#### **Dollar General in Peñasco?**

Dollar General is trying to open a store in the empty plot of land next to the post office. Many Peñasco residents are opposed to the idea of having a store that's the same as the Family Dollar but just with a different name. Workers from local businesses all agree that having this Dollar General would drive out our local businesses. Instead of adding the same thing twice, try to think about what this town actually needs.

Audrey Medina, a Family Dollar employee, feels that we don't need another store like this. "We have Garcia's and Pacheco's next door which are thriving. A new store will drive out those businesses." Clarissa Medina, manager of Family Dollar agreed. "Another store would take away from the family-owned businesses. Family Dollar is a big asset, and we do a lot for the community, but I feel like this is enough." Medina also said that in communities like Velarde and Espanola that had both a Dollar General and Family Dollar, one of the stores was forced to close. Another concern for the Family Dollar would be losing workers with the addition of a Dollar General.

Andy Jones, a Taos County employee, says he knows there's a stigma attached to dollar stores: "There's an idea that it's just a bunch of junk and it's just for poor people...I think they can be good and be bad. They can take away from other small businesses, they can take business away. But they can also provide something for the community." The planning department's job, according to Jones is to work with applicants, like the people who are working on this latest Dollar General, to make sure they meet all the requirements." He shared that to date, they haven't met all the requirements. "It's a process," Jones said. "We should make sure they meet all the requirements, like adequate parking, facilities, and a landscape plan."

He shared that if it does get approved it would have to fit in with the community and the development doesnt become a problem. If it does gett to a point where it will get approved or denied, the community has a say so. Community feedback is important, so that everyone in the Peñasco area has a chance to weigh in about whether it's good for the community or not. He feels like not being a Peñasco resident makes it hard to say whether or not it should be there. "A lot of times in the past, the community voice has been enough to be denied," he shared. Also, it's taken the Dollar General a year to finally want to finalize the decision of the build. To start buildning they'll need an access permit to work near the highway.

A lot of people in the town think opening a Dollar General would just be a waste. Opening a restaurant, gym, laundromat, car wash, feed/pet stores, clothing stores, a bank, credit union, police substation, etc would be a better option for the town. If the town doesn't want it, the chances of it being built are low since the community also has a say so.

## Planned Power & Internet Outage

#### Reason:

KCEC replacement of a significant transmission, distribution, and internet fiber pole

Kit Carson Electric Cooperative (KCEC) will be conducting a **PLANNED POWER OUTAGE** on **10/20/2022** and **10/21/2022**, replacing a 69 kV transmission, distribution and internet fiber pole that was damaged during last year's winter squall. KCEC is replacing the current pole with a more robust metal pole in preparation for this upcoming winter.

On Thursday, October 20, 2022, KCEC and contractors will replace the pole's distribution side, affecting 25-30 members on State Rd 240 Culebra Rd. The outage will last approximately eight hours, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

On Friday, October 21, 2022, KCEC and contractors will replace the transmission and fiber lines, affecting Penasco and surrounding areas. The outage will last approximately four hours, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Due to the high danger implications and remote location of the pole, KCEC and contractors need to implement enhanced safety protocols resulting in the two-day outage. KCEC encourages members to prepare for the outages and take proper necessary plans to secure the safety of members and their families.

#### Affected Areas




