

Projections Update (2017–2019): Projecting an operating surplus, including \$549,057 in fiscal year 2017.




Planning for the Future (2018–2021): Solid fiscal planning + efficiency = five-year business plan that supports the Permanent Improvement Levy work.



Maintenance Business Plan: Designed to provide a roadmap and budget to keep our buildings, technology, and grounds up-to-date, relevant, and safe.


Historical Information - Days of Cash Available - Fiscal Year-End



GRADUATION

District Goal: Achieve a 96% Graduation Rate and Annually Increase On-Campus College Credit Offerings and Career Technical Certificates by 25%

Senior Stats (cohort of students graduating 2017):

- Over 50% of seniors in our building graduated with at least 3 college credit hours
- 19 students earned 15 hours or more (equivalent to a semester of college)
- 7 students earned 27 college credits or more (equivalent to a year of college)
- Top student earned 43 college credit hours never having to leave our campus

Dual enrollment numbers overall for the 2016-2017 school year:

- 124/273 (45%) high school students were involved in the CCP program on our campus
- \oplus 17/35 (49%) juniors, 43/96 (45%) sophomores, and 36/92 (39%) of freshmen enrolled in at least one CCP course
- 21 courses were available in all
