The result: Brenham 20, La Grange 0, in the second District 23-A game for both teams.

And, there's a bit of an alibi as far as the Leopards are concerned. It rained for three hours before the game and for a time during the first part of the contest. A very slippery ball was the result, and Brenham capitalized on the several bad breaks.

Brenham kicked off and La Grange received on its 21. However, the ball slipped from the carrier's hands about the 26 and the Cubs recovered. Six plays later William Gaskamp, Cub right halfback, went over from the eight. Elwood Kettler bucked the line for the extra point.

Hermes School Is Rated As One Of South's Best

The enrollment of the La Grange school system has increased to the total of 801 pupils. The high school enrollment now stands at 232, Junior high school has 111, and the Hermes Elementary enrollment at 394. Ellinger elementary school has 40 children enrolled and Warda elementary school has 24.

The Hermes Elementary School, which was completed three days before school opened, is now completely furnished and is rated as one of the best designed elementary schools in the southwest.

The increased enrollment has overloaded our transportation system, and has caused some hardships. Four new 48-passenger school busses were ordered on July 6, and are expected to be delivered within the next two or three days. With these new busses the school can give much faster and better transportation to the children from rural areas.

Contractors completed the installation of the steam table and other kitchen equipment last week. With this new equipment the cafeteria prepares 600 meals daily. The meals are prepared in accordance with the recommendations of the lunch room division of the State Health Department of Education and the recommendations of the United States Department of Agriculture. Miss Ardis Piercy, district school lunch supervisor, of the State Department of Education visited the lunch room, inspected the equipment and supervised the preparation of one meal. She rated the lunch room as one of the best in the state and complimented the school on the quality of the balanced meals that were served.
