Furthermore, Julia completed a full

course load at Genesee Community College, where she received an associate degree as a member of the Science/Technology/Engineering/Mathematics (STEM) Program.

In addition to her numerous academic achievements, Julia was involved in many activities. She participated in Mock Trial, Scholastic Bowl, Science Olympiad, and Math Team, and served as secretary for National Honor Society and as a senior class representative for the BHS Student Government. District Welcomes Scott Bischoping as Interim Superintendent

At the June 18, 2019, Board of Education meeting, in anticipation of Superintendent of Schools Christopher Dailey's last workday in the District, the Board appointed Scott Bischoping as interim superintendent, effective July 1, 2019. BOE president Pat Burk, expressing that he looked forward to welcoming Mr. Bischoping, noted that the Board is confident in the interim superintendent's background, experience and ability to guide the District while the search for a superintendent is conducted.

Mr. Bischoping began his career in education in 1988 as a business education teacher and, most recently, served as the Deputy Superintendent of Wayne-Finger Lakes BOCES where he provided leadership, direction, and general supervision for all BOCES instructional programs, as well as served on behalf of the District Superintendent in her absence. Mr. Bischoping holds a Certificate of Advanced Study in Education Administration; a Master of Science; a Certificate in Business and Distributive Education; and a Bachelor of Science.

Kevin MacDonald, District Superintendent of the Genesee Valley Educational Partnership, assisted with the interim search and will also act as the final search consultant. He noted that the Batavia City School District Board will develop and implement a rigorous process that will help determine the best candidate.

Free Summer Meal Program for Youth

BMS Students Explore Career Options

Late this spring, more than 20 local professionals volunteered to spend a few hours at the Middle School's Career Fair talking about their careers with small

groups of students in grades 5-8. In addition, for every presenter who was there, several more jobs were represented as the speakers described many of the roles of others in their respective fields. Students heard general as well as more specific day-to-day job descriptions, and learned about the different ways various careers play significant roles in communities, how workers are compensated, and what requirements and preparation are required or desirable when pursuing a line of work. In addition, many presenters noted that even as early as middle school, the students' attentiveness to academics as well as their overall character and behavior are important and can impact future career opportunities.







One presenter from the city's Fire Department, Chief Stafano Napolitano, noted, "These kinds of events are great for the students, but they are great for us too. I get to go out and tell kids that I love my job and that they can have a great job (as a firefighter) too - where they can make a very good living to provide for their families, and provide a needed service for their community." He hoped that the event would plant seeds for future recruitment to the Fire Department.

Another, BHS school counselor Sherry Crumity, reminded students that, while she was there describing her career, part of the day-to-day job of a school counselor is to be a resource for students as they look to their future career options. She encouraged them to utilize the counseling office in school as they continue their education and sort out their plans.

Second graders recently shared their excitement about their school by making a video about John Kennedy to welcome first graders who will be "moving up" from Jackson Primary School this coming fall.

John Kennedy was named a 2018-2019 Recognition School by the New York State Education Department (NYSED) for high marks in achievement and in progress.

"It's gratifying – but not surprising – that John Kennedy earned this distinction," said Superintendent of Schools Christopher J. Dailey. "Backed by a dedicated Board of Education, our administrators, teachers, and staff work tirelessly with students and their families to help children reach their potential."

As NYSED aims for a more holistic approach to school and student achievement under New York's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), those named as 2018-2019 Recognition Schools exemplify success in this mission. The criteria for recognition included progress during the 2017-2018 school year in student growth; meeting or exceeding either the school or state measures of interim progress for English language arts and mathematics, rate of chronic absenteeism, and college-, career-, and civic-readiness; and meeting the federally required 95 percent participation rate in the English language arts and mathematics assessments.

Batavia's Executive Director of Curriculum and Instruction, Dr. Molly Corey, noted that JK is one of only 562 in the state and one of only 328 at the elementary level to be regarded as a 2018-2019 Recognition School, and said, "I commend the teachers and their principal, Dr. Amanda Cook, for this accomplishment. Their hard work and dedication to all students is evident."

Dr. Cook added, "Our entire team is committed to engaging students and their families in activities that build excitement for learning in ways that help children want to come to school to be a part of making memories together. We focus on creating a school learning community."
