

A more advanced class in Home Economics offered in Hillsboro High School is Home Living, in which students are taught how to manage a home.


Glick! Click! is a familiar sound heard in the typing room from day to day.

Disecting organisms (humans not included) plays an important part in the study of biology.


These students also study the structure of plants and living organisms.



Unable to overcome a so-called "jinx" held by Buhler High the Hills-boro Trojans lost the final game in the regional tournament held at Lincoln Kansas, by a score of 51 to 37. The local cagers advanced to the finals by toppling a tall Beloit team 62 to 59.

In the district tournament held at Marion, Hillsboro drew a bye the first night, won over Lindsborg 62 to 54, but lost to Buhler 47 to 34. The top two teams from here went to the regional.

Peabody squeezed past Hillsboro by one point to give the Trojans their only league defeat. By virtue of this, Peabody and Hillsboro tied for first place honors in the CVL.

At mid-season an invitational tournament was held at Hillsboro with Hope, Herington, Peabody, Council Grove Moundridge, and Hillsboro competing. The Trojans topped Hope 57 to 54 in their first game and won the final game with Moundridge 57 to 54.

The height of the season was a 44 to 42 win over a favored Planeview team in the last game before the tournament.

The Trojan "B" team ended with a 15 to 2 record to take the CVL.



In previous years, the Hillsboro chapter has won eighth, fourth, and sixth prizes on machinery exhibits at the state fair.








Orchestra
