On March 16, 2020, our world changed. Schools were closed. Busses were parked in their stalls. Students stayed at home. Staff was placed temporarily on leave. COVID-19 was slowly creeping across the nation.

But children still needed education, and they still needed food.

Todd County Elementary Schools, following state guidelines for flex learning, began to gather materials to send to those students, while administrators and teachers in charge of Middle and High School classes managed most of them on*line. Their efforts and the* results were phenomenal. In fact, the Todd County High School Class of 2020 will set a new record on Saturday, June 27 with 102 graduates.

At first, feeding 2,200 children two meals a day seemed an impossible task. but thanks to the guidance of our Business Manager Chad Blotsky, the project was up and running in two davs.

Board Members asked for a survey of the teachers to see how much response is coming back from the students.

Galbraith noted that the priorities right now are providing thousands of breakfasts and lunches, along with the academic opportunities. " The situation is ever-changing and fluid." she said.

The Superintendent and the Board all expressed their appreciation for the teachers and all TCSD Staff. Galbraith noted that the breakfast/lunch project now "runs like a welloiled machine," that there is a feeling of good will, and team building on the assembly lines that was never planned.

Note: As of Friday, April 17, over 100,000 meals have been provided, and the project will continue through the end of May.

We have a ton of fantastic employees," Galbraith said. "We just keep on doing what we are doina."

"We are all in this together," President Debra Boyd added. "We are facing the unknown. Thank you everyone."

TCSD Board hears Middle, High School Reports, Graduation set for June 27 or July 24, Parmelee School on go...

MISSION - Todd County's Class of 2020 will be unique in a lot of ways. Besides having to finish their classes online or at home on paper, Commencement is still a bit "iffy."

It was announced at the May 11 TCSD Board Meeting, that "some type" of Graduation for up to 108 Seniors will be held on June 25 or July 24, depending on the route COVID-19 takes between now and then. So far, 10 cases are currently on the Rosebud, and residents are asked by Rosebud Sioux Tribal (RST) authorities to "shelter in place" as much as possible, and wear masks in public or in groups of people.

TCHS Assistant Principal Mike Hammer was asked what percentage of students he believes will be completing their classwork. He said it is very difficult to venture a guess, but maybe 80%.

Of the 437 Middle School Students, 421 have been contacted with work to complete their classes for the year. TCMS Principal Dana Haukaas said she had asked the RST Fairboard about a special honoring for the there is a Fair," she added.

She said there will be no letter arades given, just passing grades. "I know we are all behind the eight ball," she said, "but we just have to fit everyone in when school starts aaain."

Superintendent Carol Galbraith shared information about contacts with the state regarding possible make-up days in the school vear. that there should be none added to the calendar. She also reported on ideas from the Cultural Curriculum Committee Meeting, including a list of books, a Lakota Dialect App for phones, Life Skills Classes in the curriculum, and a tipi on each campus.

Some discussion was held on safety for TCSD staff delivering and picking up paper packets. Superintendent Galbraith said the District is doing its part to keep employees safe in the process.

TCSD Business Manager Chad Blotsky said that speaking as a parent of Todd County Students, the staff has really stepped up to

> *He said he will be coming to the next* meeting and ask the Board to roll over this year's budget to 2021. "At this time, State funding is uncertain," he said. "As further details emerae, we will be able to better clarify our funding and will work to finalize numbers prior to the October 1 deadline for final budget approval."

> Blotsky said the Parmelee School project is still moving forward, and planning for a new Rosebud School needs to continue.

MISSION - Todd County School Superintendent Carol Galbraith gave an overview of current conditions in the District at the June 8 Board of Education meeting. Summer staff is now on the job for maintenance projects, and all other extended 12-month contract staff returned to work June 1, 2020

The Superintendent, Business Manager Chad Blotsky, and Maintenance Supervisor Brad Bartling have been reviewing summer projects to be completed on learning centers and housing, including replacement of Middle School and High School gymnasium bleachers. Antelope Community will be receiving some of the bleachers being removed, Blotsky said.

Interviews for new staff is going well, Galbraith said. Todd County currently has only six open certified positions.

With COVID-19 still a concern, plans for the upcoming school year are uncertain. However, the State and schools are continuing

Dear South Dakota Administrators, Educators and Support Staff,

"Adversity has the effect of eliciting talents, which in prosperous circumstances, would have lain dormant." Horace wrote this quote over Lori Wagner 2000 years ago. It still rings true today.

to collaborate on Smart Restart for next fall.

Some concerns, especially if social distancing is in the picture, are how to arrange classes - possibly one group of students certain days of the week, then another group the other days? Maybe one group one week, the other the next, or one group in the mornings and the other in the afternoon? If the kids are home, who will teach them? How can the schools work with students who do not have access to the internet? How can the whole process be made more equal for all students?

And one huge consideration, especial*ly for Todd County, what about the bussing? Would parents want their children to continue* classes electronically, or ride the bus? How would that work with social distancing? Could their temperature be taken when they board the bus? But if they came to school and were then found to have a fever, how would they get back home?

It was suggested maybe a survey could be conducted.

"We need to use community monitoring and follow recommendations to keep everyone safe from COVID-19, while resuming learning and providing support to parents/quardians returning to work," Galbraith said. "We will collaborate with local health officials and other State and local authorities to help us assess the current level of mitigation needed.

"We have had a lot of conversation, and will continue to do so," she added. "There are so many variables."

Discussion was held on plans for the 2020 TCHS Graduation. One hundred two (102) students have completed their courses to receive their diploma. Commencement is scheduled for Saturday, June 27, 10 a.m. at the Falcon Football Field. Unfortunately. due to COVID-19, this cannot be open to the public. (See Page 14 for information on the event).

The District can never thank these individuals enough. They did an amazing service for the people. On April 24, 100,000 meals had been distributed.

There was a core group of Todd County School District Staff (see those listed above) who were there packing food daily, many at 6 a.m. These workers came from all departments of the TCSP - Food Service, Bus Shop, Teaching Staff, Administration. Many other staff members also filled in occasionally.

On May 29, 2020, the last delivery of the project went out to the people.
