Mr. John S. Crum came to Hillsboro High School this year as the new principal, a spot which Mr. Nick Klaassen had vacated after thirteen years of service. Mr. Crum was born and grew up near Detroit, Kansas, and was graduated from the Council Grove High School. He received his college education at KSTC of Emporia.

Mr. Crum's previous career includes social science and biology instructor at Dwight High School, Superintendant of Schools at Roxbury, and High School Principal at Williamsburg, Kansas.





Mr. Crum has many plans in the making for changes and improvements in the curriculum for the coming years. He would like to do away with formal study halls so that more courses can be offered, offer independent study courses, provide more vocational offerings for non-college bound students, broaden the curriculum for college bound students, and begin girls' interscholastic sports on a limited scale. Mr. Crum also feels the philosophy of the high school should be changed from strictly academic training to experimental training so that students may have a better chance to experience their chosen vocational field. Both the community and students of Hillsboro High School can look forward to some progressive years in the school system in the future.



Board Of Education Takes A Closer Look At The Educational Program

The Board of Education has been looking closely at the educational program and has been working hard to improve it. Following are four outstanding aspects of the educational program that the board has promoted.

SCHOOL DISTRICT REORGANIZATION
Considerable time and effort were devoted to enhence school district reorganization with the hope of more fully achieving the purpose of unification.

NORTH CENTRAL EVALUATION
This year Hillsboro High School was

again due to have another North Central Evaluation made, which had for its purpose the improvement of instruction.

EXPANDED CURRICULAR PROGRAM
Several new or extended courses were
introduced to enrich the offerings and to
provide a broader educational program.

COMPREHENSIVE EDUCATIONAL SURVEY A comprehensive educational survey conducted jointly by the board and the P.T.A. under the directives of consultants from K.S.T.C. Emporia, set forth desirable educational goals.

Kliewer Terminates Services As Superintendent

Mr. H.B. Kliewer, after serving in the Hillsboro schools in various positions for twenty-one years, has terminated his services as superintendent. He came to Hillsboro as the High School Principal in 1948. In 1955 he became the Superintendent of District 82, and of U.S.D. 410 ten years later.

During the time Mr. Kliewer has served here, many accomplishments and improvements have been made. The High School Annex was built and the local Teachers Association was formed in 1953. School bus transportation was set up in 1960, the Elementary School building was erected in 1961, and the Board of Education Central Office was set up in 1966.

Mr. Kliewer has been an asset to Hillsboro in helping to achieve unification and the many other improvements that have been made in the school system. His time and efforts have been greatly appreciated.







Seniors Look To The Future






Mixed Chorus Takes Concert Tour


Band Performs At Homecoming





Y-Teens practiced thoughtfulness during the year through a secret pal exchange. Names were revealed at the Valentine Party.








Theme Of Junior-Senior Banquet Is "Gone With The Wind"








