# 2022 Distinguished Alumni Award - Dawn Cooksey



Dawn Cooksey attended Lincoln Lutheran from 1977 to 1979. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education from the University of Nebraska Omaha, a Masters of Arts in Gifted Education from the University of Nebraska Kearney and completed Colloquy studies from Concordia University, Nebraska.

Today, Dawn is the Director of Admissions for Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha, where she enrolls over 100 new students each year. In addition to admissions, Dawn wears many hats at school. For example, she serves on the PR, Marketing and Communications team, she's the Congregation and Community liaison, Yearbook Advisor, Quiz Bowl coach, and Student Ambassador Advisor.

Dawn's roots in education and her journey to Director of Admissions at Concordia Lutheran Schools started in the classroom. She taught 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade at Mount Calvary Lutheran School in Omaha, as well as 3rd grade at Omaha Public Schools. She spent two years in Ohio; one as a computer teacher for CompuQuest Educational Services and one as a third grade teacher for Cleveland Public Schools. She served as a

technology coordinator and teacher for Shepard of the Hills Christian School in Littleton, Colorado and a Gifted Education Teacher for Sioux Falls Public Schools. Next, she served at Christ Community Lutheran School in Kirkwood, Missouri as a 6th grade teacher and also implemented a school-wide gifted education program there called Destination Imagination.

And Lincoln Lutheran is not the only organization to bestow accolades on Dawn! She's also a Target Teacher Scholarship winner and a Disney Teacher of the Year Nominee.

# 2022 Distinguished Young Alumni Award - Margaret Ingerslew Lange



Lieutenant Colonel Margaret Ingerslew Lange attended Lincoln Lutheran from 1997-2001. She then attended Concordia University in Seward where she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration and Chemistry. She attended Officer Training School and was commissioned into the United States Air Force in 2008 where she serves as an evaluator and instructor Weapon Systems Officer on the B-52 and B-1. She continued her education in 2014 with a Master of Organizational Management from Brandman University in Irvine, CA. In 2020, while stationed at Maxwell Air Force Base near Montgomery, Alabama, she completed the Joint All Domain Strategist program and the School of Advanced Air and Space Studies through Air University. There, she earned a Master of Military Operational Art and Science in 2021 and a Master of Philosophy in Military Strategy in 2022.

Today, Lt Col Margaret Ingerslew Lange is employed by the United States Air Force as the Deputy Director of the Deputy Commander Action Group at Offutt Air Force Base. She is responsible for aiding the Deputy Commander to enact Commander initiatives, conduct targeted research, and synthesize inputs across the staff for Deputy

Commander special projects at United States Strategic Command. Prior to this assignment, she served as the Executive Officer to the Commander, United States Air Force Central Command. She previously held positions at the Wing and Squadron levels, serving as Director, Commander's Action Group, Assistant Director of Operations, Wing Executive Officer, and Flight Commander.

Margaret and her husband Seth have three children, Andersen, Madeline, and Scarlet. They've served their communities as youth group leaders, Sunday school teachers, as well as board members for United Way, Dollars for Scholars, and Junior Achievement. But they are most passionate about coaching various sports teams

As she looks back at her time as a Warrior, she fondly recalls band and choir tours, state music competitions, and the senior class trip. Her most favorite memories are the car trips to and from school with her friend Chelsea, who is still her friend going on 35 years.

# **Mental Health Services on Campus**



"The research can't be ignored," says Principal Sheila Psencik. According to data from the CDC, 44 percent of high school students said they felt persistently sad or depressed in the past year. A UNICEF study showed the alarming statistic that 73 percent of students who felt unmotivated and pessimistic about the future said they felt they **SHOULD** ask for help with those feelings, but only 33 percent actually did.

"At Lincoln Lutheran, we want to educate students about their mental health, " says Psencik. "Our teachers and administration do a great job of being available to students, but we also recognize that young people would benefit from the opportunity to receive services from a trained practitioner."

Mrs. Psencik contracted with GracePoint Institute for Relational Health, located within the University Lutheran Chapel located on UNL campus, to provide weekly,

on-site counseling services for Lincoln Lutheran students at no cost. "The goal of the program is to provide our students a safe, easily-accessible place to ask for professional help and receive Christ-centered care and counsel," says Psencik. The program started in September 2022 and has been well-received.

Therapist Hannah Neihardt, MS, PLMHP, NCC, has a private office at Lincoln Lutheran where she meets with students every Thursday. She specializes in individual counseling with adolescents and young adults who are dealing with anxiety, depression, trauma and relational issues.

Hannah, a Warrior alum, says that working with teens and young adults is her passion. "I hope to give students a positive experience of counseling to remove any stigma or misconceptions about pursuing mental health care whenever they need it - now and in their futures."

## **Rising Scholars**

Now more than ever, parents are wanting their child to have the type of learning experience that Lincoln Lutheran provides. One that aligns with a Christian worldview and that offers superior academics, while also nurturing their child's social, emotional, and spiritual intelligence at the same time. In some cases, the **only** obstacle holding families back is the cost of tuition. Thus...Rising Scholars was created. It is a first-of-its-kind, full ride and partial scholarship program for students new to Lincoln Lutheran. The application process was open September through December, and the response was impressive! In-person interviews were conducted with every applicant during January, and recipients will be announced in February.

# **ZAP ~ A New Academic Accountability Program**



"Failure to complete assignments can be a significant obstacle to a student's academic success," says Principal Sheila Psencik. "A single zero can dramatically damage a student's academic status." Therefore, ZAP was created to help hold the students accountable. ZAP is an acronym for:

### ZEROS AREN'T PERMITTED

If a student does not turn in their assignment, they receive a ZAP notice from their teacher and their parents are notified that they have been "zapped." Students report to the ZAP room immediately after school to complete the missing assignment before they leave for the day.

"The goal of the ZAP program is to provide academic support, promote good study habits, encourage responsibility, and instill work habits that will serve students well in college and the workplace. We want our students to have the skills to be successful in the future," says Principal Psencik.

# New Mentoring Program

"Every middle school child should have someone in their corner," says Sean Wieting, 6th grade teacher and newly appointed high school football coach at Lincoln Lutheran Middle and High School, "and that's why Warrior Walk was created."

It is typical for middle school students to have a dip in confidence and an increase in sullenness as they navigate this transitional phase. They are faced with different routines, shifts in old friendships, formation of new friendships and finding where they "fit" in a new environment with new people.

As a long-time mentor with Tom Osborne's TEAMMATES program, Wieting had seen the positive impact of mentoring and decided, "we need to do a similar program here so that every middle school student has an older Warrior to walk with."

But where does one even begin this type of undertaking? Wieting took his idea to the school's **C**ommunity **O**utreach **L**eadership **T**eam, aka COLT, to get the ball rolling. The purpose of COLT is to find and implement ways to serve others, a core value at Lincoln Lutheran.

Wieting and his fellow 6th grade teacher Brooklyn Schulte, along with the seven Lincoln Lutheran students on COLT, worked together to launch a small pilot program during the '21-'22 school year. "We matched nine middle school students with nine high school students," says Wieting. "It was wildly successful. Not only did it help the middle school students, but the high school mentors also reaped benefits."

Here are some quotes from the high school mentors who participated in the pilot program:

"When I look at my weekly schedule and see mentoring on Thursdays, it brightens my day. I'm not the most outgoing person, so mentoring has helped me with starting conversations and learning to talk to others." ~Trenton, Sophomore

"Even though some kids might not look like they need someone, they really do. Mentoring has made me think more about what other people might be going through." ~Cole, Senior

I love what mentoring has done for me! I have built a friendship with my younger mentee that I am so glad to have! I am beyond happy to be part of this program. ~Abby, Senior

I want to be the friend to my mentee that I would have liked to have when I was her age." ~Bre, Senior

With the success of the pilot program, it was decided that '22-'23 would be the year that every 7th and 8th grade student at Lincoln Lutheran would be matched with a mentor - 107 middle schoolers to be exact. Wieting needed at least that many students from the sophomore through senior classes to volunteer to be mentors. He confesses he was nervous there wouldn't be enough. Instead, he was amazed when received 117 "yeses" out of 123 students, which is **95 percent** of that section of the student body.



# New Mentoring Program

From there, the high school volunteers received mentor training in communication, trust, emotional intelligence and relationship building. A match committee analyzed pairing information from the students to ensure they were matched with someone who had similar interests.

Then, December 8 was Match Day. Finally, after months of anticipation, students gathered in the gym. Mentees lined up facing outward. Mentors lined up behind them. On the count of 3, the mentees would turn around and meet their mentor. Immediately, students were hugging and high-fiving and getting to know one another.

Mentors meet with their mentees every week during a teacher supervised period of the school day. They are free to choose whatever they want to do together. Some choose board games, art projects, shooting hoops or they can just hang out and talk if they prefer.

"I am so proud of this program and the group effort from the Community Outreach Leadership Team to get it off the ground. To me, it represents what it really means to be a Warrior," says Wieting. "A Warrior is not just our school mascot. It means more than that. Being a true Warrior means serving others, and that's what students are doing in this program. They serve by listening. They serve by just being there."
