

Board, Superintendent Administer Schools

The Board of Education is the legal body for the operation of the schools. They directly represent the people of the school district. Among the Board's major functions are developing school policy and employing personnel to carry out this policy. Financing is also an issue frequently considered because it changes regularly due to state laws. The group meets two times a month and receives no pay. They spend many long hours studying facts and considering various sides of issues being discussed so that they may reach a fair decision.

The superintendent is the executive of the Board of Education and the educational leader of the school system. Mr. Bray recommends personnel and policy, gathers facts and information, and represents the Board. Superintendent Bray is directly involved in everything that happens in the school system. Under his supervision are 110 employees and 1039 students.












FHA Enjoys Bunco




Hi-Y Has Swimming Party at McPherson



















Ten Boys Awarded Letters in Track




