This policy applies to all students, staff and schools in the District. Specific measureable goals and outcomes are identified within each section below.

### I. School Wellness Committee

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### Nutrition

To support healthy food choices and improve student health and well-being, all foods and beverages outside the reimbursable school meal programs that are gold to students on the school campus during the school day will meet or exceed the USDA Smart Snacks nutrition standards. These standards will apply in all locations and through all services where foods and beverages are sold, which may include, but are not limited to, a la carte options in cafeterias, vending machines, school stores and snack or food carts.

### Food and Beverage Marketing in Scho

The District is committed to providing a school environment that ensures opportunities for all students to practice healthy eating and physical activity behaviors throughout the school day while minimizing commercial distractions. The District strives to teach students how to make informed choices about nutrition, health and physical activity. These efforts will be weakened if students are subjected to advertising on District property that contains messages inconsistent with the health information the District is imparting through nutrition education and health promotion efforts. It is the intent of the District to protect and promote student's health by permitting advertising and marketing for only those foods and beverages that are permitted to be sold on the school campus, consistent with the District's welln policy.

Any foods and beverages marketed or promoted to students on the school campus\* during the school day\* will meet or exceed the USDA Smart Snacks in School nutrition standards.

Food and beverage marketing is defined as advertising and other promotions in schools. Food and beverage marketing often includes an oral, written, or graphic statements made for the purpose of promoting the sale of a food or beverage product made by the producer, manufacturer, seller or any other entity with a commercial interest in the product.\*\* This term includes, but is not limited to the following:

Brand names, trademarks, logos or tags, except when placed on a physically present food or beverage product or its container. Displays, such as on vending machine exteriors

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- Dangers of using performance-enhancing drugs, such as steroids Social influences on physical activity, including media, family, peers and cultun How to find valid information or services related to physical activity and fitness How to influence, support, or advocate or others to engage in physical activity How to resist peer pressure that discourages physical activity.

Professional learning will help District staff understand the connections between academia and health and the ways in which health and wellness are integrated into ongoing district reform or academic improvement plans/efforts.

### IV. Physical Activity

Children and advisocente should participate in at least 60 minutes of physical activity every day. A substantial percentage of students' physical activity can be provided through a comprehensive school physical activity program (CSPAP).
