OREGON CAREER INFORMATION SYSTEM-CIS

Students in 7th-12th grade have recently begun using the Oregon Career Information System website, or CIS for short, during their homeroom. At home, you can support your student's exploration and effective use of this tool by encouraging communication around the topics found on the website. Each student has a unique login and profile on the site, and all of their tasks and activities are tracked on their CIS profile. The website includes activities, quizzes, and informative presentations on topics including:

- Current employment, wages, outlook, hiring practices, preparation, and licensing, in addition to the skills, abilities, and knowledge required, are reported for each of over 600+ occupation titles. These occupations cover over 95% of the labor market in Oregon.
- Every postsecondary program of study or training offered in Oregon is described within one of over 600 program categories. More than 150 topics of information, from admission requirements and costs to services for students with disabilities, are provided for each postsecondary school in Oregon. Similar information is included about national two-year, four-year, and graduate institutions.
- A complete scholarship and a financial aid database that lists national, state, and local awards is available along with a tool to sort the entries based upon an individual's characteristics.
- CIS also includes information about self-employment, job search, industries, and the military as an employer.




Four-Year Graduation Rates by Freshman Absence Rates



8th grade Smarter Balanced test– nope. SAT scores as a junior– nope. Nothing is as important to a student's high school success as their Freshman year school attendance. This year sets the stage for future success. Data has been studied, cohorts of students have been tracked for years, student interviews have been completed, and researchers assert that being in school, with very few absences, is the greatest predictor of school success. Yes, grades also do matter, as research also shows that the more D's and F's a student has their freshman year, the less likely they are to graduate.

This bar graph above shows the likelihood of a student graduating based on the number of absences each semester. Being absent even two days per month, which equates to about 10% of school days, decreases a student's likelihood of graduation as a senior by 37%. Students with more than two days absent per month drop to a likelihood of graduating of only 21%. Our school year has 162.5 instruction days. Every day of class builds on the day before. Missing school days is like building a brick wall with missing bricks– unstable. Stay home from school if you're sick, but come each and every day if you're healthy. **Every day counts.**

Driven by a strong desire for continuous improvement, the Sherman County School District launched a strategic planning process in August of 2010 to define the goals and priorities of the district based on thoughtful input from constituents. The team was comprised of School Board members, administrators, teachers, support staff, community leaders, and parents. This group met monthly and for special work sessions for more than a year to develop the comprehensive plan. This work led to the approval of the 2012-17 Sherman County School District Strategic Plan. The current School Board and staff are presently in the preliminary stages of developing a new plan that is dedicated to providing the best education possible for every student in the District.

Embedded in the 2012-17 Strategic Plan was a proposal to enhance our Counseling and Career Guidance programs and hire a Dean of Student Success. I am pleased to share with the school community that we have made tremendous strides with this mission. We are working diligently at establishing a more comprehensive system of support for all of our students. During the 2012 school year, we had a part-time Counselor and a two day a week on-site Mental Health Counselor. This school year we have expanded to a full-time certified K-12 Counselor, full-time Dean of Student Success (mostly funded through state-wide Measure 98 grant funds), a three day a week on-site Family Care Coordinator (fully funded through Mid-Columbia Center for Living), and a two day a week Mental Health Counselor (partially funded through Juvenile Crime Prevention Funds).


