All those attending the model legislature were requested to submit a bill or resolution. Out of 15 bills submitted, only 8 went through the committees, House, and Senate. With eight seniors and three juniors on the first eleven, the Hillsboro Trojans won first place in the Cottonwood Valley League. Coaches Beaman, Balzer, and Smith piloted the successful Trojans to the league championship for the first time since 1943. The first game of the season was dropped to Buhler by a score of 7-6. Relying on a tough defense the Trojans knocked off Florence by a score of 19-7. Marion became the

next victim and was smothered 19-7. On homecoming Hope journeyed to Hillsboro with hopes of upsetting the Trojans as they did the previous year. The invaders were sent home badly disappointed after being whipped 20-6. In the fifth game with Council Grove the Trojans met what was pegged to be their toughest opponent, but with superiority both in the line and backfield, Hillsboro was declared the victor by a 12-6 score. Now with a five and zero record, the way to the league championship looked close at hand. The second last game at Herington, which was expected to be a fairly easy game. The going was rough in the first half but Hillsboro came back strong

in the second half to bounce them 23-0. The grand final with the cellar occupant Cottonwood Falls, ended with a favorable 41-0 decision to give the Trojans a 7-0 record and the league championship.

During the 1952 season of 8 games, Hillsboro compiled the following statistics: Rushing 1771 - Yards passing 358 - Points 171 - 39.

Unable to overcome a so-called "jinx" held by Buhler High the Hillsboro Trojans lost the final game in the regional tournament held at Lincoln Kansas, by a score of 51 to 37. The local cagers advanced to the finals by toppling a tall Beloit team 62 to 59.

In the district tournament held at Marion, Hillsboro drew a bye the first night, won over Lindsborg 62 to 54, but

lost to Buhler 47 to 34. The top two teams from here went to the regional.

Peabody squeezed past Hillsboro by one point to give the Trojans their only league defeat. By virtue of this, Peabody and Hillsboro tied for first place honors in the CVL.

At mid-season an invitational tournament was held at Hillsboro with Hope, Herington, Peabody, Council Grove

Moundridge, and Hillsboro competing. The Trojans topped Hope 57 to 54 in their first game and won the final game with Moundridge 57 to 54.

The height of the season was a 44 to 42 win over a favored Planeview team in the last game before the tournament.

The Trojan "B" team ended with a 15 to 2 record to take the CVL.
