For students earning a qualifying score of 3 or 4 on AP exams, they will receive college credits for their achievements and in many instances skip the equivalent course in college. DPHS went from 18 students with qualifying scores of 3 or 4 in 2014-2015 to 43 such scores in 2015-2016. Additionally, the stu-

dents performed higher than the U.S. national average on the exams.

York and her staff recognize that the students' achievements emanate from a strong drive to succeed, as well as tremendous guidance from their teachers. Prior to last year, DPHS hadn't seen more than 18 students place higher than a 3 or a 4 on AP exams in a single year. But the huge spike to 43 scores indicates to the staff that the program has great leadership at all levels – from students

who want to learn and teachers who strive to maximize their education.
