but need to fast forward to 2030, as PDE will only financially support a building project every 20 years. I suspect prekindergarten classes will be added in all of our elementary schools in the next few years, and we do not have enough gymnasium space to accommodate all of our programs now. If there is any way we can financially work the planned project into our present budgetary limitations, I think we would be short-sighted to not stretch ourselves to make that happen. Obviously, we will not know what will fit into our financial limitations until the actual bids are received, and we are still hoping that will happen by May 2009.

We have a lot to complete in our classrooms before the upcoming PSSA testing dates, and then even more to cover before graduation in June. Let's hope that Phil sees his shadow and that we can work together for the futures of all of our students over the next five months. It is an honor for me to be able to work with all of you.

### "Be Port Proud"



# will make for healthier students

This year, the Bald Eagle Area School District was pleased to offer students free influenza vaccines, provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Health. Our District was the only one in the area that participated in this free opportunity, which BEA hopes will lessen the absences and misery caused by contracting the flu.

Students were able to receive their vaccine during the school day and many parents were appreciative of the convenience of having it provided by the school nurses. There were 342 vaccines given at the elementary level and 70 at the high school level. Forms were sent home with the students, and immunizations were originally given on a first come, first serve basis, but eventually there were enough vaccines to fill every request.

Thanks to the help of the district health aide Ruth Rhodes, the program went very smoothly. Hopefully, the students at BEA will be healthier and school absences decreased thanks to this State Sponsored Program.



#### Social Studies Department at the BEA Middle/High School

"If you want to understand today, you have to search yesterday." ~Pearl Buck

The goal of Bald Eagle Area's seven social studies teachers is to not only have their students gain a love for history, government, and economics, but to also enable all of their students to become active participants in our democratic government. Our capable social studies staff, featured in this issue's Spotlight on BEA Family, constantly strives to provide engaging activities while meeting state standards.

One of the areas of interest is always on "what is happening now," in terms of local, state, and national government and, in many cases, how similar challenges have happened in the past and what possible solutions may be. A comparison of our present economic downturn gives our staff an excellent crucible to teach about the Great Depression, as well as economics and government. Our social studies staff continues to develop and adapt their presentations to make history come alive, not as an isolated event that happened a century ago, but to show engaging comparisons and possible causes of what we see happening today.

Our seventh graders begin their secondary social studies tour with the Lions Club International sponsored Quest program, which assists their transition to the Middle/High School and emphasizes student worth and, above all, tolerance. Next, they move back 2,500 years for a brief tour of ancient history and some required study of Pennsylvania history and government. Eighth grade social studies classes focus on United States History, with a study of world cultures usually following in ninth grade.

Beyond eighth grade, our students can choose from many electives, but must complete an additional three credits of social studies classes prior to graduation. Many of our students develop an interest in History, and take more classes than what are required.

Our social studies teachers lead their students in participation in Lock Haven University's Model United Nations, Mock Trial, Law Day and other available learning activities as they become available throughout the year. The Bald Eagle Area history teachers strive to make their classes both a learning experience where students can express themselves freely, and where they feel secure in sharing their ideas with both cooperative classmates and loving, nurturing teachers.


### **BEA** ACHIEVES **AYP** status — again!

Under No Child Left Behind, each state has developed and implemented measurements for determining whether its schools and local educational agencies (LEAs) are making adequate yearly progress (AYP). AYP is an individual state's measure of progress toward the goal of 100 percent of students achieving the state academic standards in at least reading/language arts and math. It sets the minimum level of proficiency that the state, its school districts, and schools must achieve each year on annual tests and related academic indicators.





### "What color are you?"

he "Big Idea" unifying Mrs. Cox's 8th grade art making projects this semester is "Art connects our individual selves to larger social, demographic, and historical communities." After creating Participation Posters which were intended to attract interest in student group "communities," and pinwheels to convey personal interpretations of peace and participation in the global peace-building process, students created monochromatic self-portraits for their third art making project this school year.

Students explored the significance of the individual as part of a social community and explored symbolic use of color: first through a warm-up activity which required students to define themselves in terms of color (NOT as in literal skin color, but in terms of symbolic color...) and to explain their selection. They explored many art concepts as well as geography concepts in their art making. Student used digital photography, Photoshop technology, and basic drawing and mapping skills in the art making process.

Mrs. Cox said, "This project was very rewarding for both me as a teacher and for my students. At the beginning of the year, I overheard a few students comment about how they "weren't good at Art," and I sensed their apprehension about their abilities. As the project developed, I became a privileged witness to their satisfaction and pleasure when they started to see their artwork evolve into something they proudly claimed as their own. # Mobile Ag-Ed Science Lab visits Wingate Elementary

Where does our food come from? It may sound like a simple question, but some children may answer the grocery store or a fast-food restaurant. Students don't always make the connection with agriculture – Pennsylvania's number one industry.

Agriculture impacts many aspects of our lives every day and the Centre County Commissioners, Jon Eich, Steve Dershem and Rich Rogers, recognized the value of educating students by aiding in the financial support (along with funds raised by the Centre County Farm Bureau) to bring the Mobile Ag-Ed Science Lab to the Wingate Elementary School for a week. A thirty-two foot long trailer complete with heating and air conditioning, the mobile lab contains 12 work stations, and each station provides space for 2-3 students to complete hands-on experiments. The students work cooperatively to solve a problem as they form a hypothesis, collect data and draw conclusions.

According to Elementary School Principal James Orichosky, over 450 students had the opportunity to participate in the lab, investigating and doing hands-on projects. Mr. Orichosky said that he was very impressed with how smoothly everything went and how the credited teachers with the lab presented the students an informative and educational class. The science curriculum taught meets Pennsylvania Department of Education Science & Technology and Environment & Ecology Standards, and is endorsed by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture.

Orichosky said, "The lab was an outstanding opportunity for Wingate students to get hands-on experience learning about farming and all of the things that go into agriculture. Pennsylvania's number one industry is farming and the students now have a broader understanding of certain aspects of it. We are so thankful to the Centre County Farm Bureau, as well as to the Centre County Commissioners for providing the funding for the lab."
