My family and I recently sat in a cool dark theater to view the latest *Pirates of the Caribbean* movie. At the end, I waited for the credits to pass in hopes of catching a glimpse of that "last clip" movies are so famous for these days. Here's a tip...there is a clip at the end but the credits are extremely

long! While I sat there watching names roll by I realized that I didn't have a clue what most of those people do. I did come to the conclusion, however, that they must all play an integral part in making that magic and that it takes quite a few people to make a movie happen.

Schools are a lot like that. There is an entire crew behind the scenes putting it altogether so that the stars (students) can shine. We build the set, prepare the script, finance the operation, and help the stars "learn their lines".

Last summer, I included a column in the Back-to-School issue of the Selkirk Success entitled, *While You Were Out...* The article identified the "behind the scenes" activities that continue through the summer while students are enjoying a vacation and in light of my recent revelation about real "crew" behind Capt. Jack, it seems appropriate to make this an annual tradition.

So, here's a few of the things we've been up to this summer...while you were out.

Although the doors closed briefly on the classrooms in June, they quickly opened again to accommodate summer cleaning, athletic programs, summer WASL programs, and community use.

The rumble of small machinery, the thud of boxes jostling, and the shuffling of paperwork are just a few of the projects that occupied the minds and bodies of

the summer staff.

The moving and cleaning activities described on the front page of this issue started the first day of summer break and continue even as I write this article. By mid-August, the custodial crew should be back to routine cleaning as fall sports practices start for high school football and volleyball, teachers begin returning to their classrooms, and a variety of open houses, registrations, and orientations are planned.

Teachers, too, have been busy with workshops in reading, writing, and math areas. One teacher participated in the scoring of the 7th grade Writing WASL and is preparing to share the tips she learned with other staff when school begins. Four teachers attended five-day training on the use of Springboard curriculum materials to enhance our reading programs in grades 6-12.

One teacher received a scholarship to attend a national Advanced Placement conference and is preparing to use her new training in the district's first-ever Advanced Placement English classes for juniors and seniors. Two teachers are preparing for National Board Certification.

This summer, we also offered WASL preparation classes for students who will retake a portion of the WASL in August. Students brushing up on their math skills attended 32 hours of math class and in writing, the student worked one-to-one with a teacher for eight hours before retaking the test. The state-wide schedule for retakes is August 7-10 and Selkirk opted to administer the tests so that our students would not be unnecessarily disadvantaged by the requirement of traveling to another district. Retake results will be available in October.

Administrative staff worked hard to develop a balanced budget for 2006-07 (see the article on page 3) which the board of directors adopted during their regular July 17 meeting. We continue to finalize the current year's budget and complete the necessary paperwork to

secure funding from the State for next year.

Summer staff pulled together resources and articles for this issue of the Selkirk Success including information that the district must provide annually to parents and community members. Please read the articles closely and don't hesitate to call if you have questions.

Staff are reviewing as much preliminary WASL information that OSPI provides in preparation to analyze our district's WASL scores for all grades 3-8 and the official tenth grade results which will be released in September. You can access the district's information (not individual student reports) on the following website: <http://reportcard.ospi.k12.wa.us/>.

Simply choose "Selkirk School District" from the pull-down menu and then click on the "GO" button. You'll find a wealth of information on our district including WASL test scores, demographics, Adequate Yearly Progress information, and much more. "Compare My School" is a tool in the right corner of the webpage that allows you to compare our schools with two other districts of your choice. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction's office created the website to help districts share annual report information with their communities. If you would like more information on Selkirk or have questions regarding the information on the website, please stop by, email, or call.

I am reminded by the calendar on the wall that we have just crossed the mid-point in summer and by the time this issue reaches your mailbox, an entire month of summer vacation will remain. Make sure to spend some relaxing time with your family in August and if you decide to catch a good movie together, check out those credits!

Meanwhile, we'll just keep working on those projects that we started behind the scenes...while you were out.

Becky has given so much to our Selkirk community over the years that it is difficult to list all of the ways. In a presentation speech in front of the Selkirk Junior/Senior High School student body, the question was posed to the students: "Do you remember how much effort it took to write even one sentence as a kindergartner? It was hard to form the letters and you had difficulty spelling. A kindergartner has to be pretty motivated to get TWO sentences on paper." While the students seemed to nod their acknowledgement of the effort it takes someone just learning to write to form letters, Superintendent Nancy Lotze shared the two sentences from a kindergartner who handwrote a nomination for Becky Larson: "I want Mrs. Larson because she takes us outside to play fun games. She finds good ways to use our energy."

## TRANSPORTATION

I hope everyone is having a safe and enjoyable summer vacation. With the closure of the primary school in Ione there will not be a bus stop at that location anymore.

**New Bus Stops:** We have four designated stops in the town of Ione for next year. The new stops will shorten the walking distance for most students. Students will also not have to cross the main highway or railroad tracks to board a bus.

The new stops are as follows:

1. **Central and Blackwell** (community center/Ione Public Library)
2. **Central and Houghton** (City Hall/old library)
3. **Main and 1st Ave**
4. **N 7th Avenue and Houghton**

Students on 8th Ave. will be picked up by buses as they run their regular route. Please choose a bus stop and have your child stay at that stop for the rest of the school year. This will ensure everyone at that stop is accounted for on a daily basis and aids in accounting for passengers during Ridership Week which is the first week of October.

All other bus routes will continue to be the same as they were last year. We will start the year off running the same bus times and depending on which students have moved in or out of the area, times may change after the first week of school. Please remember to have your child at the bus stop at least 10 minutes before the scheduled time the bus will arrive. Both Andy Anderson and a bus driver will be at the open house for all Selkirk Elementary students on September 5th from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. The transportation staff at Selkirk is looking forward to another safe year of transporting your students to and from school.

## 2006-07 BUDGET NOTES

This summer, the Selkirk School District developed a \$3.9 million budget for the 2006-07 school year that projects adding \$912 to the operating capital reserves at the end of next school year. The budget directs resources toward learning opportunities for students and includes

new funding from a Gear-Up grant, a Rural Advanced Placement Initiative grant, and state-designated Promoting Academic Success (PAS) funds.

Eliminating duplicated expenses through consolidation of the two elementary schools has allowed us to maintain our current level of programming and delayed the deeper cuts that would have been necessary based on our declining student enrollment.

Area schools have all experienced a decline in enrollment over the past 10 years. Selkirk School District expects to graduate a class of 45 seniors in 2007 but anticipates kindergarten enrollment in the low 20's. As student enrollment translates to dollars in education funding, the district is again expecting another challenging budget year for 2007-08.

Another obstacle in Selkirk's budgeting strategy was a loss of over \$53,000 in anticipated State-matching funds. The district ran a Maintenance and Operations levy in February with projected matching funds from the state of \$227,828. However, as the assessor's final property evaluation of the community was sent to the State in March, the district was notified that they would receive less than \$174,000 for 2006-07 and \$153,000 in 2007-08. Those unanticipated losses absorbed a good chunk of our savings from the consolidation effort. The district has always qualified for the maximum match amount, but the incredible increase in property values compared to the rest of the State decreased the match considerably.

The 2006-07 budget also maintains the Selkirk School District's commitment to early intervention and small elementary class-size with classes fewer than 14 students in K-1 and fewer than 25 in grades 2-6.

The budget includes strong programming for students and accounts for levy expenditures as we advertised to the public during February's Maintenance and Operations Levy. Selkirk School District maintains the highest pass rate in the county for the tenth grade WASL and board of directors will continue focusing resources on creating a quality education for students.

## PUBLIC PARTICIPATION INVITED

Annually, the Selkirk School District applies for Special Education, Title 1, Learning Assistance Program, and Vocational funding. All parents, families, and interested parties are invited to participate in the planning for these programs through annual surveys, school advisory council meetings, or by sending your input directly to the superintendent at the address on page 2.

So the next time you see a survey from school, please take a moment to give us input. You may also contact the building principals for dates and times of this year's advisory council meetings.

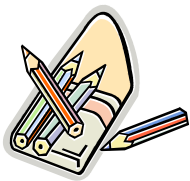

## Selkirk School District Dress Code 2006-2007

These are the most common dress code concerns. Please refer to the school district policy (3224) for complete details. The best advice for students and parents concerning school attire is, if you are in doubt, do not wear the item to school.

Prohibited clothing includes, but is not limited to:

1. Short skirts, including skorts. These must be at least to the length of the end of hand when arm is placed in rest position along the outer leg.
2. Short shorts. Inseam must be a minimum of five inches in length.
3. Dangling belts.
4. Spaghetti straps, strapless or backless tops or dresses.
5. Any clothing that reveals the abdomen or underwear.
6. Stocking hats or beanies – those styles or colors associated with or similar to gang attire. All hats or beanies will be worn above the eyebrows. Students may be required to remove any style of hat or beanie to comply with classroom rules.
7. Shirts of the tank top style that have narrow straps over the shoulders or plunge down in the back, front or under the arms. This includes the men's white t-shirt style garment.
8. Tags or bandannas – those styles and colors associated with or similar to gang attire.
9. Clothing, jewelry items with statement, messages or pictures referring to alcohol, tobacco, drugs, sexual activity, violent behavior or other offensive material.

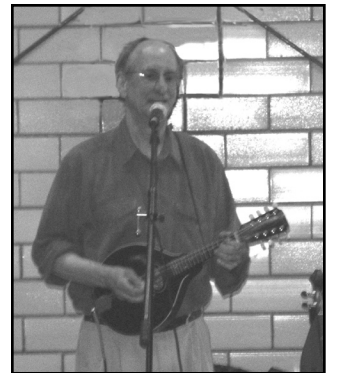

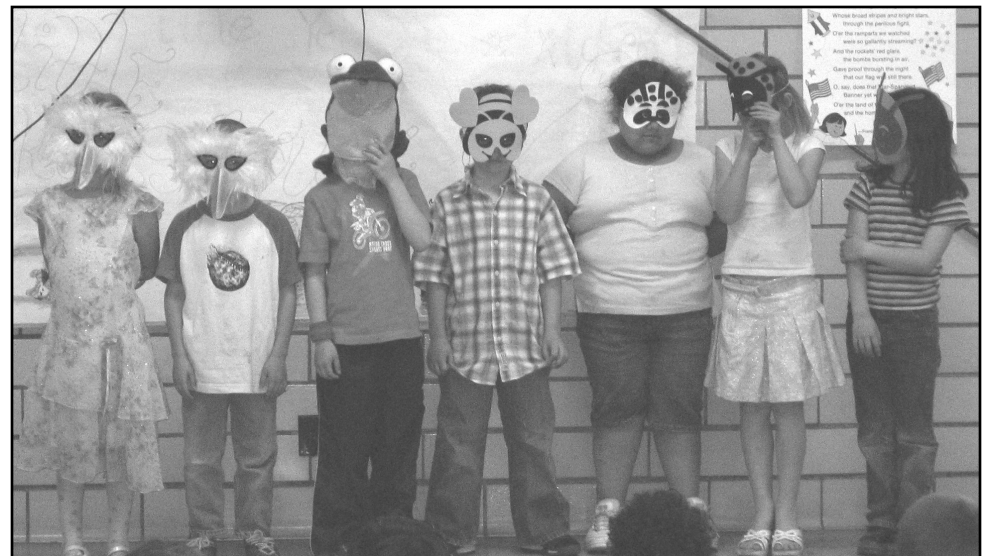
### Elementary Open House

## Poison Prevention Tips

Every year, more than 72,600 children ages 5 and under visit the emergency room for unintentional poisoning. About 40% will be poisoned by prescription drugs and other medicines. How can I tell if my child has been poisoned?

The child may vomit or become drowsy. You may find some of the substance around the child's

mouth or on his or her teeth. There may be burns on the lips or mouth, or you may be able to smell the product on the child's breath. Sometimes there may be no symptoms right away.

If you suspect poisoning and a child is choking, collapses, can't breathe or is having a seizure, call 911. Otherwise, take the product to the phone and call the poison control hotline, **1-800-222-1222**.

Tell the operator:

1. The child's age and weight, along with any health conditions he or she may have.
2. Whether the substance was swallowed, inhaled or splashed into the eyes or onto the skin.
3. How long ago it happened and whether the child has vomited.
4. Your location and how long it would take you to get to a hospital.

Follow the operator's instruction. Do not make the child vomit or give him anything unless directed by the poison control center or a doctor.

Keep activated charcoal on hand, to be used only on the advice of a poison control center or a physician. Ipecac syrup should no longer be used at home.

Poison control centers offer fast, free, confidential help. Most poisonings are resolved over the phone. The number works from anywhere in the United States 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

## Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis: What you Need to Know

Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis are serious diseases caused by bacteria. Tetanus enters the body through cuts or wounds but Diphtheria and Pertussis are spread from person to person.

Diphtheria causes a thick covering in the back of the throat. It can lead to breathing problems, paralysis and heart failure. Tetanus or 'Lockjaw' causes painful tightening of the muscles, often all over the body. It can lead to 'locking' of the jaw so the victim can not open his mouth or swallow. Pertussis or whooping cough causes coughing spells so bad that it is hard for infants to eat, drink or breathe. These spells can last for weeks leading to pneumonia, seizures, brain damage and death. The DTaP vaccine given through infancy and early childhood can help prevent these diseases and most children who get their vaccinations will be protected through childhood. If we stopped vaccinating, many more children would get these diseases. DTaP should not be given to anyone over age seven. Older children and adults get protection from a booster shot called Td (Tetanus/Diphtheria). There is now a newly licensed vaccine for adolescents which includes Pertussis (Whooping Cough). The acronym is Tdap. The recommendation is for:

- 1) adolescents 11 and 12 years of age in place of Td booster
- 2) adolescents 13 through 18 who missed the 11 to 12 year dose of Td
- 3) adolescents 11 through 18 who have had >5 years since their last Td vaccine

A booster Td should be given every ten years. Gardeners and those who work outdoors a great deal should be sure their tetanus shots are up to date. Check with your doctor!!!

## Student Accident Coverage

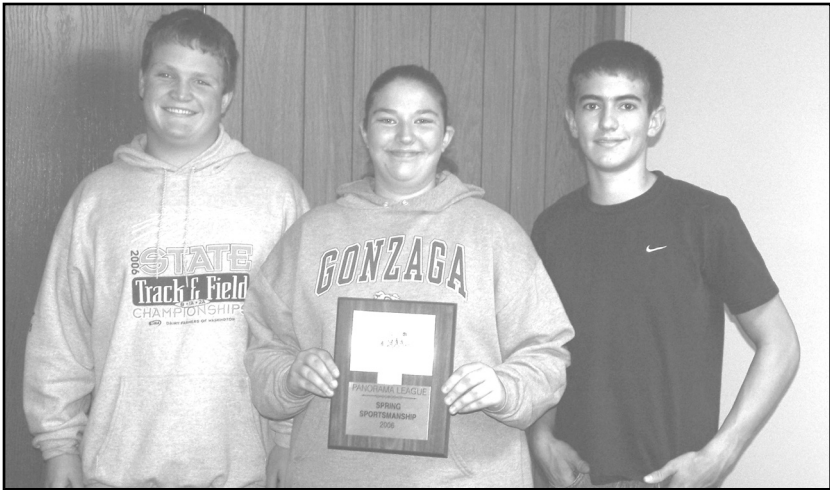

No Child Left Behind Ensures Your Right to Know

No Child Left Behind (NCLB) places an emphasis on parents’ right to know about the professional qualifications of their child’s classroom teachers. Parents have the right to request the following information about the instructional staff working with their child:

1. Has the teacher met state certification for the grades and subjects that he or she is teaching?
2. Is the teacher working with an emergency or conditional certificate?
3. What was the baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certification or degree held?
4. What are the qualifications of the para educators working with the child?

In addition, all Title 1 schools must notify parents individually when their child has been assigned to or has been taught for four or more by a teacher who does not meet NCLB highly qualified requirements. Selkirk Elementary School operates a Title 1 school-wide program.

All Selkirk School District K-12 teachers and paraeducators currently meet the highly qualified definitions set by No Child Left Behind (NCLB). Two non-credit requirements:

- Culminating Project - Each student shall complete a culminating project for graduation. (Completed through Senior Careers Class)
- High School + Education Plan - Students shall have an education plan for their high school experience, including what they expect to do the year following graduation. (Started in 8<sup>th</sup> grade and finished in Senior Careers)

What is the new graduation requirement for 2008?

All Washington public school students who graduate from high school in 2008 and beyond must Earn a Certificate of Academic Achievement or Certificate of Individual Achievement: Students earn a Certificate of Academic Achievement by meeting standard (Level 3 or higher) on the 10th-grade Washington Assessment of Student Learning (WASL) in reading, writing and math or on a state-approved alternative. The Certificate of Individual Achievement allows students in special education programs who are not able to meet standards on the 10th-grade WASL to fulfill the requirement. Students earn a Certificate of Individual Achievement by earning a Level 2 on the 10th-grade WASL, passing a WASL designed for a different grade level or demonstrating their skills through a portfolio.

Why was the Class of 2008 chosen to be the first class?

The Class of 2008 was chosen because it is the first class to be educated with the state’s learning standards since kindergarten. The WASL tests student learning of the state standards.

What changes occur with the Class of 2010?

In order to earn a Certificate of Academic Achievement/ Certificate of Individual Achievement, students will need to pass the science WASL or some alternative. All other graduation requirements remain the same.

How many other states require students to pass a test to graduate from high school?

Twenty-six states, including Washington, have or will soon have some kind of exit exam requirement that students must meet to graduate.

NOTIFICATION OF RIGHTS UNDER  
THE FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)  
for Elementary and Secondary Schools

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age (“eligible students”) certain rights with respect to the student’s education records. These rights are:

- (1) The right to inspect and review the student’s education records within 45 days of the day the School receives a request for access.  
Parents or eligible students should submit to the School principal [or appropriate school official] a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The School official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
- (2) The right to request the amendment of the student’s education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate or misleading.  
Parents or eligible students may ask the School to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the School principal [or appropriate official], clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading.  
If the School decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the School will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.
- (3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student’s education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.  
One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the School as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the School has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.  
A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.  
[Optional] Upon request, the School discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.  
[NOTE: FERPA requires a school district to make a reasonable attempt to notify the parent or eligible student of the records request unless it states in its annual notification that it intends to forward records on request.]
- (4) The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the School to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:

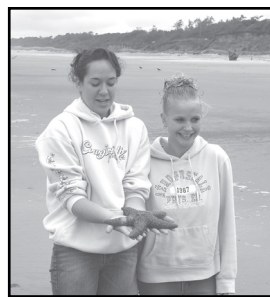
\*State Law Qualification: Although FERPA allows 45 days to honor a request, the state policy records law requires an appropriate response to a “public records” request within five business days. RCW 42.17.320  
NOTE: In addition, an institution may want to include its directory information public notice, as required by §99.37 of the regulations, with its annual notification of rights under FERPA.



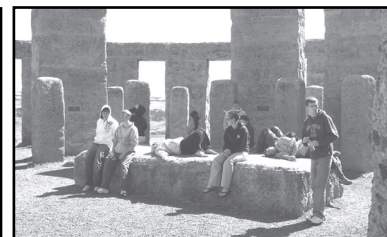
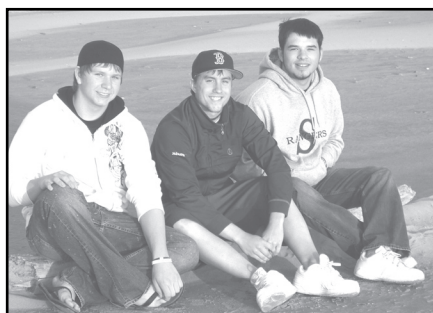
