Dear Parents and Guardians,

Peñasco Independent School District is a nut-free school. The policy applies year-round in all areas of the campus. 








ELEMENTARY AFTERSCHOOL 3D PRINTING PROGRAM GETS A SHOUT OUT IN THE TAOS NEWS!

Spotlight on Ms. Noll

Stephanie Noll has been working at PISD since 2020 until now. She teaches high school ELA, journalism, and College English. During spring break of 2020 she began to set up her classroom when a district-wide notice got sent out that 2 weeks would be added onto spring break. She did not have the opportunity to teach in person until a year later. "I only knew students by the top of their head or their ceilings," Noll says about her experience teaching online.

Before teaching at Penasco, Stephanie Noll worked as a university lecturer at Texas State University for 12 years before coming here. She first came to New Mexico 25 years ago after going on a trip. She fell in love with the area and later on in life moved to Chamisal. "We decided to move here for a simpler life, a small community, we wanted to be close to nature and away from the city," Noll shared. She prefers to work with high school students because with college students they just walk in and get the grade. They just do their own thing. You don't get the chance to watch them grow and be a part of that. That is the main reason she came here to be a high school teacher again.

Ms. Noll always tries to make every year different and not do the same things every year for classes. The journalism class is always doing something. There is never a time where the students aren't doing anything for their articles. "For the first year of doing journalism the students have created something here that never existed before, and it just keeps getting better and better." Noll comments about the journalism class. The seniors at Penasco High School are creating children's books. They will read them to the elementary school as their last contribution to Penasco. Their books will be printed and kept in the elementary library. Even after teaching for 25 years, she is still learning new things and continues to try and be a better teacher.

Summer 2023 Forest Stewards Youth Corps

Crew Member Positions Job Announcement

Do you like the outdoors? Are you looking for a summer job? Then apply to be on a Forest Stewards Youth Corps (FSYC) Crew! FSYC is a program of the Forest Stewards Guild that provides employment and job training for youth in rural communities around New Mexico. FSYC participants complete natural resource management project and receive training and mentorship from USFS and Forest Stewards Guild employees. In addition, FSYC participants will receive CPR/First Aid certification and the opportunity to earn 2 college credits from Santa Fe Community College.

Duty stations for the summer program are Jemez Pueblo and the Mt. Taylor, Las Vegas/Pecos, Coyote, and Mountainair USFS Ranger Stations. While FSYC crews will be based out of Jemez Pueblo and USFS Ranger Stations, Crew Members will be employees of the Forest Stewards Guild.







WHAT TO EXPECT

- Position runs from June 5th- August 4th
- Mandatory overnight training June 5th-8th
- Members receive 14.00\$ an hour plus sick leave and paid holidays
- Must be able to work Mon.-Fri.
- Be a New Mexico resident between the ages of 16 and 22
- Be physically fit and able to work long days in the field under difficult conditions (heat, sun, rain, steep uneven terrain).

Watershed Management & Restoration Internship CREW SUPERVISOR Announcement

Applications due March 1, 2023

River Source is hiring Watershed Crew Supervisors to work with youth crews aged 15-25 years old in doing watershed assessment and ecological restoration for improving water and wildlife health. Each crew will have five crew members, a Crew Leader (aged 19-25 years old) and Crew Supervisor. This position is open to people who are 26 years or older with preference for applicants who have experience supervising youth crews or are high school teachers interested in water, land management, wildlife or watersheds.

The pay is \$25/hour for approximately 160 hours with the crew members plus approximately 16 hours of training and administrative work or up to \$4,400 for the hours worked.

The Crew Supervisor will be responsible for:

- Setting and following the River Source guidelines for crew member safety.
- Being present at all times alongside the crews or assigning the Crew Leader to supervise the group for limited periods when the Crew Supervisor cannot be present.
- Following and adapting the work schedule as needed to assist public agencies and private landowners with whom we are learning from and doing service projects.
- Provide oversight and, if needed, immediate feedback to crew members on learning-working related issues. Give crew members mentoring, learning opportunities and feedback on their performance of learning-working experience.
- Setting the example and tone for a positive, productive learning and working environment.
- Keeping accurate track of mileage when transporting crew members (reimbursed at \$0.50/mile) and expenditures from petty cash.

The Crew Supervisor works under the direction of the Director of River Source, Rich Schrader, or his assigned staff person. Successful applicants need to fully participate in order to receive payment up to 176 hours of work at \$25/hour for the four weeks at 32-40 hours per week.

The Crew Supervisor is required to have a clean driving record and a vehicle to provide their own transportation and ideally be ready to provide transportation for crew members if needed. Background checks are required to be hired for this job (River Source pays for these, but will need information from you).

The work locations for the crews include:

- El Rito training June 2, crew starts June 5-June 30
- Pecos training June 2, crew starts June 5-June 30
- Peñasco training June 2, crew starts June 12 July 7
- Las Vegas/Mora training June 2, crew starts July 5 August 2

Paid Watershed Management & Restoration Internship (Peñasco)-Summer 2023!

River Source is hiring for a paid internship opportunity in watershed management and ecological restoration. This position is open to 15-25 young adults for crew members and a crew leader.

5 Crew members: High school students in 9-12 grade, or students aged 15 - 18 or recent graduates with an interest in natural resources, environmental management, and/or water and watersheds.

1 Crew leader: Young adults who are 19-25 years old with experience working in teams and passion for water, watersheds, natural resources, and being a leader.

This is a paid internship, sponsored through River Source and Partners in Education Foundation, starting on June 12. The internship activities will take place in and around Peñasco, NM.

Work-Learn Activities may focus on:

- Collecting natural resource data using global positioning systems (GPS) and assessing potential locations for watershed restoration work;
- Learning and applying biological monitoring, stream ecology, and fluvial geomorphology for assessing the effectiveness of environmental management practices;
- Conducting ecological assessments in riparian areas;
- · Building erosion control practices to improve soil moisture, vegetation, and wildlife habitat;

Crew member pay: \$15.00 per hour for an estimated 160 hours of service learning.

Crew leader pay: \$20.00 per hour for an estimated 160 hours of service learning.

Internship period & supervision: Internships will likely start on June 12th and end on July 7. The work will occur on Monday-Friday schedule from 8:00 am to 4:30 pm for most weeks, but on some we may work longer days and only work 4 days per week.

The intern will learn under the direct supervision of River Source staff and a crew supervisor.


