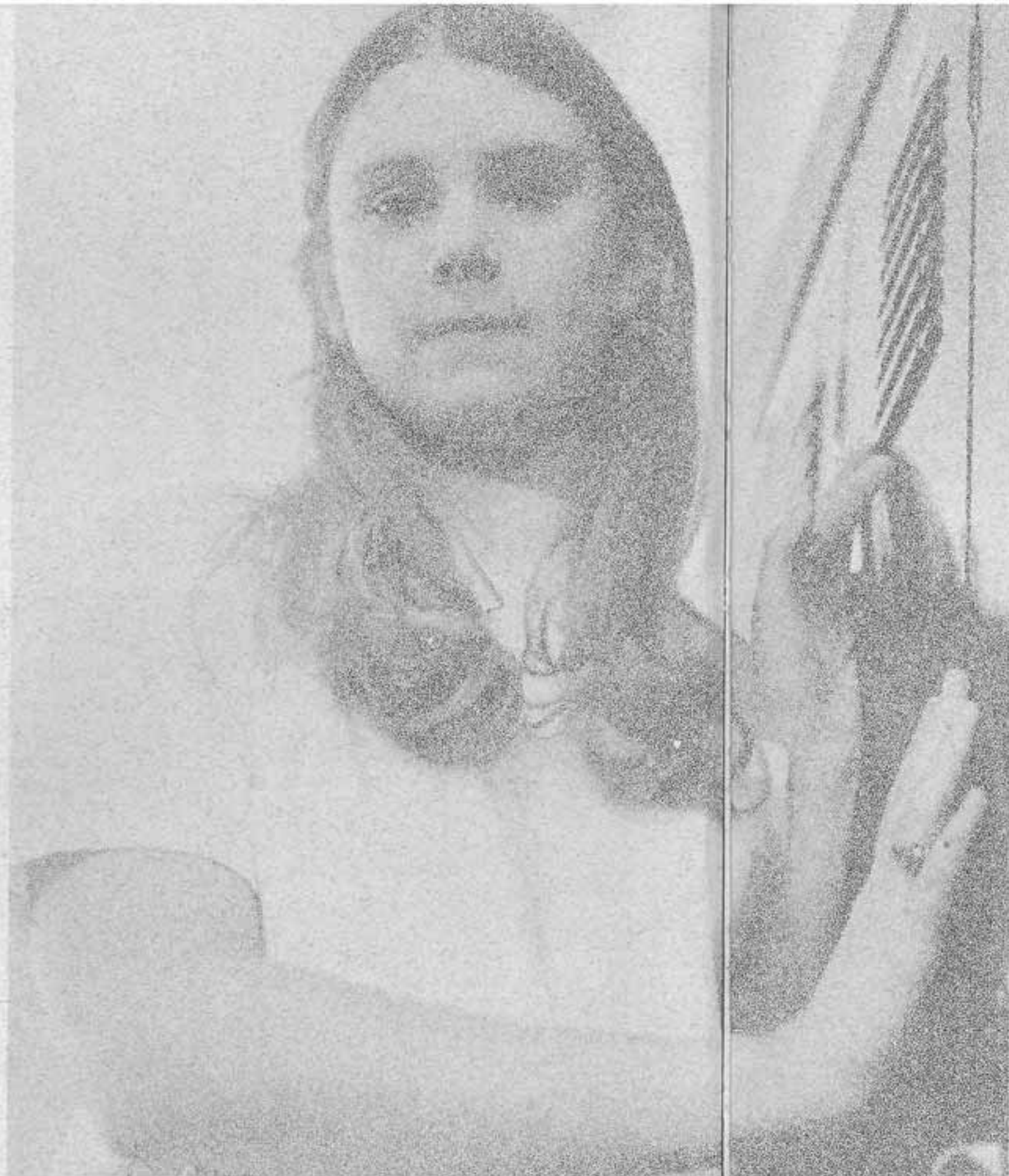

Board Decides On Unification

Operating the schools is the Board of Education's main purpose. This includes dealing with the budgets, buildings, bonds and buses. This year two new members were added to the former board: Jerry Plenert representing Lehigh and Dalmer Kaufman representing Durham. The major accomplishment for the 1971-72 school year was the decision to unify Durham and Hillsboro districts.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION, which includes Dr. Delmer Reimer, Paul Lange, Keith Bray, Eli Suderman, Dr. Dean Kliewer, Jerry Plenert, Dalmer Kaufman, and Dena Hawkins, makes many important decisions concerning the schools. They are not only responsible for making decisions for the high school but also for the elementary schools and junior high.

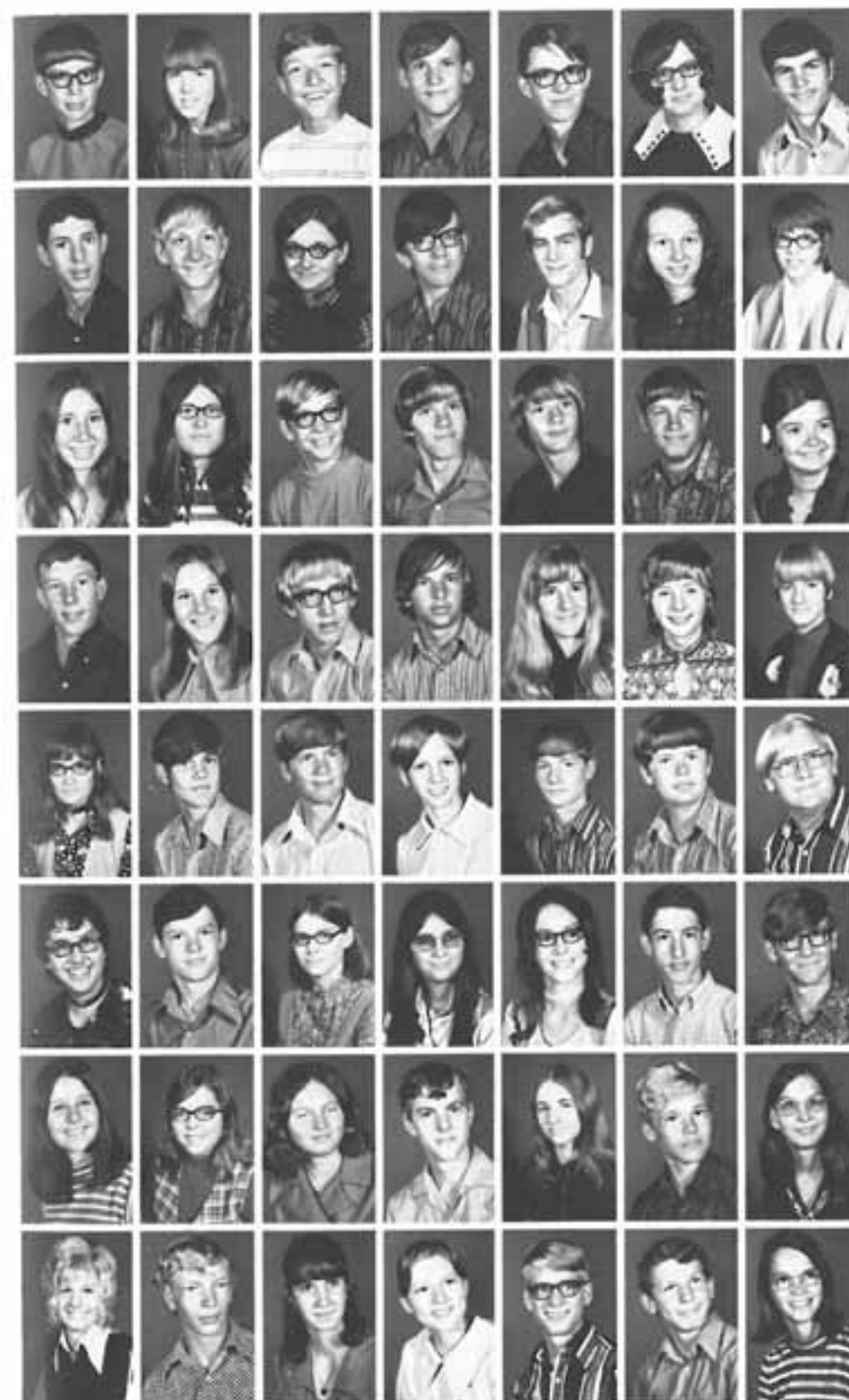

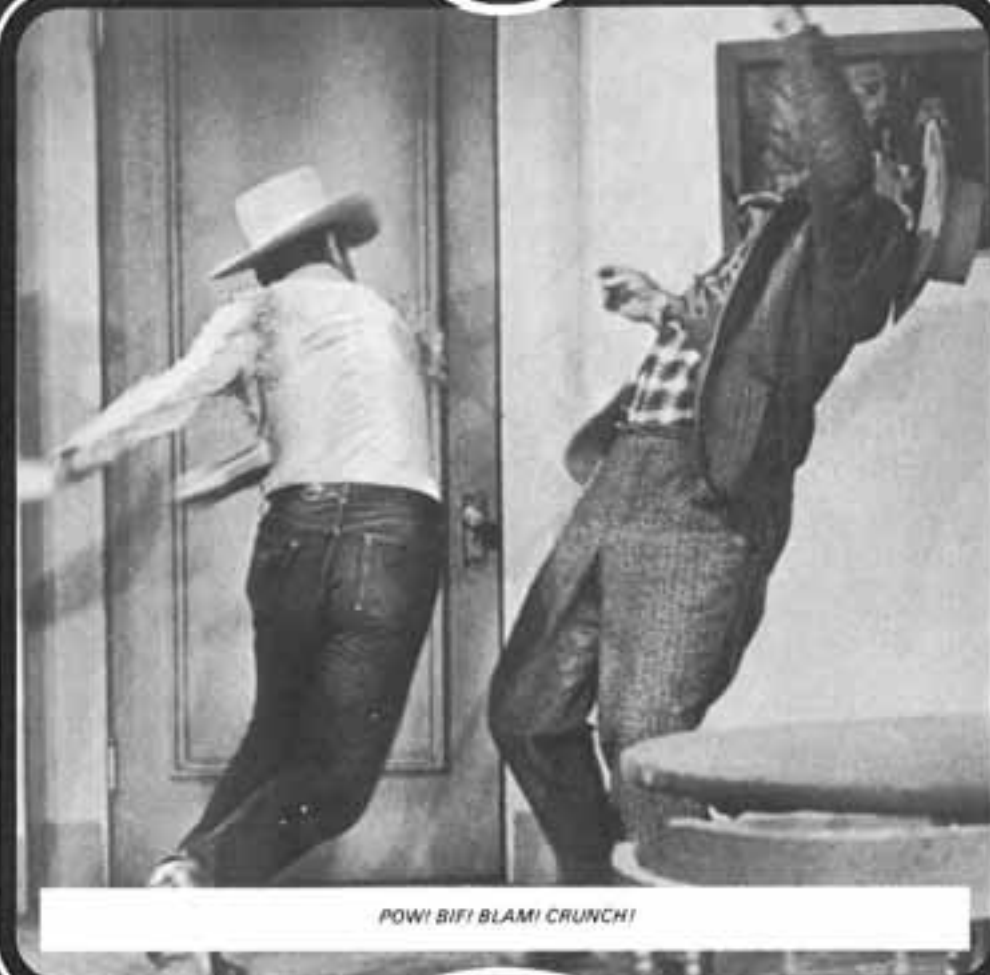

Varsity Ranked No. 1 in 2-A

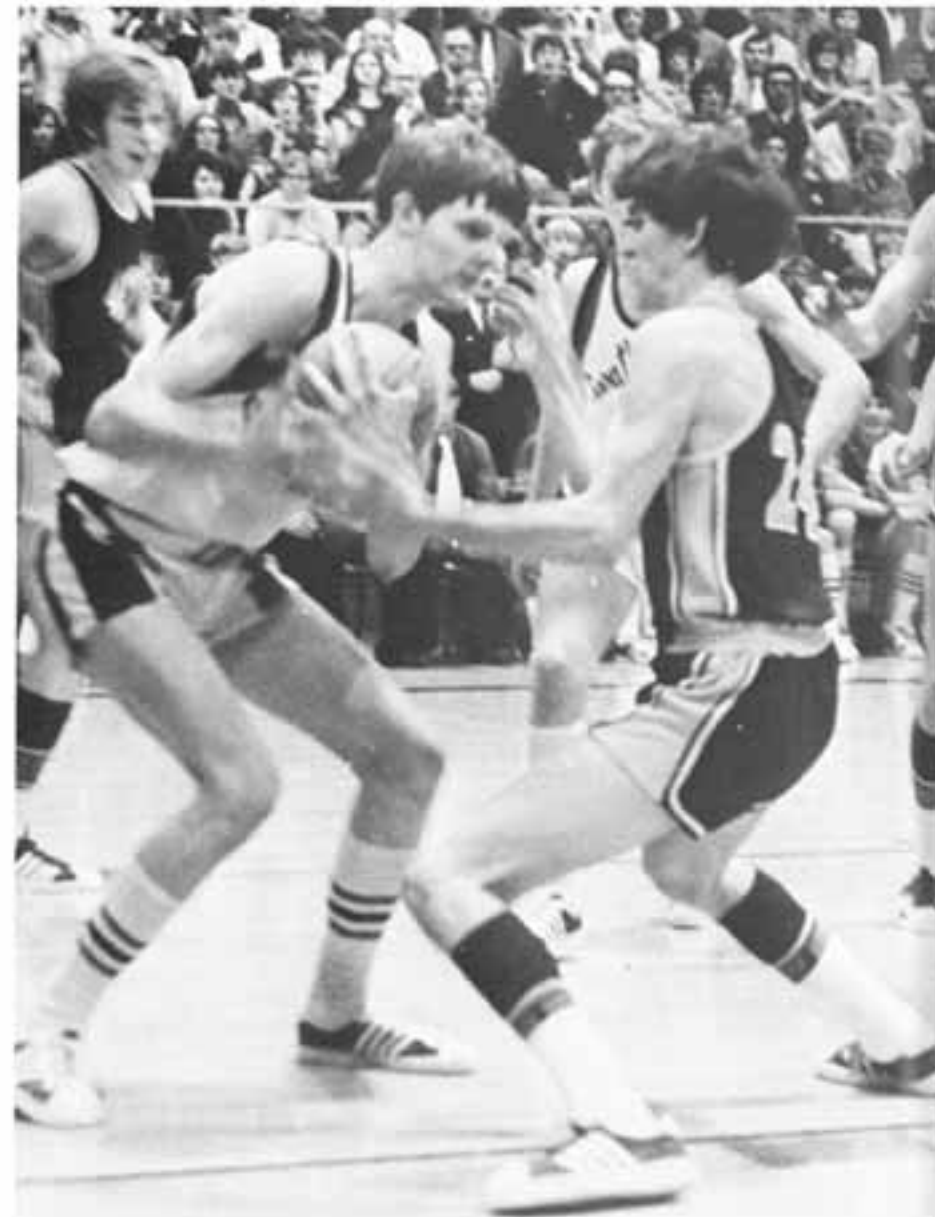
