Homecoming High Lights Football



These shy students made a few new acquaint-ances as their first class officers were elected. Joel Janzen was elected president and Virgil Klassen Vice-president. Karen Suderman kept the minutes as secretary-treasurer and JoAnn Hiebert served on the Student Council as representative from our class. Our sponsors were Ralph Bengtson and Elizabeth Nickel.
