Pinon Elementary and Pinon Middle School, students will have breakfast served in the classroom, lunch will be in the cafeteria with 3 feet of social distancing. Pinon High School (PHS) students will report directly to the cafeteria when they arrive at school. Breakfast and lunch will be in the cafeteria with 3 feet of social distancing. Students will not be assigned lockers and passing periods will be increased to four minutes to allow for adequate to safely transition between classes.
