### MIDDLE SCHOOL STANDARDIZED TESTING

Beginning April 11th, students in grades 6-8 will once again participate in the Illinois Assessment of Readiness (IAR). IAR will continue to provide parents and educators with detailed information about individual student progress and academic growth in English Language Arts and Mathematics. This data is important as it helps to highlight areas of strength and those in need of improvement as we strive to continually advance the quality of our educational programming toward mastering the Illinois Learning Standards. Teachers use the results of this and other assessments to help tailor instruction to your child's specific learning needs and to help prepare students for college and careers later in life.


This year, the IAR will consist of three units of Mathematics and three units of English/Language Arts in each grade level. Students will take one test each morning, and the schedule has been modified to allow students to continue with the school day afterward. The hope is to have all testing completed by Tuesday, April 18th. Make-up assessments will be administered as needed.

Students will be testing using Chromebooks. Students are encouraged to bring their wired headphones to school on testing days, as some parts of the assessment include audio/video elements. Students' cell phones must remain powered off during the entire testing session. When students finish the test, they may read a school-appropriate book or magazine or work on homework unrelated to the subject area being tested that day.

Parents can help their students by:

- Encouraging students to stay positive and do their best on these assessments
- Making sure students get a good night's sleep before testing
- Eating a good breakfast each morning
- Ensuring that students arrive at school on time and remain in attendance throughout testing

## HIGH SCHOOL STANDARDIZED TESTING

On Wednesday, April 12, 2023, students at Illini Central High School will participate in the mandated state testing. Freshmen students will take the PSAT 8/9, sophomores will take the PSAT 10, and juniors will take the SAT. Completion of the SAT is a requirement for graduation in the state of Illinois.

Some students with approved accommodations may be testing on an alternate date, and if this is the case, one of the counselors will be in touch with the parents before testing.

The PSAT/SAT assessments will continue to provide parents and educators with information about individual student progress and academic growth, and college readiness. This data is important as it helps to highlight areas of strength and those in need of improvement as we strive to advance the quality of our educational programming continually. Teachers use the results of this and other assessments to help tailor instruction to your child's specific learning needs and to help prepare students for college and careers later in life.

Students may not have their cell phones in the testing room. If a cell phone is visible during testing, the student will be dismissed from testing, and the test will be invalid.

Parents can help their students by:

- Encouraging students to stay positive and do their best on the assessment
- Making sure students get a good night's sleep before testing
- · Eating a good breakfast in the morning
- Ensuring that students arrive at school on time and remain in attendance throughout testing

While the freshmen, sophomores, and juniors are testing, seniors will be at the Mason City Community Chapel working on finalizing their Capstone requirements. Seniors may bring whatever materials they need to work on their projects. Teachers and counselors will be available to answer questions and provide support. A Subway lunch will be free for the seniors since they will be off-campus while the underclassmen test.

## ILLINOIS SCIENCE ASSESSMENT

Students in grades 5, 8 and 11 will take the Illinois Science Assessment (ISA) on April 25. The ISA aligns with our new Illinois Learning Standards in science. This assessment helps families understand how well students are performing academically and see whether they are on track to succeed in college. The ISA represents Illinois' commitment to preparing all students for college and careers, including the high-demand science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) fields. The assessment also satisfies federal accountability requirements.

The ISA is designed to reflect classroom experiences. Many students who took the assessment last year said the ISA seemed more like instruction than a test. Students do not simply select an answer and fill in the bubble of a multiple-choice test. Rather, the ISA pushes students to apply their knowledge when they give answers, thus better preparing them for higher education and a career. All students deserve the opportunity to demonstrate what they know; they get to see how knowledge is applied to real-life situations.

The ISA has three sections. The average student time-on-task is estimated at 120 minutes. The results provide administrators with important data to help them make broad curriculum decisions at the school and district levels; however, classroom educators will not use the results to make teaching adjustments year-to-year for individual students.

We encourage you to talk with your children about the importance of doing their best on the ISA, while communicating that the assessment yields only one piece of information about them and their school's progress. Students' attendance, classroom work, homework, projects, performance on local tests, participation in sports and extracurricular activities, and contributions to the school's climate and culture all help them grow and learn.

We all work together to ensure Illinois students build a cohesive understanding of science over time. Thank you for your role in developing lifelong learners and successful citizens.



### **CAREER READINESS AT ICHS**

As a graduation requirement, all students at ICHS are required to complete the Capstone Project. As part of the project, students must complete various assignments and activities to prepare them for their future careers.

All sophomores, juniors, and seniors will have completed mock job interviews by the end of the month. We had several volunteers from the community assist in these interviews!

Throughout the year, students have visited various trade schools, college campuses, and employment opportunities. In various classes, students have complete self-assessments, reflections, long-term financial plans, and interviews with professionals.

Additionally, students have participated in seminars about traditional interviews, behavioral interviews, and resumes taught by business experts, not just the staff at ICHS.

We aim to provide students with opportunities for their future once they walk across the stage at graduation. This graduation requirement prepares students with an opportunity for a successful future.

On April 26th, all seniors will present their Reverse Career Fair presentations to the public starting at 9am. We are still in need of some judges for this event. Email Dr. Durbin (jdurbin@illinicentral.org) if you are interested in judging.

#### **DUAL CREDIT AT ICHS**

Any current sophomore or junior who would like to take dual credit courses through ICC next year will need to take the Accuplacer test to qualify (unless the student has previously passed the test).

ICHS offers this test to our students on Wednesday, March 29th, at 8:00 am.
