I can share this moment with my own kids, and if they ever want to drop out of school or give up, I can remind them that Mommy felt that way sometimes too, but I stuck with it and got my education. I also have plans to take college classes to further my education. I want to thank people for believing in me and helping me get further ahead than I was before.

These are the benchmarks that are given to the Maine Department of Education through ETS (for HiSET information) and the Department of Labor (for employment information) and through the Office of Higher Education (for the college information). Adult Education programs will be accessed using these outcomes.

On August 9, 2016, Education Testing Service (the HiSET test company) will be moving RSU#3 Adult & Community Education Program from a paper-based HiSET testing site to a computerized HiSET testing site. By January 2017, all HiSET testing in Maine will be computerized.

Based on the Barbara Bush Foundation for Family Literacy performance indicators and survey asked by the Foundation of SPICE (Students and Parents In Cooperative Education) students: SPICE percentages are:
