New write-ins join races

The General Election candidate filings for the Plainview area were updated again this week, with two new candidates filing as write-ins and joining the race in the Plainview City Council and Board of Education for District #5.

According to Pierce County

Clerk Shannon Wragge, Shelley Sellin has filed as a write-in candidate for the Plainview City Council, and Melissa Doerr has filed as a write-in for the Plainview Board of Education for District #5.

To elect a write-in candidate, a voter must darken a circle next to

a blank line, and write-in the candidate's name as it appears in the Clerk's records to be officially counted.

Sellin joins Bryon K. Alder and Tyler Sanne, who both filed and will appear on the ballot, and Damon Wallace, who also filed as a write-in candidate on the Plainview City Council ballot. Only two candidates will be elected in this race.

Doerr joins the field of Krista Hanks, Michael Sauser, Deb Jensen and Chance Anderson in the District #5 race. Three candidates will be elected in the Plainview Public School Board member race.

The 2020 General Election will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 3 with early ballots encouraged, mail-in ballots available and a polling place for in-person voting on Nov. 3 at the Plainview Library for the majority of the Plainview-area voters.

Understanding the NCDHD risk dial

Since the start of the Coronavirus, people have heard of North Central District Health Department's (NCDHD) risk dial. But what is the risk dial and what factors does the risk dial consider?

Risk level is based on the past three weeks of data and represents current risk status. The risk level is assessed and updated each week on Wednesday. The NCDHD risk dial considers seven factors; overall positivity rate, weekly positivity rate, trajectory of cases in past 14 days, healthcare capacity, identifying community clusters, testing availability, and the ability to contact trace in 24 hours.

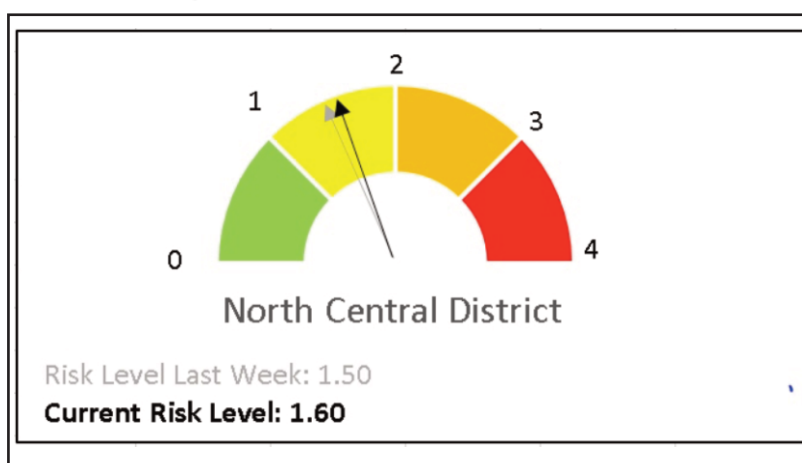
The overall positivity rate is the total number of confirmed (positive) cases, as a percentage of the total number of tests completed. This is calculated at the regional and county level. The weekly positivity rate is the number of confirmed (positive) cases in a week, as a percentage of the total number of tests completed within that week. This is calculated at the regional and county level. Trajectory of cases in the past 14 days is the increase or decrease in the number of confirmed cases. This is calculated at the regional and county

level. Healthcare capacity is the percentage of beds available, out of the total number of staffed beds in the RROMRS region. Also including, NCDHD region PPE availability and is calculated at the regional level. Identifying community clusters is the proportion of confirmed cases that can be identified as a community exposure. This is calculated at the regional and county level. Testing availability is the ability to obtain testing and is calculated at the regional and county level. Ability to contact trace in 24 hours is the ability to complete contact tracing of a confirmed case in 24 hours. This is calculated at the regional level.

The NCDHD risk dial has four colors and each color represents the risk level. COVID Green is a low risk of COVID-19 spread. COVID Yellow is a moderate risk of COVID-19 spread. COVID Orange is a high risk of COVID-19 spread. COVID Red is the severe risk of COVID-19 spread.

COVID Green: Low Risk of COVID-19 Spread

Physical distancing: outside the home (i.e., work, social, in public)- No distancing, resumption of normal work and community life. Resume normal travel with considerations of COVID activity in destinations. At home- No distanc-



ing for people without symptoms, unless they are under quarantine as a result of being exposed to someone who is infected. Self-isolation of symptomatic persons.

Face covering: outside the home (i.e., work, social, in public)- No face coverings for healthy people. Face coverings for symptomatic people. At home- No face coverings for people without symptoms, unless they are under quarantine as a result of being exposed to someone who is infected. Face coverings for symptomatic people.

Hand washing: outside the home (i.e., work, social, in public)- Frequently wash hands for at least 20 seconds, especially after touching high contact surfaces, sneez-

ing/coughing/touching face, or before eating. Use hand sanitizer when handwashing is inaccessible or infeasible. At home- Frequently wash hands for at least 20 seconds, especially after touching high touch surfaces, sneezing/coughing/ touching face, or before eating.

Illness monitoring: outside the home (i.e., work, social, in public)- If ill with flu-like or COVID-like symptoms, Stay at Home. Minimize contact with symptomatic people. At home- Be aware of COVID-like symptoms. Contact medical care provider if you have COVID-like symptoms.

Disinfecting: outside the home (i.e., work, social, in public)- Increased awareness of germ trans-

mission through high contact surfaces. Incorporation of COVID-19 disinfection practices for high touch surfaces. Avoid bare hand contact with any high touch surface. Use a barrier such as a paper towel or clothing when bare hand contact is unavoidable. Wash hands or apply sanitizer after touching high contact surfaces. Normal disinfection, especially for high contact surfaces (door/other handles, light switches, bathroom fixtures). At home- Increased awareness of germ transmission through high contact surfaces. Normal disinfection practices with consideration for high contact surfaces (door/other handles, light switches, bathrooms).

At-risk or vulnerable population: for those over age 65 with underlying health conditions, and other populations at heightened risk from COVID-19, you do not have to stay home at all times; but, should continue physical distancing when possible in public settings. Cautious expansion of interactions with others, reengage in small social settings, outdoor activities preferred. Avoid large group settings and events with many people.

COVID Yellow: Moderate Risk of COVID-19 Spread

Physical distancing: outside the

home (i.e., work, social, in public)- Consider staying at home most of the time, with caution for non-essential travel and work. At work, stay six feet apart and wear a mask when you cannot. Distance at least six feet from anyone outside the home. Individual outdoor activities such as walking, biking, etc... are acceptable. Cautious expansion of interactions with others, outdoor activities preferred. Gatherings only with modifications for COVID-19. Events only as guided by PPHD. At home- No distancing for people without symptoms, unless they are under quarantine as a result of being exposed to someone who is infected. Self-isolation of symptomatic persons. Outdoor activities with distancing are acceptable.

Face covering: outside the home (i.e., work, social, in public)- Face coverings suggested when unable to distance. Face coverings for symptomatic people. At home- No face coverings for people without symptoms, unless they are under quarantine as a result of being exposed to someone who is infected. Face coverings for symptomatic people.

Hand washing: outside the home (i.e., work, social, in public)-

Board of Education to review calendar, COVID

Calendar changes, air purifiers and a host of new policies were announced on the Plainview Board of Education agenda as of Tuesday, Oct. 6 for the Board's Monday, Oct 13 meeting, among other items.

The Board of Education has two items on the "discussion side" of the agenda, as of Tuesday: Covid response plan; Committee report on American Civics and review of Board Police series 504.12-504.18.

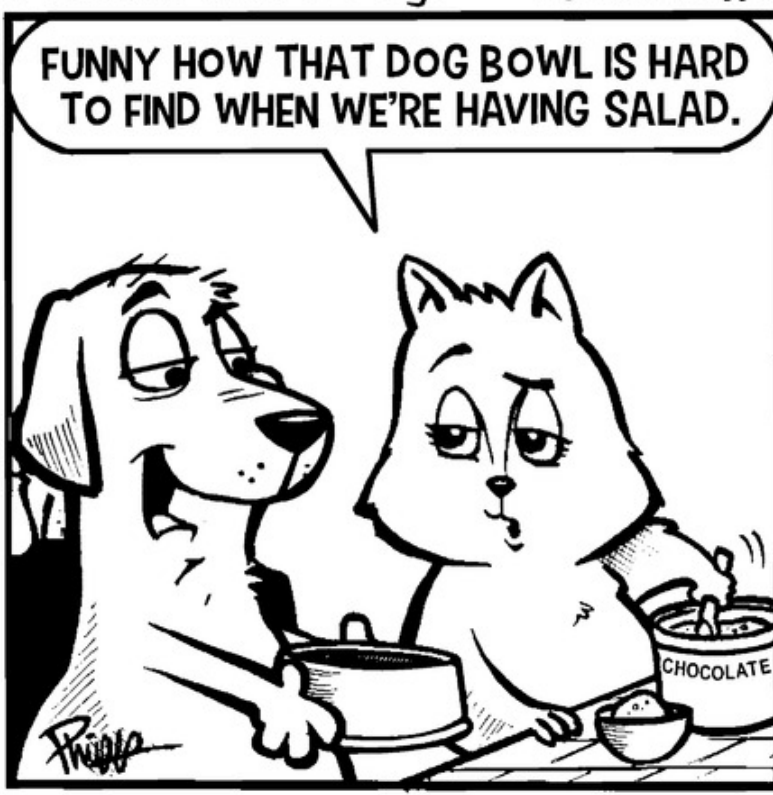

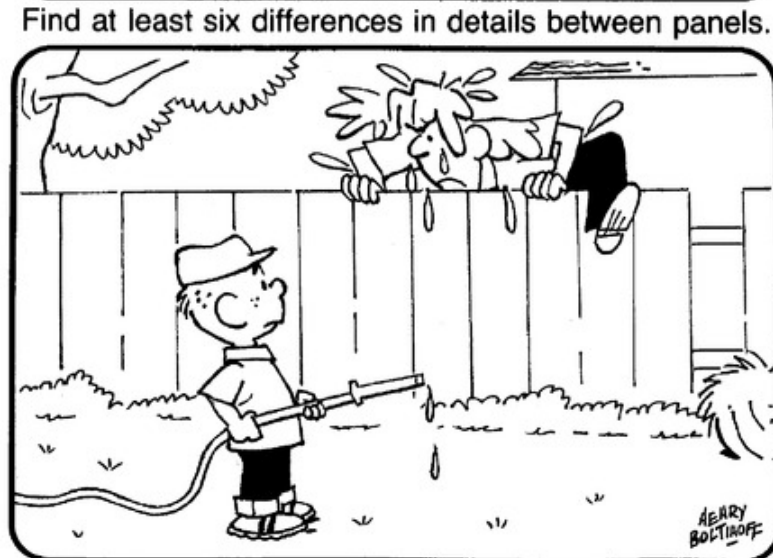
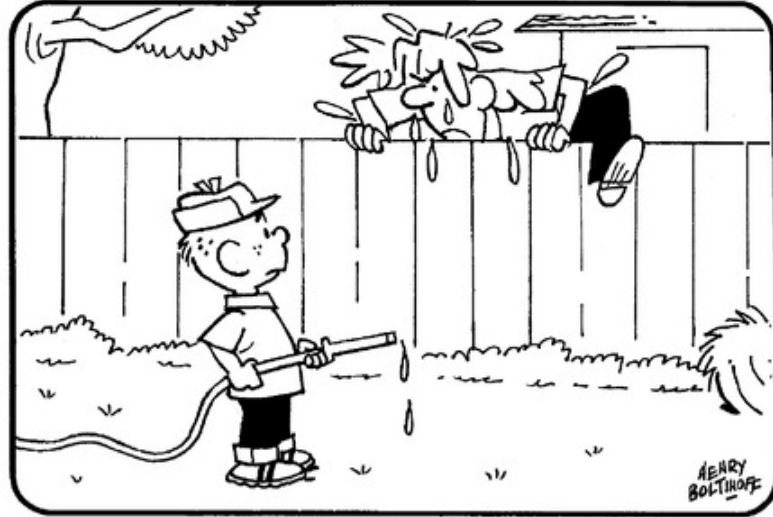
