

Comprehensive School Counseling Plan

OVERVIEW

Act 190, the School Counseling Improvement Act of 2019, requires that each school district implement a comprehensive school counseling program that ensures student services are coordinated in a manner that provides comprehensive support to all students. The act requires that there will be a written plan that is implemented by an Arkansas-certified school counselor. It must utilize state and nationally recognized counselor frameworks. It must be reviewed annually and updated as needed by the school counselor in collaboration with the building administrator and other stakeholders. It must be systemically aligned to kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12) within the public school district. It must contain four parts; foundation (vision and mission statements), management, delivery, and accountability. We also utilized the ASCA National Model 4th Edition in creating this document.

This program is a work in progress. Implementation and delivery will be handled by the MPV School Counselors.

Delivery

Direct Counseling (90% of time monthly)

- 1. Crisis Response
- 2. Individual social/emotional counseling as needed.
- 3. Individual academic guidance and counseling as needed.
- 4. Individual career education guidance and counseling and vocational decision making.
- 5. Orienting new students to the school.
- 6. Consultation with students.
- 7. Class selection discussion/academic advisement with students
- 8. Review records and files while assisting students
- 9. Small group counseling sessions
- 10. Classroom guidance sessions

Indirect Counseling (10% of time monthly)

- 1. Consultation services with school personnel and outside agencies.
- 2. Making appropriate referrals.
- 3. Updating guidance/counseling records for counselor's utilization.
- 4. Planning, managing, and evaluating the comprehensive counseling program.
- 5. Planning classroom guidance lessons.
- Test interpretation about students; test interpretation for parents, faculty or community.
- 7. Family and Community Engagement Program Building Level Facilitators
- 8. Response-to-Intervention Team Members

Accountability

Evaluation

We will meet annually to review and revise as needed our comprehensive school counseling program. Throughout the year, we will consider and review data as it relates to student performance, discipline, school data, school report card and use of time. We will consider program results as they relate to curriculum results, small group results, closing the gap analysis, etc. In evaluating and improving the program, we will always refer to school counselor competencies, <u>K-12 Competencies</u>, program assessment and school counselor performance appraisal.

Revision

At our annual meeting, we will consider the results of our evaluation, share the data we have collected and revise the plan as needed to continue in our determination to provide what our students, school staff, families and community need.
