All Aboard For Brownsville

On Nov. 23, 1946 while the dawn was just peeping over the horizon and the birds had just begin to chirp their early morning melodies, the Indian football squad loaded on streamline buses and started a long trip to the magic valley of Texas--the destination being Brownsville and the purpose to play for the B4-District football crown of the Six man Circle. The departure from the Pawnee High School had all the color and grandeur--all the splendor that any famous author would have enjoyed having to write an entire book. It was no ordinary bus trip, but a trip that carried the entire Pawnee School--to represent the school in clean sports, clean character and everlasting friendship.

The trip to Brownsville was an enjoyable and pleasant one. We had a short stop in Alice, the hub of South Texas, and a brief visit in Kingsville, home of the famous King Ranch--this ranch being the largest in the world and having more historical background than anyother will ever know.

Arriving in Brownsville about two O'clock the boys unloaded at their headquarters, the Palm Courts. The pep squaders proceeded on to go South of the Border down Mexico way and dear old Matamoris. In this town, for about two hours the Pawnee girls turned Spanish and practiced the customs and ideas of the gay Senoritas. The shops in Matamoris did a land office business that day because when the girls came back across the sleepy Rio Grande, they carried enough trinkets to put in a Spanish gift shop--beads, pocket books, rings, scarfs, and black market sugar.

That night at eight O'clock when the starting whistle blew, found the Pawnee Indians ready to do battle with the powerful feathered Falcons from Los Fresnos High School. A large crowd got their money's worth on the first play of the game when little Pete Nesloney grabbed a kickoff and raced 75 yards for a touchdown and thus initiated Six man football on Tucker's field.

The Indians slugged it out with the Falcons for three quarters, but with no reserve strength available the Redskins begin to slow up and the big feathered birds





turned on the steam with plenty of reserve strength--the final score being 26-46 in favor of Los Fresnos. But the score doesn't tell the story of the game at all. It was indeed a great football battle--the boys played their hearts out because inside of them is that desire to win--the traits of a true American living in a great democracy.

The purpose of this article is written for this reason to show you people what goes on behind the scened. These boys were not playing this game alone because they liked the game, but to carry out the Pawnee School and the community, to the state. There is something about football that is sacred, it will make a lump come in your throat, it will make you cry, it will make you happy, and above all Football will make a boy say, "Thank God I'm an American."

I started to New York to see you and saw a sign that said: THIS WILL TAKE YOU TO NEW YORK so I got on the sign and sat, there for three hours, but the darn thing didn't move.

I'm mailing your coat express. I cut the buttons off to make it lighter. They are in the coat pocket.

If you don't get this letter let me know so I can mail it to you. Our neighbors brat swallowed a group of pins and the doctor said to get a pin cushion.

I would have sent you the seven dollars I borrowed from you only I didn't think of it until after I had sealed this envelope.
