Trojans Realize Benefits Of Unification

On February 2, 1965, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction approved a proposal organizing and designating Unified School District 410, Marion County, Kansas. As set forth in Section I of House Bill 377 of 1963, the major purposes of Unification are:

1. For the general improvement of the public schools in the State of Kansas.
2. The equalization of the benefits and burdens of education throughout the various communities in the state.
3. To expedite organization of the school districts of the state so as to establish a thorough and uniform system of free public schools throughout the state whereby all areas of the state are included in school districts which maintain grades 1-12, and kindergarten where desired.
4. To have a wiser use of public funds

expended for the support of the public school system of the state.

Unified School District 410 is composed of attendance centers at Durham, Grand Central, Hillsboro, Lehigh and Suncrest.

How has unification affected the students of H.H.S.? With this first year of unification at H.H.S., the transition was not as difficult as many had anticipated. Lehigh students and Hillsboro students are now in one body. Together we can have a better education, make new friends, grow in leadership and develop socially, practice sportsmanship, and exchange our talents to the betterment of each individual. Through unification, we, as students, have benefited in experience and growth. We are the Trojans.

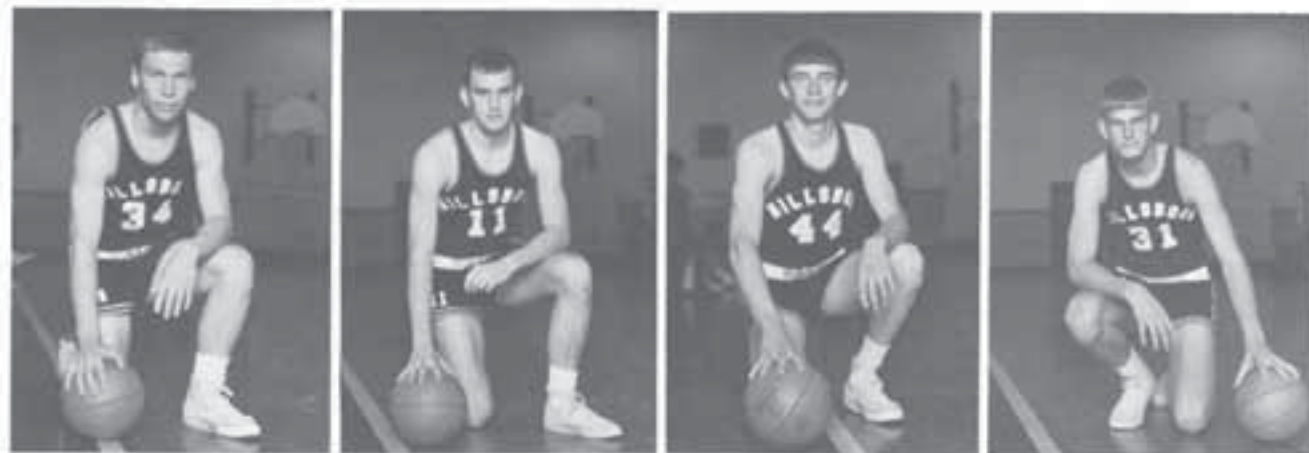

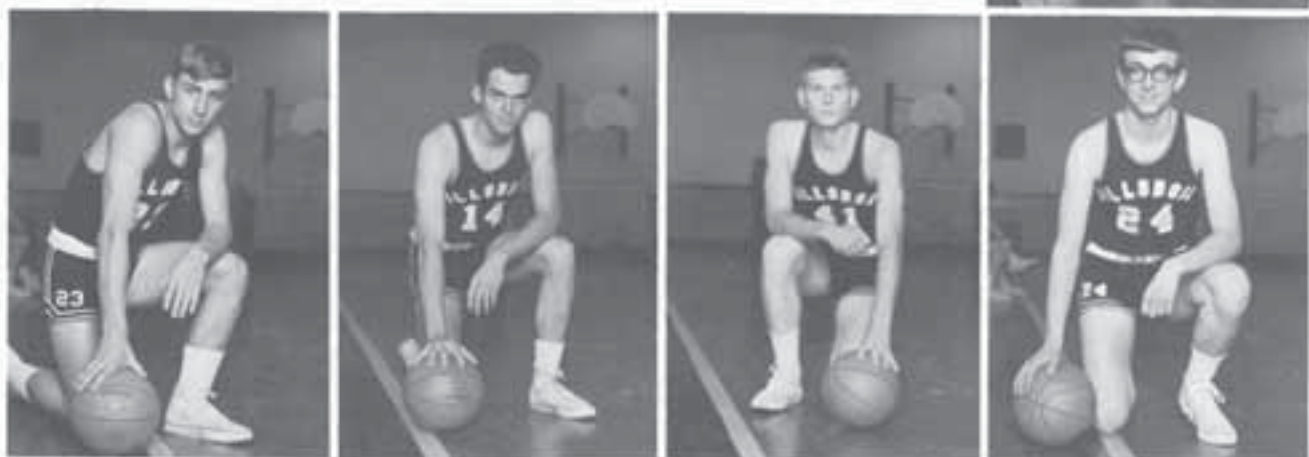

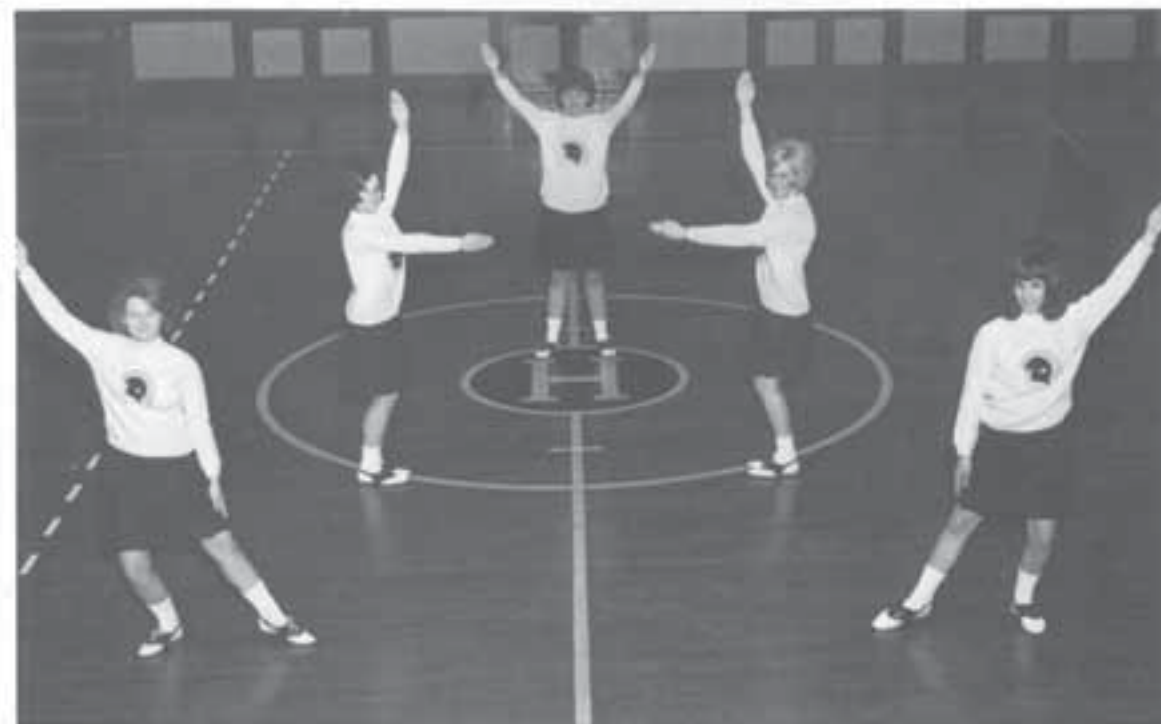
