New Business Education Building Becomes A Reality

The opening of the new business education building has brought many new developments in the way of courses to PHS. This building has four classrooms and two business teachers, Mrs. Ruth Riddle and Mr. Gary Martin. Also, CO-OP is located there, taught by Mr. Paul Arnn. The courses range from basic typing courses to advanced computerized courses. The new courses in the field of business at PHS are Business Data Processing, Exploratory Business, Office Technology Laboratory and Computerized Accounting.

To help you understand more about these courses, here is some information about them.


Business Data Processing I/II is a one-year introductory course in data processing with emphasis on computer literacy. Students use the basic language to create some simple programs for business application. Students should have had at least one year of typing before taking this course.

Office Technology Laboratory is a one-year, two hour block course designed to prove opportunities for students to develop advanced office skills. This course also requires having had typing one year.

Exploratory Business is a one year course for students interested in exploring the many opportunities of business. Some of these areas are computer literacy, keyboarding, management and sales, and secretarial and clerical. Typing is not required before taking exploratory business.

Computerized Accounting is a one year course putting emphasis on basic accounting principles as they relate to both manual and computerized financial systems. Typing is required to take this course.

To put in the curriculum the new computerized courses, new computers were necessary. There are 26 IBM XT computers in the computer room and 4 in the OTL laboratory.
