This past school year, students earned an astounding total of 3,196 dual credits, amounting to a cost savings of \$1,278,400 for students and their families. Along with forty-seven Indiana College Core earners, it is a testament to our campus's quality of education and opportunities.

Logansport High School strives to prepare our students for life after graduation. 

IMPACT Day

(Friday Only)

Every Friday LHS students will report to a 30-minute IMPACT Period between 2nd and 3rd period. Students will be assigned to a teacher whom they will have all four years.

This adviser-advisee period will be utilized as:

- Building positive relationships with teachers
- ◆ Teachers will provide guidance and assist students in establishing the connection between what they are learning in school and their goals beyond high school
- Implement school wide initiatives
- Conduct safety drills, class meetings, club meetings, etc.
- Curriculum provided through Naviance on college and career readiness
- SkyePack for work readiness skills



FAST Fridays

Logansport High School is initiating a positive academic success program. This program is intended to reward and reinforce students who already exhibit good grades as well as motivate students to improve academically. Additionally, FAST Fridays will provide students with academic interventions and teacher supports during the regular school day instead of requiring students to make arrangements before or after school.

On FAST Fridays, LHS will operate on the early dismissal (2:13 p.m.) bell schedule Students will report to their IMPACT class. Students who have <u>all</u> grades of C- (70%) or higher in the semester grade will be excused from their IMPACT class after attendance has been taken. All buses will still run on the regular dismissal schedule. If students ride the bus and do not have a ride at 2:13 p.m., they will be able to stay and study until buses arrive at 3:25 p.m. If students do not ride the bus or have a ride, they are free to leave with parent permission. Once students leave, they are not to return until after school for extracurricular activities.

Students with a grade of D+ (69%) or below <u>in any class (even if weighted)</u> for the semester will be required to stay until 3:22p.m. dismissal time. From 2:13 to 3:25 p.m., students will meet with their teachers in order to improve their grades. This intervention time will provide students with the opportunity to work on missing assignments, make test corrections, makeup work, test prep, and extra practice.

What do I do if I get sick?

help. Students who become ill while at school should report to the nurse's office during passing period unless an urgent health issue requires interrupting class. Students should call parents regarding health issues **only** from the nurse's office, as calling from elsewhere causes much confusion for the nurse and the dean's office.

Medications at School

The purpose of administering medication in school is to help each student maintain an optimal state of health to enhance his/her educational plans. Medication should be given at home whenever possible. Medications given during school hours should be only those necessary to provide the student access to his/her educational program. Please do not hesitate to call the nurse's office with questions or clarification when your student needs to take medication at school. Changes in medication must be documented by written authorization from a licensed physician.

Over the Counter Medications (OTC)

Nonprescription medications may be given at school. The school nurse must be aware of the purpose for which a student is to receive the medication. Medicines shall be brought in the original container with the student's name on it.

For all medications administered, the school shall keep on file the written permission from the student's parent for the medicines.

Herbal Supplement Policy

Herbal supplements may not be dispensed at school per corporation guidelines.

Physician Slips

Students should have physician slips to return to school for:

- A. Extended illness
- B. Surgery
- Fracture (with cast, crutches, etc.) C.
- D. Pregnancy (need due date, list of restrictions, etc.)
- E. Bathroom Privileges



Required Vaccines For All Seniors

TEST DATES

SAT Dates

The SAT, or Scholastic Assessment Test, is a college admissions exam. The SAT School Day will be offered to Seniors on Wednesday, October 11th at LHS. Information will be given through IMPACT class and through the ACHIEVE Center Schoology page. For SAT School Day testing, seniors must register through the Guidance Office. Additionally, ALL juniors are required to take the SAT School Day on Tuesday, March 5th Last Name A-K and Thursday, March 6th Last name L-Z. This is a requirement of the Indiana Department of Education. Taking the SAT allows the students to become familiar with SAT tests and allows each student to receive detailed information about their strengths and weaknesses and become college and career ready.

Students can take the SAT multiple times in the attempt to achieve their greatest score. SAT scores are used for scholarship purposes as well! Some colleges require SAT scores for their applicants.

PSAT (Sophomores and Juniors)

The PSAT is an important national test taken by college-bound students and will be given, Wednesday, October 11th. All current 10th graders and any Junior who has registered for the test will take it. Research shows that students who have taken the PSAT will earn better scores on college admission tests. The PSAT is also used as the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying exam. PSAT test scores are used to qualify students for dual credit enrollment classes at LHS. The PSAT test fee for sophomores and juniors is funded by the Indiana Department of Education.

ACT

The ACT is a college admissions test and serves the same purpose as the SAT. The ACT contains multiple-choice tests in four areas: English, mathematics, reading and science. ACT's writing test is optional and will not affect student composite score. It is recommended students take both tests their junior year. Test Dates:

ASVAB Test (Juniors and Seniors)

this is a free test given in Mid-September to select juniors and seniors . The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery is the most widely used multipleaptitude test battery in the world. The ASVAB measures your strengths, weaknesses and potential for future success. The ASVAB also provides you with career information for various civilian and military occupations and is an indicator for success in future endeavors whether you choose to go to college, vocational school, or a military career.

SAT and ACT Fee Waiver

Juniors and seniors who qualify for either Free/Reduced Lunches or 21st Century Scholars will qualify for a fee waiver for the SAT and ACT tests. ACT and SAT allow two fee waivers during a student's high school career beginning in the junior year. Please see your counselor for details.

WHICH TEST SHOULD I TAKE?

Before signing up for the SAT or ACT, please see your counselor to assist you in deciding which test to take as one test might be more beneficial than another for you.

College Applications

It is imperative that you check deadline dates on all applications for college and technical school admissions! Some applications may have deadlines as early as October, 2023. Make sure to check your college or university website.

Transcripts

Parchment Exchange is a free, secure website for colleges to receive your transcript. Seniors—it is your responsibility to register on Parchment to order college and NCAA transcripts. It only takes 5-10 minutes to register. If you have trouble registering, please see Mrs. Lundy or your counselor for assistance.

Scholarships

Opportunities for scholarships will be announced throughout the year via the Naviance and Schoology. Further, seniors should check in the ACHIEVE Center at least every week for scholarship applications for which they may qualify. IT IS THE STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITY to submit scholarship applications by the deadline.

FAFSA

The Federal Application for Federal/State Aid is a free form and should be filled out by all who plan to attend post-secondary education. FAFSA forms are available online (www.fafsa.ed.gov) THE FASFA will be delayed this year and we have not been given a firm release date. However, we will advise students and parents as we know the datails. You can continue to check the FASFA website for updated information. You will use your 2020 tax information to complete the form for the 23-24 application. FAFSA applications must be submitted online! LHS will sponsor a Financial Aid Night on October 25, 2023 @ 6 p.m. in the McHale Performing Arts Center. Watch for more details. DO NOT submit a FAFSA Form before October 1, 2023!!!

Senior Awards Program

The Senior Awards Program will be held on **Monday, May 13, 2024**. This program is designed to recognize Seniors for the scholarships and awards they have earned. The Senior Awards Program will be held at McHale Performing Arts Center.

Graduation

The 153rd LHS Graduation will be Sunday, June 2, 2024 at 2 p.m. in the Berry Bowl. Students are not required to participate in the ceremony; however, STUDENTS MUST ATTEND GRADUATION REHEARSAL IN ORDER TO TAKE PART IN THE GRADUATION CEREMONY. Students are required to have a cap and gown for participation in commencement ceremonies.

Transcripts

Transcripts are distributed to all students shortly after the beginning of the first and second semesters. This allows students to review their credits to see what they have completed.

Unexcused Absences

Any absence that is not an excused absence or an exception to compulsory attendance contained in Policy 5200 is an unexcused absence.

ATTENDANCE PROCEDURE

Verification of student absences is the responsibility of the parents (IC 20-8.1-3). Parents/guardians are requested to call the Dean's Office at 753-0441. ext. 20509 by 9:30 A.M. if a student will be absent, tardy, or plans to leave school for an appointment. Parents/guardians who are unable to call on the day of the absence MUST call the Dean's Office by 8:30 A.M of the following school day or it will result in an unverified/unexcused absence. All doctors' and/or medical excuses are to be turned in to the Dean's Office immediately upon the student's return to class. Failure to provide doctors' and/or medical excuses shall result in an unexcused absence.

Extenuating circumstances, such as but not limited to family emergencies, death in the immediate family, may be resolved simply by calling the Attendance Officer at 753-0441, ext. 20509 to discuss the situation.

Written documentation by the student's physician is required to confirm a contagious, chronic, or debilitating condition that would cause them to exceed five (5) unexcused days.

Attendance is taken each period of the day. Absences are defined as missing the entire school day or any part (period) of a day for any reason. If a student is tardy to class beyond 10 minutes, this is considered an unexcused absence. ALL unexcused absences count toward the total allowed per class period. Any student reaching the eleventh (11th) absence in any class will be removed from the class and placed in credit recovery.

LHS firmly believes that with a combined focus by both home and school, our students are capable of good daily attendance and punctuality. The following interventions will be in place so that parents/guardians are aware of the attendance record(s) of their children:

Unexcused Attendance at Logansport High School

LHS policy allows each student to have ten (10) unexcused absences per semester/per class. Unexcused Labels: A, AV, L, TR Note: Students will receive an unexcused absence if the parent/guardian doesn't: • Call by 8:30 AM the following school day of the absence.

• Provide a doctor's and/or medical excuse upon returning to class.

Attendance Thresholds:

Three Unexcused absences

Parent Contacted by automated phone call, text, and email.

Five unexcused absences- Parent Contacted by automated phone call, text, and email. Parent Contacted by automated phone call, text, email, and a letter is mailed home.

Seven unexcused absences- Attendance Officer attempts to meet with the parent(s) in person/phone.

Ten unexcused absences

Parent Contacted by automated phone call, text, email, and a letter is mailed home. Attendance Officer attempts to meet with the parent(s) in person/phone.

On the 11th unexcused absence:

Regardless of grade in the class, the student shall be automatically removed from class for habitual truancy and have the option to:Be assigned to credit recovery at Logansport High School. -or- Apply to The Academy (Logansport Alternative School).

LHS Drug Testing Policy

DRUG TESTING OF ATHLETES, CHEERLEADERS, AND STUDENT DRIVERS

For the safety, welfare and best interests of the students of LHS, and to promote drug-free lives both during and following high school, the LCSC has adopted a drug education and testing program for use by all high school interscholastic athletic and cheerleading teams and student drivers. Drug usage is incompatible with participation in inter-scholastic athletics and driving. Such usage is forbidden by training rules, and increases the risk of injury to the user as well as others. Consent to testing is a condition of practice for and participation in all interscholastic athletics, cheerleading activities and driving privileges. The purposes of the program are to prevent drug and alcohol usage; to educate students as to the serious physical, mental and emotional harm caused by drug and alcohol abuse; to prevent injury, illness and harm as a result of drug and alcohol abuse; and to maintain an environment free of alcohol and drug use. Students will receive instruction in the dangers of drug and alcohol use as a part of the health program. The elimination of drug and alcohol use shall be part of this program. This education and testing program is intended to be a helpful part of the overall physical and social education and conditioning programs at LHS. Its purpose is not strictly disciplinary in nature, but is intended as a medical diagnostic tool to disclose possible drug related problems, and as an extension of our drug education programs. The drug testing policy shall be distributed to all students and parents. Selection of persons to be tested shall be done in a confidential manner to protect the identity of those being tested. Collection of urine samples shall be done in an inoffensive way that insures the integrity and identity of the sample. The school official who supervises the sample collection will not physically observe giving of the sample. Samples shall be tested by a reliable laboratory and reliable tests shall be performed before any sample is labeled "positive" for any particular drug. Confidentiality shall be maintained so that the identity of anyone testing positive is made known only to the student, his or her parents or guardian, and those persons in the athletic department that need to know. If there is a suspension from practice or team participation, team members shall not be told the reason unless the student chooses to do so. This program shall not affect other LCSC policies, practices or rights in dealing with drug or alcohol use or possession where there is reasonable suspicion of use or possession obtained by means other than the random sampling provided for in this program. A "positive" test under this program shall not be cause for automatic suspension or expulsion from regular school activities. If a student is unable to provide a sample during the twohour testing window, the student will then need to provide a test result, at a licensed medical facility that provides evidence of a passed drug screen. Until this test result is provided to the school, the driver will not be allowed to drive to school, and the athlete will be deemed temporarily ineligible from participating in the school's athletics program. The student will provide the drug screen to the school within the next 24 hours.



LHS Dress Code

At the end of the summer many parents will begin buying school clothes for their children. Student dress is an extremely critical factor in creating a positive school climate and learning atmosphere. Besides providing students with the guidelines of school dress included in the high school handbook, as we talk with our students, we strive to emphasize that if you look good, you tend to feel good and that leads to a readiness to learn and achieve. Please help us encourage our students to look their best everyday and let "common sense" be their guideline in choosing what to wear to school each day. We reserve the right to contact parents if a student comes to school dressed in any way that will pose a potential disruption to a positive school climate. Therefore, we encourage parents to help their student select the appropriate school clothes.

Here are some guidelines from our Student Handbook:

Dress Code

If a teacher or staff member determines a student is dressed inappropriately for LHS, he or she will refer the student to the Dean's Office immediately. Dress Code violators will receive consequences as outlined in the Consequence Matrix. The following will be strictly adhered to:

- · No tank tops or spaghetti straps are permitted.
- No strapless tops are permitted.
- · There must be no visible cleavage or midriffs.
- · Skirts, dresses and shorts must be at least finger-tip length.
- · No holes in pants above the finger tips.
- · Backs must be covered.
- · No see-through apparel or fishnet garments are permitted.
- · No sagging pants are permitted. All pants and slacks must have belts and be worn at the waist.
- · Belts must be fastened.
- · No hats, caps, sunglasses, any other head coverings or gloves are permitted. However, at the discretion of teacher, coach, administrator, or other school official, students may be required to wear hairnest and/or other hair restraints in technology classes, laboratory, swimming, and comparable activities.
- · No attire that may damage LHS property or cause personal injury to others (such as chains or studded items) is permitted.
- · No clothing that advertises, promotes, or glorifies the use of alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or other illegal substances, is permitted.
- · No clothing that is suggestive, has a double meaning or innuendo, or suggests inappropriate ideas, is permitted.
- · Students on in-home detention who wear ankle-bracelets shall keep them covered at all times.
- · No apparel, jewelry, cosmetic, make-up accessory, notebook, or manner of grooming which, by virtue of its color arrangement, trademark, or any other attribute denoting membership in a gang or advocating drug use, violence or clothing bearing racially or sexually offensive messages is permitted.
- · No lounging or sleeping apparel is permitted. This includes, but is not limited to, pajamas, robes, and slippers.
- · No bandanas of any sort are permitted, whether this be a solid bandana or a bandana with a pattern. Bandana defined: a large handkerchief, typically having a colorful pattern, worn tied around the head or neck.

Must not have received more than 3 periods of ISS for the class anytime during the semester Must not have received a day of OSS at any time during the semester.


Note:
