We have had a successful start to our school year, despite the unusual circumstances. The students are learning and using our new routines both here at school on in-person days, and in their virtual classrooms on remote days. Thank you for your ongoing support, patience and flexibility as we work to ensure the safety and success of all our students!

The students have worked hard and done well with our fall NWEA reading and iReady math testing. This will give us valuable information about student skills and needs that we will use to design the most effective instruction. You will have a chance to hear more about your child's progress and share any questions or concerns during our virtual Parent-Teacher Conferences on October 28th. More information will come from your child's teacher about signing up.

In our hybrid model, your children are considered as participating in school on all days of the week. Teachers are monitoring attendance on both in person and virtual days. Students are expected to respond to the attendance prompt on remote days in order to be considered "present". If your child does not respond to the daily prompt, your child is marked absent. We monitor attendance closely as part of our district Drop Out Prevention Plan. If attendance is a concern, myself, your child's teacher, or Miss T will be in touch. Please remember your child should be actively completing the work that is assigned on remote days. This is a critical part of their learning experience, and grades.

While we continue to operate in a hybrid model, we are also prepared for the possibility of learning fully remotely if our community is designated a "red" zone. If we must shift to a remote model, we will continue to provide meals to students. More information will be coming from the Superintendent, along with a survey about meals. We are hopeful that we will remain in school, and look forward to having all students return. At the same time, we are working hard to be prepared to adapt our teaching and learning to any situation. 


Did you know that October is National Anti-Bullying month? During Guidance class this month we will be focusing on the terms "rude", "mean", and "bullying", learning the differences, how to identify each behavior, and what to do about it all. Your children will learn that: "rude" behavior is behavior we may do that is not socially acceptable,

however it is usually due to a lack of thought. I may chew with my mouth open because I am not aware that it bothers you. "Mean" behavior is done intentionally- when I know my chewing with my mouth open bothers you and I do it anyway. "Bullying" is when I purposefully target you- sit by you at lunch so you have to watch and listen to me as I chew with my mouth open, and I do it day after day. Your children will be learning more about these words and how to handle different situations. We will be talking about personal assertiveness skills as well as being an "up-stander". We will also talk about being kind, accepting, and inclusive.

At Pittston-Randolph Consolidated School, on Monday, October 5, staff and students were encouraged to wear blue shirts to show our willingness to stand together to end bullying. On Friday, October 30, we will participate in the Million Mismatched Sock March. The wearing of mismatched socks shows respect to those who are different and feel like they don't fit in. It shows that it is OK to be different and that Pittston-Randolph Consolidated School is a safe place to be yourself. Instead of our usual giant paper socks for people to sign to show that they will not participate in bullying and they will speak up if they notice this behavior, we will have classroom socks for students to sign. I hope you will take the time to discuss with your children the importance of accepting and respecting diversity. What a boring world it would be if there was only one kind of flower, or bird, or ice cream, or person!

Daily self assessment questions:

- Have I been out of the State of Maine in the last 14 days?
- Do I or have I been living with anyone who is sick or guarantined?
- Do I or have I been around anyone exhibiting these symptoms within the last 14 days:
- Do I or have I had a loss of taste or smell?
- Do I or have I had shortness of breath?
- Do I have a fever or feel feverish?
- Do I have a cough or sore throat?
- Do I feel unwell today?
