We have an incredibly supportive foundation in CEEF, a clear demonstration of a community that that cares. I am asking you, urging you, to reach out and offer your time if you are able. Sign up to be a bus monitor. Sign up to be a substitute. Let's work together and be there for each other by lending a helping hand, as we have done so many times before.
