Dear Partners in Education,

As I conclude my first year as your superintendent of schools, I'd like to thank all of the wonderful students, staff, parents, community members, business owners, first responders, and local officials who make Lansing a great place to be! The support I've felt for the collective education of our children is second-to-none and we have accomplished a great deal in Lansing School District 158 this past year. Our Board of Education recently adopted a new 2019-2024 Long-Range Strategic Plan that will prioritize district improvements in the areas of finance and facilities, human resources, public relations, student services, and technology over the next five years. A copy of this plan is enclosed. Additionally, District 158 received a \$1.8 Million Property Tax Relief Grant from the State of Illinois that will reduce the school district portion of your Fall 2019 property taxes. Only 28 Illinois school districts were selected for this grant. Although this may only be a one-time deal, District 158 is committed to finding ways to put resources back into the local community.

Our students continue to excel in both academics and athletics, with three placing at the State Science Fair and a Memorial Junior High School eighth grader – Ana-Liese Torian – winning the State Hurdles Championship! We also graduated 30 National Junior Honor Society members, 43 eighth graders passed the Spanish Proficiency Exam to receive high school credit, and a record 130 senior citizens attended Memorial's 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Senior Brunch. It was also my honor to recognize six retirees (picture below), five Staff Members of the Year, and two recipients of Perfect Attendance Awards at this year's Retiree Luncheon. I am truly impressed and inspired by the ongoing excellence of our students and staff. District 158's Buildings & Grounds Team also continues to impress, receiving a Perfect Facility Inspection from the South Cook Intermediate Service Center (also pictured)! At our April Board Meeting, we welcomed a new Board Member – Mrs. Denise Jones-Williams – and thanked retiring Board President Mr. Robert Bonifazi for his service. In the final words of Mr. Bonifazi, "We are #158Strong!"

We have heard so many comments from students and parents that they truly felt loved and cared for this year, which in turn lead to some amazing learning. Not only did our Oak Glen teachers open their arms for all students, they brought learning experiences to the classroom that will be remembered forever! Some of the lessons taught were our first graders being formally invited to Cinderella's Ball, third and fourth graders became heart surgeons and 5<sup>th</sup> graders working together to find their way out of an escape room! Not only were all of these activities fun and engaging, they also produced rigor and meaningful learning. This can be seen in our MAP data for the year. We are proud to say that when looking from our Fall MAP assessment to the Spring, 69% of Oak Glen students met or exceeded their expected score in Math, while in Reading 60% met or exceeded their expected score.

Be on the lookout next year for our expansion of Oak Glen's Student Lead Vlog (Video Blog), <u>Sharing Smarts with the Oak Glen Grizzlies!</u> This vlog showcases topics that our own students want to share with the world! This year we had students show us how to make sushi, what it means to be kind, and how the Zones of Regulation can help us to monitor our emotions.

Last but not least, Oak Glen was able to continue partnering with local establishments and agencies. This year we were able to have the SSJC Basketball Team come in and shoot hoops with our Hoops for Hearts fundraiser winners. We were visited by our Lansing Kiwanis to celebrate students making academic gains at the end of each quarter, as well as a delivery of dictionaries to our third graders. Bedtime Story Night had many guest readers including Lansing's Police, Fire, and very own Mayor Patty Eidam! We concluded the year by having both the Oak Glen and Coolidge Peacemaker Choirs, led by Mrs. Mary DiGrispino, visit St. Anthony's home and sing for them. After the concert, our 158 students played games and crafts with the residents.

#### W.C. REAVIS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Reavis students integrated technology in many ways during the 2018-2019 school year. Tools such as virtual reality headsets, programmable coding devices, one to one computing, a media broadcasting studio, and a newly installed hydroponic grow wall are just a few of the many technology components students have access to at Reavis Elementary School. The virtual reality headsets have given students the opportunity to see how this technology can be used as a tool to research and explore deeper Science and Social Science components such as mountains, oceans, space, and beyond. Students are able to take the information they read, connect it to their virtual reality experiences, and then write about it.

Our students worked to raise money and awareness to support such causes as breast cancer, leukemia, a toy drive for a local children's hospital, and a food drive to support the Lansing Food Pantry. This school year also saw students lead the way with poster campaigns during our Walk to School Day to speak up against bullying. We also had a great assembly presented by guest speakers, Vincent Gray and Brian Kizer, Sr., from *Follow Your Dream*. They spoke to our students on the topic of bullying prevention. Our students and staff were both moved and inspired by their presentation.

As we ended the school year at Memorial, many exciting events took place. Our students in the Music Department performed for the Spring Concert and the Drama Department put on a great production of *Seussical Jr*. Our 6<sup>th</sup> graders completed their final Science project for the year with the annual Egg Drop spectacular. With this project, students were tasked to use their engineering skills to develop a durable device that could protect an egg from cracking at various heights. The final stage of this project involved a little help from our Lansing Fire Department by testing the durability of students' projects from the staggering height of their ladder fire truck, stretching up to the sky. The 8<sup>th</sup> grade class had an exciting end to their time at Memorial with trips to see the Windy City Thunderbolts baseball team, as well as a trip to Great America. We also had an exciting Career Day program, with professionals from many different fields talking to our 8<sup>th</sup> graders about the importance of education in their life and setting career goals. The year ended for our 8<sup>th</sup> grade students on May 29<sup>th</sup> with an amazing commencement ceremony at the Serbian Center and our 6<sup>th</sup> grade Orientation which took place in June to welcome the 5<sup>th</sup> graders and their families from our feeder schools in preparation for their start in August 2019.
