Dr. Steiner:

At Northern Cass, we believe every student can change the world; therefore, we must provide a world class education. To be able to do this, we follow our Collective Commitments which guide the daily behavior of all staff. These commitments are 'what' we do at Northern Cass.

- 'We are dedicated and passionate about relationships, teaching & learning, self-reflection, acknowledging greatness, and support of the Northern Cass community'
- 'We are driven toward continuous improvement'

Why personalized learning? If we are provided a page to read, it is almost guaranteed everyone will finish at various times. This is because we learn differently. Therefore, we have committed to a personalized competency-based learning (PCBL) system. Like anything, there is no perfect system. Just like the traditional system had its areas to grow, so does our system. The difference between the two systems is PCBL can grow and adapt with our learners while the traditional system expected the opposite. I continue to be proud of the work our educators and learners have done to reimagine and recreate a system which honors individual learners while providing them with signature experiences.

Recently, I had the opportunity to attend the Schools of the Future conference. It was great attending a conference with so many 'like-minded' educators. During the conference, we hear from many great keynote and breakout presenters. For this newsletter, I would like to share three takeaways.

- 1. Every learner should make a substantial contribution to their community.
 - a. Last spring, we implemented our 'Studio' commitment. The initial results were positive with learners expressing they engaged in self-directed learning, found relevance in the process, and felt learning was authentic. Part of the requirements of every studio is impacting the community. In a brief time, we have seen learners engage with our community and begin to create connections which will create a sense of belonging while ingraining our learners in our communities.
- 2. When you are dragging people to the bus, no one is driving.
 - a. We often hear we must get the right people on the bus. The speaker shared she worked so hard to get the right people on the bus that no one drove it for part of the year. When no one is driving the bus, nothing gets accomplished. Most buses 'come back' around as part of the route. We need to stop worrying about getting people on the bus in the immediate and celebrate and work with those who chose to get on. There will be another time for others to 'ride' the bus. If they did not get, it wasn't the right time.
- 3. There are so many mountains in life. We must know 'why' we are climbing that mountain.
 - a. My dad used to say, "Is that the mountain you are going to do die on?" I knew what he meant but I never considered the 'why' behind the question. Why are we climbing that mountain? If we fail to identify our 'why', we fail to establish purpose. If we fail to establish purpose, the 'climb' provides a false sense of accomplishment. We must all commit to understanding the 'why' within our lives. By doing this, we can live a fulfilled life which impacts those around us in a positive way.

Proposed Community Project: On October 5th, Northern Cass School and Essentia Health met with community leaders and key partners to discuss a potential project that could benefit everyone in our district - a Community Health and Wellness Center to be located at Northern Cass School. This idea comes out of many conversations with Essentia Health, school district partners, community members, local organizations, and staff around the work of being a Full-Service Community School. We are excited to now share this idea with you (Community Project Letter). This is **not** a bond referendum but is an innovative project which could become a model utilized throughout the region. We have begun to build a task force to study this concept and analyze the needs of our communities. Over the course of the next few months, we will continue to update you on our progress and plans. 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

Northern Cass Robotics Team (NCRT) had a win that was "Made 2 Order" at this year's Jackrabbit BEST Robotics Tournament at the Swiftel Event Center in Brookings on October 22, placing first in both the Robot Performance and overall, in the BEST Award. The BEST Award is presented to the team that best embodies the concept of "Boosting Engineering, Science, and Technology." The five elements of the BEST Award are: Project Engineering Notebook, Marketing Presentation, Team Exhibit and Interview, Spirit and Sportsmanship, and Robot Performance. In addition to the first-place finishes, the team also earned the Founders Award for Creative Design. This award is given to the team that makes best use of the engineering process in consideration of offensive and defensive capabilities in robot design, awarded in recognition of BEST founders Steve Marum and Ted Mahler. The team has six weeks to prepare for the Denver Regional BEST Tournament on December 3-4. The contest will feature 24 teams from eight hubs across the country.

This year's game, Made 2 Order, marks the 30th Anniversary of BEST Robotics. For the past 29 years, BEST students have designed and built a robot they controlled with the student's brain and dexterity. This year, however, the student was being replaced by a robot. Teams were tasked with designing, building, and controlling a robot that could assemble and control another robot. Their robot needed to be as good and dexterous as the student because it was now operating, in this BEST game, with the same limitations and restrictions the students normally have.

They were on survival teams, charged with preparing the shelter, water & hygiene, safety, food, and fire needs for the entire group.

Many people thought they were crazy to go camping in the middle of October in North Dakota, but the number of memories made it worth it for all involved, educators and learners alike. From huddling around the fire making smores & hot cocoa to building makeshift lean-to shelters, from playing ditch with friends and sharing stories to hiking a combined 10 miles in 24 hours through rolling sandy hills, this was a trip they won't soon forget. In fact, as one learner put it the morning after coming home, still feeling exhausted and worn out: "You guys, I kind of wish we were back there, camping together."



Northern Cass Data Snapshot - SECONDARY Fall Testing Report: aimswebPlus 2022-2023

<u>Percentile</u> provides a measure of a learner's reading/math ability compared to other learners in the same grade nationally. The score ranges from 1 to 99, and indicates the percentage of other learners nationally who obtained scores equal to or lower than the score of a particular learner. For example, in a group of 100 learners, the learner who obtains a percentile rank score of 85 performed as well as or better than 85 other learners in the same grade (Renaissance STAR, 2019).



Every Body is Different


How do you feel about your body? What do you see when you look in the mirror? Think about this, if everyone ate the same thing and exercised the same way... we would still look different. Every body is different based on genetic inheritance, bone structure, shape and weight.

Body image is the way we see ourselves - the way we internally and externally talk about ourselves based on how we look.

So what is an "ideal" body weight? An "ideal" body weight is one that allows you to feel strong, energetic, and lets you live a healthy life. You have the energy to interact with friends and family, participate in sports, and concentrate on school or work. Avoid comparing your body with your friends or people you see in the media. Charts, formulas, and tables may be misleading and should be used under the guidance of a qualified expert. Negative body image can lead to the development of mental health issues such as depression.

Recognize the Signs of Negative Body Image

- Someone who compares themselves with others
- · Someone who feels inadequate
- Someone who often feels ashamed or embarrassed
- Someone who lacks confidence
- Someone who fixates on parts of their body, such as their nose, arms, or chin



How Parents Shape Body Image in Their Children

The way parents feel about their bodies has a big influence on the children in their sphere. Think about what you may be saying about your own body. Negative self-talk about your big thighs or your latest diet are negative messages your kids will pick up on. The problem with negative self-talk is that it teaches your child to over analyze their own body. This can lead children to negative self-talk about their own bodies. Ultimately this may have an impact on their behavior and can lead to eating disorders, anxiety or depression.

Positive Body Image

Positive self-esteem has a direct connection with positive body image. Helping a child feel good about themselves often starts with you. When adults celebrate what they love about themselves and use positive self-talk, such as "I am strong, confident, and capable" children are more likely to use the same positive self-talk.





Northern Cass Families of Learners in Levels 6-12:

As the weather seasons are starting to change, it is important to start looking ahead to the winter months. With the colder temperatures looming, it is important to start thinking about inclement weather and the school days.

I have included our virtual learning policy from our Secondary Handbook which has been approved by the Northern Cass Board of Education. The ability to have instruction count for virtual days prevents the school from having to make up additional hours or remove previously scheduled days off from the calendar.

Please review our policy with your learner and note the steps that are needed to be taken to excuse your learner from the virtual school day. It also lays out the steps that will take place if a learner does not meet the attendance requirements for a virtual instruction day.

If a family does not have access to the internet, then the family must reach out to the school and we can work on securing a hot spot.

VIRTUAL LEARNING ATTENDANCE: BECAUSE OF WEATHER OR OTHER CONDITIONS

Northern Cass School District has adopted board policy (Code: ABAC) where the District may temporarily offer virtual instruction when weather or other conditions require the Superintendent or designee to cancel hours of instruction. To meet attendance requirements for virtual learning, learners will have one assignment in each class and must turn it via Empower. An assignment that is turned in and completed to a high standard will count as present for class.

Learners are expected to complete homework that is connected to current learning and it needs to be relevant to what is currently being taught in the learning center. Homework for each class will be located in Empower/ALEKS (ALEKS is for Math) and communicated out throughout email. Each educator will provide office hour times and will be required to host 60 minutes of office hours.

Learners will be assigned a task that is to be completed by 4pm the day of virtual learning. Parents will need to excuse their learner by email, by emailing attendance@northerncassschool.com, otherwise learners will be expected to complete the task and count for attendance. It will be up to the learner to reach out to the educator to make prior arrangements earlier in the day if additional time is needed. Learners need to email educators (or log into office hours) prior to 3pm for requests on extensions to finish assignments.

Learners who do not submit homework by 4pm and haven't been excused by a parent or guardian will be counted unexcused for each class where work is not completed, have their Habits of Work docked in preparedness, which may result in becoming ineligible. An unexcused absence will result in learners serving a half hour detention for failure to meet attendance requirements, which is similar to our in-school policy of not attending a class that is excused by a parent or guardian.

Learners and their families will be notified by classroom educators the following day of their learners absence and school administrators will be contacted to assign detention to the learner for not meeting attendance requirements.

NURSES' CORNER: VISION (November 2022)

Often parents and even the child are not aware that they have a vision problem. We are so fortunate to have PTO support and involvement in vision screening for our PK-6 students. Parents have expressed much appreciation for this service. The school nurse is also available to test students by individual referral.

Vision problems do affect the educational, social, and emotional development of children. It also affects a child's safety. This screening is important, but it can miss correctable problems that an observant classroom teacher or parent can look for. Some symptoms to look for may include:

- + complaints of blurred or double vision
- + frequent rubbing of eyes
- + turning head to one side when reading
- + complaints of dizziness, headaches, or nausea
- + squinting, blinking, or frowning
- + holding a book too close or too far away
- + poor reading ability
- + losing the place when reading or copying
- + poor handwriting
- + symptoms of color-blindness (about I in 12 boys are "color-blind")

If these symptoms are noticed in a student, and a vision problem is suspected, contact a vision specialist for further examination. You may also contact the school nurse. She will use the Keystone Telebinocular Test to determine a need for further referral.

A big shout out to the Northern Cass PTO and Fargo Lions for helping with a successful Vision Screening Day for PK-6 learners. Northern Cass truly appreciates your assistance.

United States Presidential Scholars

The U.S. Department of Education is again asking for nominations for the <u>U.S. Presidential Scholars Program</u>. All graduating high school seniors who score exceptionally well on their SAT or ACT college admission test are automatically considered for participation. *In additional, each Chief State School Officer (CSSO) may nominate ten male and ten female candidates based on their outstanding scholarship, residing in the CSSOs jurisdiction. I'm asking for schools to nominate their students who demonstrate outstanding achievement and potential but may not have superior ACT scores (this cycles ACT cut off score has not yet been determined). Your nomination should include the students name, email address, gender, address, your high school name and code, and a narrative explaining what makes the student stand out among his or her peers.

There is no length requirement for the narrative, and it does not need to be in any specific format, but it should highlight the students' academic and personal achievements. For example, were there special challenges or hurdles this student has overcome while still achieving high academic success? Also keep in mind that nominees at the semifinalist and Scholar Evaluation levels will be assessed on involvement and service (in school and in the community), leadership and character, writing, and academic achievement. Discretionary points may be awarded for extraordinary achievement, heavy workload, family responsibilities, or obstacles overcome.
