

AT&T ROC Virtual STEM Showcase

Over the summer, several students from the area participated in a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Camp hosted by Immersed Games and their flagship product, Tyto Online. Immersed Games harnesses the engaging power of video games to create a next generation STEM learning platform. Tyto Online is a video game geared to help middle school students learn science content and skills. The student experience includes activities like building ecosystems to learn ecology or breeding dragons to learn heredity. The camp objectives were to use Tyto Online to develop STEM skills and “do” science, explore game development careers, and experience pitching their own new quest designs.

The AT&T ROC Virtual STEM Showcase Celebration took place on Friday, August 21st where our very own 8th grade student, Abby Provo, and her camp partner were asked to present their own quest ideas. Their presentation was called Better Energy for the Earth. Their goal was to use the quest as a teaching tool related to the positive impacts of solar energy on the earth. During the quest, players would measure the amount of energy being supplied by a power plant versus solar panels, figure out which solar panels will work for their needs and successfully build panels for an entire city. “I really enjoyed this camp. We got to test Tyto online and create a quest. I would recommend this camp to people who are interested in game development. I will do this camp again next year if I am able to,” said Abby.

We are excited to have the students back in school. Our teachers and staff have worked hard to ensure that our students can attend school in person and fulltime. This year certainly will be unique; however, we hope to make things feel as normal as possible.

- WRT 105 Studio I: Practices of Academic Writing
- SPM 205: Principles & Contemporary Issues in Sport Management
- PST 101: An Introduction to the Analysis of Public Policy

Science teacher, Danielle Lown attended her training this summer where she became an adjunct instructor through Syracuse University. Her class is identical to that offered to matriculated Syracuse University students. Our students are using the same textbooks, and completing the same assignments and assessments.

- Behavioral Forensics Science





ETHAN PROVINO

WNYPGA PLAYER OF THE YEAR

At the age of 8 years old, Ethan Provino (now in 10th grade) took an interest in playing golf after watching the Masters Tournament in 2013. He began competing at the age of 12. Ethan plays tournaments for WNYPGA Junior Tour, CNYPGA Junior Tour, RDGA (Rochester District Golf Association), U.S. Kids Golf, and is on the MMCS D Golf Team.



Ethan is the recipient of the WNYPGA 2020 Player of the Year Award for boys 13-15. “Winning the Western NY Junior Player of the Year Award is one of my favorite memories,” he said.

Ethan recently competed in 10 one-day golf tournaments across Western New York and Pennsylvania, and a two-day tour championship for the WNYPGA Junior Tour. During the tour, Ethan placed first at Greystone, Willow Brook and Livingston Country Clubs. Each win is worth 50 points. Ethan took third in the Championships with 70 points. In addition to the 10 tournaments, Ethan played in the WNYPGA Junior Golf “56” Showcase Event held at Glen Oak Golf Club and placed fourth for his age group. Ethan was also recognized for being the best dressed player this season.

Last season, Ethan advanced all the way to the Drive, Chip and Putt National Finals, taking 5th place out of 80 finalists. Drive, Chip and Putt is a nationwide junior golf development competition aimed at growing the game by focusing on the three fundamental skills employed in golf; grip, stance and swing. Participants who advance through local, sub-regional and regional, qualifying in each age/gender category, earn a place in the National Finals. The National Finals are held at Augusta National Golf Club the Sunday before the Masters Tournament and broadcast live by the Golf Channel. Prior to last year’s finals, the Golf Channel released a Drive, Chip and Putt National Finals short film narrated by Tom Brady, titled “Greatness.” Ethan is featured in the film taking a swing during Qualifiers. “I feel honored to have made it to the finals because here, you are up against some of the best players in the North East. I came close to winning which was exciting and I also enjoyed making new friends,” said Ethan.

Ethan enjoys staying active and when he is not playing golf he can be found visiting with his grandparents, water tubing, knee boarding, playing soccer and spending time with his two dogs.

Parent Portal

Users of the schooltool portal are able to view student academic information, in real time, from any internet connected device. With a schooltool parent or student portal account, parents and students have access to the following:

- Student record (basic student information)

- Assignments and assignment grades (current course assignment information with notes by the teacher)

AHERA Management Plan



Notification of Rights under FERPA for Elementary and Secondary Schools

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students who are 18 years of age or older (“eligible students”) certain rights with respect to the student’s education records. These rights are:

1. The right to inspect and review the student’s education records within 45 days after the date the Mount Morris Central School District receives a request for access. Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal a written request that identifies the records they wish to inspect. The school official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
2. The right to request the amendment of the student’s education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student’s privacy rights under FERPA. Parents or eligible students who wish to ask the Mount Morris Central School District to amend a record should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it should be changed. If the school decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the school will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.
3. The right to provide written consent before the school discloses personally identifiable information (PII) from the student’s education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the school as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel) or a person serving on the school board. A school official also may include a volunteer or contractor outside of the school who performs an institutional service of function for which the school would otherwise use its own employees and who is under the direct control of the school with respect to the use and maintenance of PII from education records, such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist; a parent or student volunteering to serve on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee; or a parent, student, or other volunteer assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, the school discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll, or is already enrolled if the disclosure is for purposes of the student’s enrollment or transfer. [NOTE: FERPA requires a school district to make a reasonable attempt to notify the parent or student of the records request unless it states in its annual notification that it intends to forward records on request.
4. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the Mount Morris Central School District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:

See the list below of the disclosures that elementary and secondary schools may make without consent. FERPA permits the disclosure of PII from students’ education records, without consent of the parent or eligible student, if the disclosure meets certain conditions found in §99.31 of the FERPA regulations. Except for disclosures to school officials, disclosures related to some judicial orders or lawfully issued subpoenas, disclosures of directory information, and disclosures to the parent or eligible student, §99.32 of the FERPA regulations requires the school to record the disclosure. Parents and eligible students have a right to inspect and review the record of disclosures. A school may disclose PII from the education records of a student without obtaining prior written consent of the parents or the eligible student –

- To other school officials, including teachers, within the educational agency or institution whom the school has determined to have legitimate educational interests. This includes contractors, consultants, volunteers, or other parties to whom the school has outsourced institutional services or functions, provided that the conditions listed in §99.31(a)(1)(i)(B)(1) - (a)(1)(i)(B)(2) are met. (§99.31(a)(1))

Notification of Rights under FERPA for Elementary and Secondary Schools (Continued)

- To officials of another school, school system, or institution of postsecondary education where the student seeks or intends to enroll, or where the student is already enrolled if the disclosure is for purposes related to the student's enrollment or transfer, subject to the requirements of §99.34. (§99.31(a)(2))
- To authorized representatives of the U. S. Comptroller General, the U. S. Attorney General, the U.S. Secretary of Education, or State and local educational authorities, such as the State educational agency in the parent or eligible student's State (SEA). Disclosures under this provision may be made, subject to the requirements of §99.35, in connection with an audit or evaluation of Federal- or State-supported education programs, or for the enforcement of or compliance with Federal legal requirements that relate to those programs. These entities may make further disclosures of PII to outside entities that are designated by them as their authorized representatives to conduct any audit, evaluation, or enforcement or compliance activity on their behalf. (§§99.31(a)(3) and 99.35)
- In connection with financial aid for which the student has applied or which the student has received, if the information is necessary to determine eligibility for the aid, determine the amount of the aid, determine the conditions of the aid, or enforce the terms and conditions of the aid. (§99.31(a)(4))
- To State and local officials or authorities to whom information is specifically allowed to be reported or disclosed by a State statute that concerns the juvenile justice system and the system's ability to effectively serve, prior to adjudication, the student whose records were released, subject to §99.38. (§99.31(a)(5))
- To organizations conducting studies for, or on behalf of, the school, in order to: (a) develop, validate, or administer predictive tests; (b) administer student aid programs; or (c) improve instruction. (§99.31(a)(6)) To accrediting organizations to carry out their accrediting functions. (§99.31(a)(7))
- To parents of an eligible student if the student is a dependent for IRS tax purposes. (§99.31(a)(8))
- To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena. (§99.31(a)(9))
- To appropriate officials in connection with a health or safety emergency, subject to §99.36. (§99.31(a)(10))
- Information the school has designated as "directory information" under §99.37. (§99.31(a)(11))

Pesticide Notification

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2002, requires all public and non-public elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Mount Morris Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;

- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;

The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour notification list.


