Homer was built by literacy experts to cultivate a love of reading in young children and to teach them to become better readers. It is easy to use, safe and nurturing, with 1000s of games and lessons and a vast library of e-books all in one place.

It was also shown in a recent research study by the former US Assistant Secretary of Education to increase early reading scores by 74%.

Because we are using Homer in our school, we are able to invite families to try Homer at home for 30 days free of charge. If you like the program, you can subscribe with a special discount.





Arlee Paid Group Facilitator Opportunity

GUTS! is a leadership program of the YWCA of Missoula that serves young people ages 9-18 in Missoula and the surrounding communities, who identify with girlhood or who believe participation in the program will benefit them. The goal of this program is to encourage participants to discover their personal strengths, develop their leadership skills and activate positive community change.

Facilitators co-lead a weekly lunchtime group at Arlee Elementary with 5-12 participants. The role of the facilitators is to foster growth of participants and encourage them to develop as leaders through mentorship, group activities and projects. Facilitators dedicate around 2-3 hours each week (including travel and planning time) for 10-12 weeks. Facilitator training will be provided. Each facilitator will receive a stipend for the group. 



BUS SAFETY

The community safety team has been concerned about the bus and car procedures in mornings and afternoons and has produced a map for guidance. Please read the guidance below and follow signs and cones deployed twice every day during arrival and dismissal times.

Morning:

Cars, please drop your students along the sidewalk in front of the high school and then exit through the marked exit between concrete parking barriers.

Cars, please do NOT drop off students on the west side of the concrete barriers or drive along the left side of the buses. Buses and other cars CANNOT SEE your students crossing the parking/driving areas in the dark.


Cars, please follow the flow of traffic along Fyant Street (which is actually a street contained inside our parking lot). Please do not drive the wrong way through the parking area.

Afternoon:

Cars, please pick up your student at the student's school building. Please do not grab students from the bus zone.

Cars, please do not drive along the left side of the buses. This area is coned off in the afternoon for the safety of our students.

No cars should drive across the sidewalk at any time when students or staff are crossing, in particular from 7:30-8 am and 3:30-4 pm.



HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

Here we are at the start of November and almost winter break. With this, we have the start of basketball and wrestling seasons as well as music concerts and in no time the end of the first semester.

With this being said, there are some school rules and policies that I would like to review with you, parents, staff and coaches. All of these policies are located in the Arlee Student Handbook which can be found on our school website. www.arleeschools.org

Attendance: This is the number one issue that we as a school deal with each day. Students are sick or have appointments, attend cultural events, and/or have other reasons why they are not in school. As a reminder, if your student is going to be absent from school, we ask that you contact the school office that your child's main classes are in and let the office manager (Val, Jamie, Carolyn, Wendy) know that your child will not be in school that day. If you know in advance, you can also call ahead of time to let us know. The school policy on attendance in the junior high and high school on page 8 of the handbook states: To earn credit for any school course, a student cannot be absent ten (10) days from a course per quarter (JH) or ten (10) days from a course per semester (HS) or credit may be denied. Exempt absences do not count towards these absences.

On a positive side with attendance, your students can earn awards such as an Honor Roll Pass, No Tardy Pass, and Perfect Attendance Passes. Attached are the types of absences that the school looks at when determining credit and excused or unexcused absences.

Types of Absences: There are three (3) types of absences – exempt, excused, and regular.

- 1. Exempt absences are defined as the following:(A) Honor Roll Pass, No Tardy Pass, and Perfect Attendance Pass (B) Parental request for cultural or religious activities (page 7) (C) Required court appearances (D) Counseling appointments (E) School sponsored activities including athletics (F) College Visitations
- 2. Excused absences are defined as the following: a. Personal illness with a doctor's note b. Bereavement approved by the principal c. Other unforeseen absences approved by the principal
- 3. Regular absences are all other absences.

If your student is involved in athletics or any extra/co-curricular activities, we follow the information listed on page 18 of the student handbook which is as follows:

Attendance Rules for Extra and Co-Curricular Practice

☐ If an athlete is absent and/or tardy, he/she may not practice and/or play in a game with the team that day.

☐ If a student needs to miss school for medical/dental only, the Athletic Director must be notified 12-24 hours in advance for the student to practice or participate in a game.

If a student is assigned Advisory-time detention and/or Friday ISS and the student misses or skips these, the student will not be allowed to practice or participate in activities scheduled for those days.

Grades: This is the most important part of school as grades equal credits which are required to graduate from Arlee High School. Arlee High School requires 24 credits to be able to graduate.



We follow certain Arlee School Board, MHSA and State of Montana requirements when developing our policies on extra/co-curricular participation. Arlee requires the following requirements to participate:

A 2.0 grade point average and no failing grades. We check grades every 4.5 weeks and the only grades that go onto a student's transcript are the semester grades (4th and 8th grade check). The teachers at Arlee develop classroom grades by class work, quizzes, tests and projects as well as finals week which will be the week of January 13-16, 2020.

Montana High School Association requires a student to meet the following terms to be eligible to participate in extra/co-curricular activities:

- 1. A student must be enrolled in twenty hours per week and in regular attendance.
- 2. A grading period is defined as one semester. A semester is defined as one half of a school year.
- 3. A student must have received a passing grade and received credit in at least twenty periods of prepared class work or its equivalent in the last previous semester. At Arlee, this would be passing four periods out of seven.
- 4. The scholastic record at the end of the semester shall be final and deficiencies may not be made up in any manner.

As I stated above, high school finals week will be the week of January 13-16, 2020 and I will be sending out the finals schedule with my December newsletter. There is a lot of information in my report this month, but I felt it was important as we all don't have the time and resources to read the various handbooks.

Hope you have a great Thanksgiving and are looking forward to Christmas break. We are also looking forward to another successful Arlee basketball and wrestling season.

Our fall sports have come to an end and we thank the cross country, volleyball and football teams and coaches for all the hard work and good watching throughout the season.

Coach Sproull wrote the following about his cross country team: "Wow..did this season go by quickly! We started it off in the heat, with runners ending practices by soaking in the Jocko. We ended it at State in the snow and the cold in Great Falls, and we ended it right. Congrats first to the runners who somehow managed to set PRs at the State meet despite the elements – Princess Bolen joined the 7 minute mile club and ran her most complete and consistent race, finishing in 24:38! Elaina Wall made those Hardin boys take notice by setting her season PR by 47 seconds – 30:55! Melaia Matt ran her best race of the season, improving by a minute and a half - 32:42! Finally, Devin Cordier put those monster calves to work and made his last

race his best – 23:53! Several runners – Cheyenne Pablo, Denny Sween and Devin Cordier had better races at the State meet than last time we ran at the same course in Great Falls in September, despite the snow. Aubrey Ishler and Denny Sween had their second best time of the year, and Tally Martin had her fourth best. Micah Johnson and Sage Nicolai didn't set any personal records at the State meet, but they did lead the team with the two fastest times of any Arlee runners. R.J. Knoll proved his toughness by running in his eighth straight race in which he had some unending respiratory zombie infection. Finally, Billy Fisher went for it, despite his back injury. Like many of you in previous races this season, he poured all he could into the race, but his body couldn't keep up with his heart."

Assistant football coach, Ryan Landolfi, wrote this about this year's football team: "The 2019 Warriors may have lacked experience on the varsity gridiron, but they more than made up for it with tenacity and enthusiasm. While the win and loss column may not have added up to what many would consider a successful season. the coaching staff couldn't have been more pleased with the team's seasonlong effort and attendance. A few of the season's highlights include Cody Tanner's exploits under center as a first-year starter at quarterback, CJ Forgey's protection as the offensive

line's anchor, Colt Crawford's agility from the offensive backfield, and Noah Coulson's big hits on defense. The younger players' contributions to the team can't go unnoticed; without their hard work day in and day out at practice, the team's successes would have been impossible. Finally, toward the end of the season, the JV boys wound up on the winning side of two contests against Victor and Clark Fork, led by Charley Crawford's athleticism, Lucas One Horn's big plays, and Justice McLinden's unblockability on defense. All in all, Coach Forgey and Coach Landolfi thoroughly enjoyed the boys' effort and willingness to learn new positions, plays, and schemes all year long. To the graduating seniors: it was a great ride! And to the rest of the team: the off-season is just beginning. The 2020 Warriors will build off of this year's successes and create their own!"

HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Arlee Health and Physical Education classes recently enjoyed learning contra dance for the third year in a row from Mr. Mark Matthews. Mark Matthews is not only a dance instructor but also a historian and writer about dance. His 'Swinging through American History' series includes "Square Your Sets," "Promenading toward Democracy," "Cakewalking out of Slavery," and "Jitterbugging across the Colorline." Matthews also wrote, 'Smoke Jumping on the Western Fire Line' about conscientious objectors fighting fire instead of going to World War II.

At Lynn Classical High School Mr. Matthews earned second team All-State honors in Massachusetts, and played on the old parquet floor at the old Boston Gardens during the Tech Tourney in 1968. At Brandeis University he played for the legendary NBA star K.C. Jones of the Boston Celtics. At the 'Garden', Mr. Matthews watched his idol, K.C. Matthews also admired Sam Jones, Satch Sanders, Havilcek and Bill Russell. Matthews said he dreamed of growing up to be a black 6'6" basketball player. Matthews noted he saw Led Zepplin at the Garden back in the day. Mr. Matthews was paid by Humanities Montana to teach at Arlee School.

Mark now lives in Hysham, Montana, where he spends most of his time sculpting and writing.

GRANTS AND FEDERAL PROGRAMS

What happens in the Grants Office?

Grants manager Anna Baldwin researches grants that might fit Arlee School's mission and our needs, conducts focus group interviews and then writes grants proposals. Some recent proposals include an Impact Aid grant to build a new elementary facility, a Montana Commerce Department grant to help pay for the new boiler system, a homeless assistance grant from the Montana Office of Public Instruction, and so on.

Arlee Schools also receives federal funds which are coded as grants, including Title I which provides support for struggling readers and writers, and Title VI which supports Indian education.

A sampling of current projects funded by grants and federal programs:

- **Arlee Syal Project**, provides culture— and unity-focused activities all year round, funded by the Headwaters Foundation
- Arlee Next Step Project, a grant to support teachers in creating culturally responsive materials for other teachers to use, funded by the Montana Office of Public Instruction
- Arlee GreenWorks Project, a grant to retrofit our greenhouse for plant, biology and nutrition lesson, funded by the National Association of Federally Impacted Schools
- Jump into the Jocko Valley, part of Title I and Title VI to support new teachers and teachers new to the district in learning about our local community
