Many students dreaded the trek back to school, yet were ecstatic for the kickoff of the annual Friday night lights as the Belt Huskies took the field in Cascade on Friday, August 25th at 7:00 p.m. As usual, the boys didn't disappoint with a 54-20 blowout. The Huskies are expected to have a winning season as they boast an impressive 9-0 2016 regular season record from last year. In 2016 the boys won their first two playoff games before falling to Charlo in the state semifinals. Key contributors to last year's success who will be missed include: Jaren Maki, Harry Green, Jess Bodner and Taylor Olson. This year's seniors, Robbie Flinn, Brayden Haugrose, Antonio Heaton, Trey Heitzman, Troy Hennes, Nolan Myrstol, and Keagan Stroop are expected to shine as they almost outnumber underclassmen seven to eight.

The varsity kicked off the showcase with a game against the Power Pirates. The Huskies won handily taking the first two sets 25-16 and 25-9. The team continued to roll, defeating the North Star Knights in two additional matches with scores of 25-13 and 25-20.

Fire hydrants around town have been in need of repair for the last year, and on August 2nd Alderman Porter asked Franzen for a status report. Franzen said he has not heard back from sales reps

regarding parts. Franzen looked into the fire hydrant situation and all hydrants needing repair and/or replaced is being made. If possible the city will replace all the hydrants in need.

The lift station pump for the city went down last month. The pump, which sends the waste water to the lagoons, has been deemed unfixable. A new pump engineered by DEQ will be mandatory.

In other news, Alderman Porter proposed drafting an Ordinance to govern cutting trees and bushes that obstruct the sidewalk. Scott VanDyken of the Cascade County Sheriff's Office is to come speak to the council about a plan to cover such situations and writing more citations. Judge Jim Olson's presence has also been being made with respect to a contract with the county attorney. The council hopes to clear up this issue at the next meeting.

There are two meetings a month at City Hall on Castner Street. The council will meet again on September 6th and September 27th. City meetings are open to the public and attendance is encouraged.
