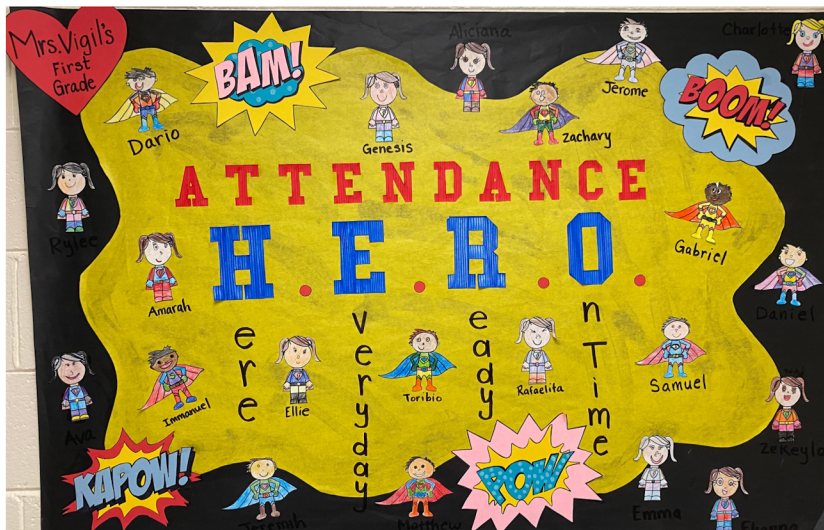

MOCK ELECTION 2022

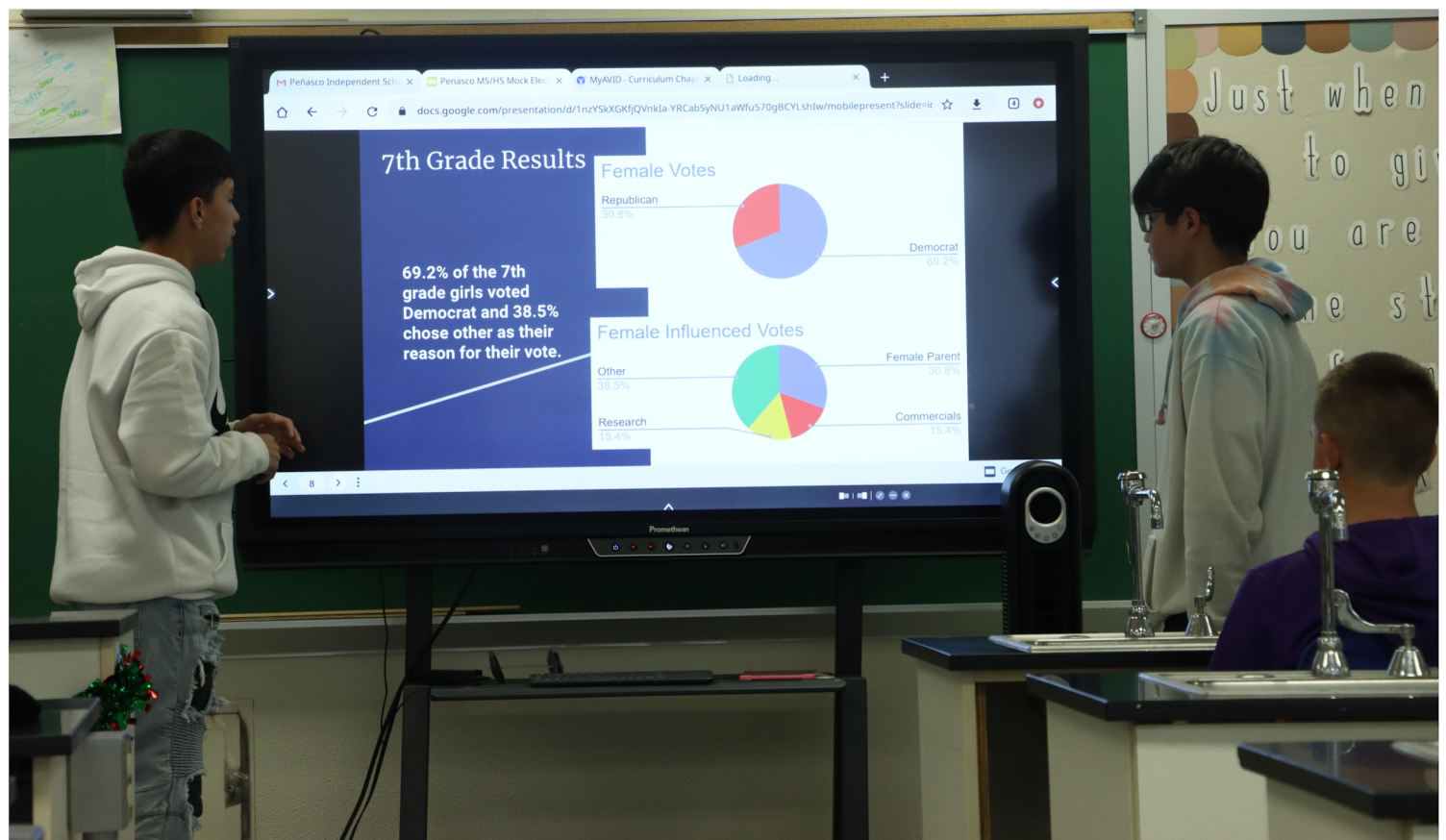

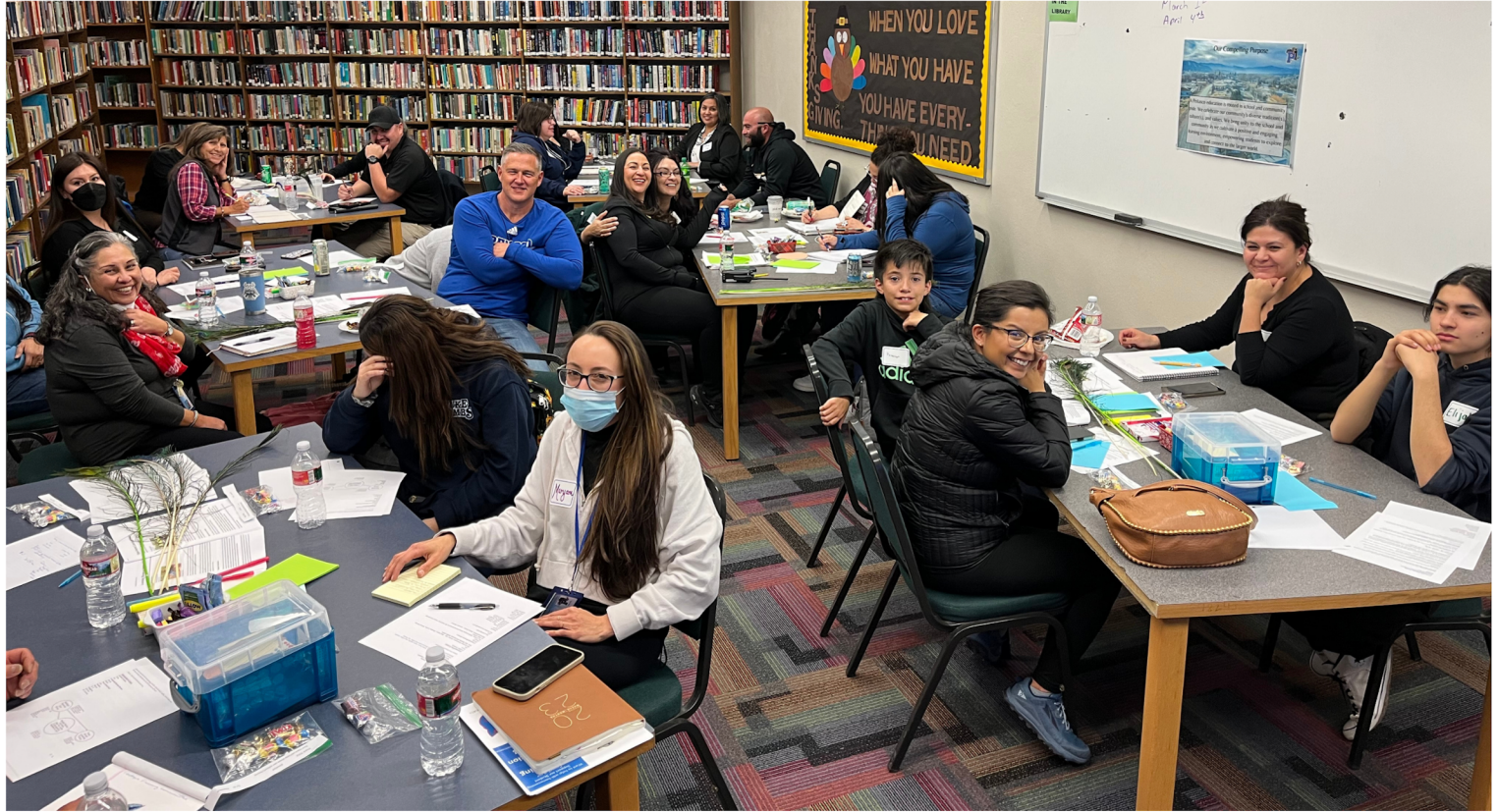

NEW ENTRANCES TO BUILDINGS

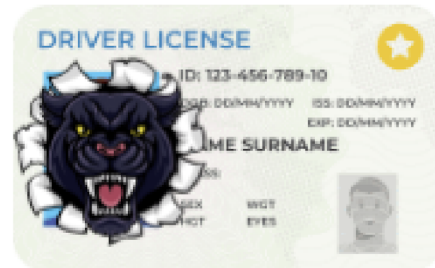
To enhance safety, the elementary and secondary buildings have been equipped with new entrances. School secretaries will buzz you in, and then you can check in with the secretary upon entry.

The Indian Education and AVID programs recently took 2 high school students to Albuquerque to attend the UNM Native American Senior day on October 12 th . This was an opportunity for students to apply to UNM, learn about the FAFSA application process and UNM scholarships, see the campus, and engage with school clubs. Our students did very well and participated in the activities. We went to Coronado Park for a picnic lunch.

Additionally, the coordinator spent time with the art classes to teach students about micaceous pottery. Students learned how to make pottery using the coil method including scraping, sanding and polishing. Because of the wet weather, the student's



pottery was fired in the kiln. Using the kiln also guaranteed that the pottery would not break during the firing process. Sometimes if a pottery has an air bubble or a small rock the pot may break during firing. All the pots the students made were very “ugly”. In Picuris, when we talk about pottery, we use opposite terms like saying that the pottery is ugly when we really mean it's very pretty. Our micaceous pottery is meant to be used; it's not made to be admired. That is why we say “wow that is an “ugly” pot!” Our students are very talented.



The Indian Education Act grant requires districts to write and submit a Tribal Education Status Report (TESR) every year that reports on the educational status of Native students in addition to the activities the district provides to support students. The TESR report was submitted to the Public Education Department and can be found on the both the PED and PISD websites. The TESR includes information on the previous school year and is due annually on September 30.

Sports Update

Peñasco fall sports ended on an interesting note. On Thursday, October 20th, the Peñasco Panthers kicked off the week against the Questa Wildcats in Questa. Peñasco comes to Questa with a losing record (5-7) and Questa wanting to up their winning percentage to (8-10) as they came into the game (7-10).

In the first set, Peñasco was strong, starting off 15-2 against Questa and finishing the first set with a win 25-16. The second set was a close one, but the Panthers weren't going to let their fans down and came up with another win, 25-22. The Panthers, hoping to end Questa in a clean sweep, started strong going up 10-0 but Questa did not let any of the tolerance slide as they went on to actually win the game in a shocking comeback 25-22. The fourth set was a live or die for Questa, making the score go over 25 points, Analise MaCauley wanted to go home, so she tried her best to win. The hard work paid off, and Peñasco improved their record to (6-7) and Questa disimproved to (7-11). On November 5th, Questa got to avenge themselves in Peñasco, and it will be Peñasco's last regular season home game.

Saturday, October 22nd was a busy day here in Peñasco sports with the Peñasco cross country team going to Santa Rosa to run and the Lady Panthers going to Mora for round 2. The Santa Rosa meet kicked off with the bus breaking down and canceling the meet for the Panthers. The runners stayed in the bus for about 40 minutes after the West Las Vegas bus came to help them. The Panthers drove back home with happiness because they did not want to run. Rochelle, Analise, and Kaileb had karaoke in the back of the bus. The Panthers went home safe on the West Las Vegas bus while the bus they took stayed.

The last time the Panthers played their rival Mora, tragedy happened as words were exchanged between adults and students in the parking lot outside of La Jicarita Gym, and also the Panthers lost 3-0.

The Panthers were ready to win, or so they thought. The Panthers kicked off the first set, losing 20-25. The Mora Rangers weren't going to let the Panthers win a single set, so the Rangers came out hungry in the 2nd set, winning again 19-25. The 3rd set was a disaster for the Panthers, as it was a win or go home situation. Mora again defeated the Panthers, sweeping them 19-25. To avoid any other fights between the two rival teams, the students from Peñasco did not attend the next game at Mora. I would say Mora had home court advantage as well as higher energy. That would be the last time the Panthers faced the Rangers for the season, and the Panthers would disimprove their record to 6-8 and their district record to 3-3.

On October 27th, the Lady Panthers (6-8) hosted the McCurdy Bobcats (2-12) in their Dig Pink game. The stands and the Lady Panthers were wearing pink to support breast cancer awareness. Signs were up everywhere around the La Jicarita Gym. #20 Cheyenne Martinez (libero) wore black for that game. It was a must win game for Penasco, and they beat the Bobcats before so why not do it again? McCurdy came out strong in every set, going up by at least 3-5 points, and then the Panthers would have to play catch up everytime. The fans were at the edge of their seats in the last minutes of each set. It was close the entirety of the game except for the 3rd set where Peñasco blew the Bobcats out by almost 10 points giving them the sweep and advancing to 7-8. Not a great look for the Bobcats, as they've been eliminated from playoff contention but still got a 0.1% chance.

On Friday, October 28th, the Panthers cross country team headed to Mesa Vista to go run. Ben Sanchez was hungry and wanted another qualification for state. The girls ran first, and they had a great run as team member Charnelle Gonzales got 2nd place, freshman, Rochelle Lopez got 4th place, 8th grader Maddisyn Rodriguez got 10th, junior Analise MacAuley placed 21st, 8th grader Amy Munoz was right behind Analise placing 22nd, sophomore Tristanee Lucero was one girl behind Amy, finishing 24th, senior Rhyen Vigil gets 26th, and last Panther coming in strong was Madison Rael placing 33rd. It was more than enough for them to win districts and go to state. And for the Peñasco boys cross country team, sophomore Jude

Martinez received 5th place, Jude's brother, freshman Jeremiah Martinez, gets 16th place, junior Matias Vigil got a good 27th place, freshman Kaileb Atencio was 10 places behind Matias coming in at 37th place, and sophomore Logan Romero was 2 places behind Kaileb getting 39th place. Finally, the two 8th graders, Walter Trujillo and Xavier Noll were the last to come in but did finish strong when Xavier Noll placed 55th and Walter behind him by 4 minutes, placing him 56th. The Panthers went on to place 5th as a team, and it was enough to qualify for state. At the end of the day, coach Ben Sanchez was not mad or happy about the meet, but he did get District 5-A/2A Girls 2022-2023 Cross Country Coach of the Year.

On Saturday, October 29, Escalante who came to Peñasco with an 8 game winning streak and undefeated in districts, came to play the Peñasco Panthers (7-8) who were coming off a win against McCurdy and were wearing the black and pink uniform as it still was breast cancer awareness week. Escalante (17-2) wanted to stay undefeated in their district, so they started off strong in the first set blowing the Panthers out of their socks 25-11. Everyone thought the Panthers were going to win the 2nd set, but it was Escalante getting back on their feet and taking advantage of the game to win, 25-6. Line judge Kaileb Atencio made great calls and was nominated for Line Judge of the Year. The Panthers had dinner at the gym afterwards to get along and be friends. The Panthers showed sportsmanship to the lobos and each other. October 20-29 were great days for the Peñasco sports industries.

It was a new month in Peñasco sports industries, and it kicked off on November 3rd, when the Peñasco Panthers went up to Ojo Caliente to face the Mesa Vista Trojans (3-13). The Panthers were coming off a loss in October against the Escalante Lobos making their record 7-9. It was a must win week for the Panthers, and they did not accomplish that goal. As they lost to Mesa Vista in an instant 3-0 game. It hurt their chances of making it to state, but they still had one game that could maybe determine whether they get in or out of the playoffs.

On November 5th, the cross country team went to Albuquerque to run state. The Lady Panthers ran first as they came off a district championship. Ben Sanchez wanted another trophy to put in the Panthers trophy case and a banner to hang up in La Jicarita Gym. The Peñasco girls did accomplish their goals and got 1st place as a team. Panther fans were really happy and the Lady Panthers brought home back to back state championships. Rochelle Lopez, freshman, got a good 2nd place. Charnelle Gonzales came in 2nd for the Panthers and finished in 17th place. 8th grader, Maddisyn Rodriguez, was behind Charnelle by 28 seconds and it was enough for Maddisyn to get 23rd place. Next to finish was senior Rhyen Vigil finishing 33rd. and junior Analise MacAuley, who fought hard against these other

women and finished 41st in the New Mexico State Cross Country Championship sponsored by Western Sky. Amy Munoz was in a great position to get the Panthers in 1st place as a team placing 60th. Tristanee Lucero was also fighting hard in this race and finished in 69th place.

The boys cross country team had an emotional finish. Sophomore Jude Martinez was training forever and ever and ever. He was struggling for districts and was not expected to get 5th place. His trainers and coaches were not doubting him at all. Former Peñasco student and state champ Gilbert Valdez helped him get through the Albuquerque Academy course with his special skills he used to win other years. For the first time ever, Jude Martinez got his first ever 1st place in any race before and set his personal record with a 16.51. Everyone was shocked and he even shocked himself. He did great and worked hard for that 1st place. It was well deserved and he is ready for next season. Jude's brother, Jeremiah Martinez, was also great when he ran an 18.58 and got 33rd place. Matias Vigil did great as

placing 44th with a time of 19.22. Kaileb Atencio was right behind Matias (like really really behind) placing 106th. Logan Romero placed 118th because earlier in the race he got kicked in the private part. Both 8th graders, Xavier Noll and Walter Trujillo, finished strong placing 159th and 160th. The Peñasco boys finished 10th as a team and it was a very fun experience.

On the same day as the Cross Country State Championship, November 5th, the Lady Panthers were not ready to play their last and final game of the season against the 10-11 Questa Wildcats. Peñasco was just coming off a loss 2 days before this game. It was parent and coach night and we saw that in the pregame every volleyball player gave their parents a flower. It was also going to be senior Sylvia Brown's last game playing volleyball, and most of these players were in tears because they were not ready to see the season end. In the first set it was a pretty close game but the Lady Panthers weren't going to lose on their last home game, so they beat Questa 25-27. The Panthers came out hot in the 2nd set but it wasn't enough at the end as Questa beat the Panthers 25-18. It was a back and forth game between these

two teams and in the 3rd set both teams kept fighting to prove themselves who's better. And Peñasco came out with the "W" 21-25. This was probably one of the most even matchups that we've seen, and in the 4th set once again it was back and forth but Questa barely just came out on top 26-24. Last and final set of the season for both teams and neither one wanted to lose the game. Questa wanted the last straw of this game and so they did, winning it all 15-10. The volleyball season ended on a tough note, but the team did show their sportsmanship to the Wildcats and post game the team had a family/friend dinner.

Both the Cross Country and Volleyball season ended. The fall sports were done and it was a great season for them. Kudos to both runners and players as they suffered from the bad and got through the troubles, but most importantly the bus rides and the fun times each of these teams had on the court and on the dirt.
