"It was really big," Rachel Rose said. Rachel is a senior. She said that she enjoyed making these "wonderful memo-


ries" which she will carry with her after she graduates.





Romine places 5th in state FBLA contest




Finally, the 104 students on the PHS first-semester honor roll received a certificate for achievement of excellence or above average academic success.
